Good news, the Family Centre re-opens for a year full of fun activities, on 16th January. I am looking forward to seeing you again and meet the new babs and parents. Remember at the Centre both fathers and mothers are equally welcome.

A quick reminder of opening hours:

Monday, Tuesday, Thursday: 9am to 3pm

Friday (apart for 3rd Friday of the month): 10am to 1pm

At the Centre you will find: Toddlers playgroup on Mondays, New Bubs

on Tuesdays, parenting information and support any time, counselling (by appointment), Toy Library, resources, weekly Baby Health Clinic and monthly Immunisation Clinic held by an Early Childhood Nurse from Child and Family Health.

Early in the year I would like to run a P5 program which, in a nutshell, is a Program about Promoting Pleasurable and Positive Parenting. It's the latest rage in Parenting Programs all along the coast and is making its way inland. Parents love it because it's hands on, practical, achievable, and guilt free. Grown ups do need nurturing too, males and females.

A dead serious review

"Where's My Tree?" is a dead serious comedy written and produced by local playwright Vale Mendelsohn.

Concerned for the environment, Vale wrote the script in an attempt to communicate her message through humour. Her message: what we have is not expendable, but vital and essential to our

existence.

Vale's short script follows a trio of young environmentalists, a metallic-looking being from the planet X-to-the-fourth-minus-one, and assortment of animals and insects, and a tree-feller, as they discover the effects of being without trees, and the consequences of selfish and unsustainable actions.

The project was Youth & Community Services funded,

and 18 people ranging in age from 5 to 70 were involved. With help from Alesia of the Nimbin Youth Centre, rehearsals were held once a week for three months to prepare for the performance.

Alesia also helped organise raps and dances for those who weren't so keen on the play, but wanted to perform on the day, and some kids even choreographed their own dances.

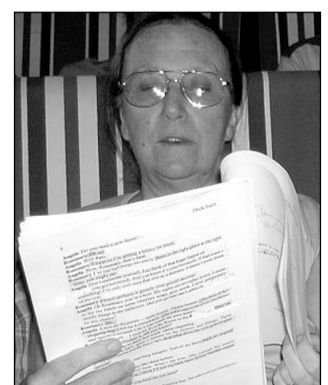
