Doon Doon residents and the broader Northern Rivers community were shocked into an action of solidarity on Saturday 18th June for Bob and Mitzi Hodgkins and their eight children. Bob Hodgkins has had his appeal dismissed, and is now serving 20 months in Grafton Gaol, with a fifteen month non-parole period, for driving while disqualified. Bob, a repeat offender, lost his licence largely due to unpaid parking fines. The family live on a two-acre property with their children, who are aged from 2 to 17 years. From the oldest to youngest they are Camilla, Ira, Lear,

Eileen, Christi, Lali, Della, and Lenny. The kids play music, and call themselves The Perch Creek Family Jug Band. The fundraising and awareness appeal, in the form of a 24-hour gig featuring the band, was held at their property to highlight Bob's plight, and to raise money to continue with the kids' music lessons, to pay for their solicitor and to assist in their weekly transportation costs to Grafton. The family income has been drastically reduced, and Mitzi receives \$40.00 a week less than a single mother, because Bob is in gaol, and the \$5.00 per day that Bob receives is spent on phone calls home. Mitzi said, "The kids are doing good, and I'm amazed

at the beautiful outpouring of community sentiment". When asked how her partner was coping, Mitzi stated, "Bob looks at every experience in a positive light." The New South Wales law was changed some time ago, when a young man was beaten to death in Long Bay Gaol after submitting himself to the authorities and doing weekend detention to pay off fines. Citizens are no longer allowed to voluntarily do time in order to pay off fines. How the bastardisation of this process has occurred, and why a father of eight children is languishing in Grafton Gaol for what are basically unpaid parking fines, is hard to comprehend.

is talk of a welcome home party when Bob is released in June 2006. Optimism, courage, and fortitude are what's needed in this new world, where hypocrisy can lock the doors to freedom.

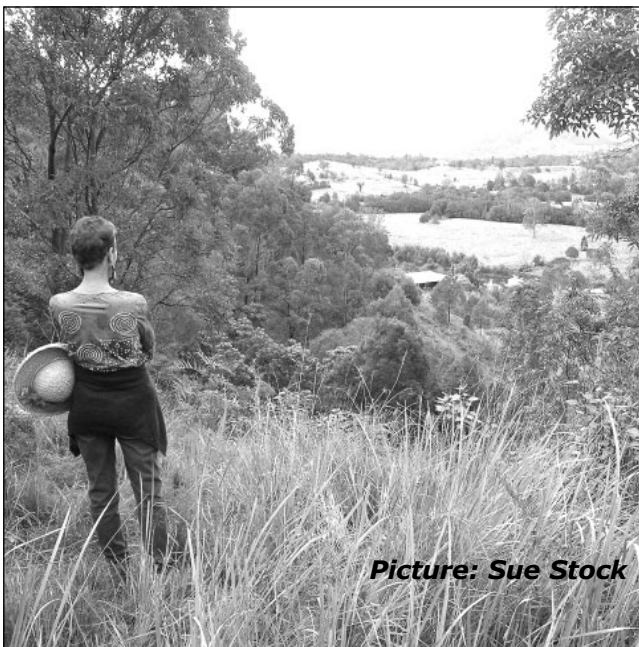
Re-defining the garden
