Edu-speak for parents

On Monday 25th July, Nimbin Central School held a primary school forum, at which parents and caregivers had the opportunity to voice and share their opinions about education in general and Nimbin Central School specifically.

Manuela Geiss (pictured), community liaison officer (CLO) at Nimbin Central School, explained how expectations in education have changed in the recent past. While most parents remember school as an entirely separate entity from home, today their involvement and participation in education and school matters is increasingly seen as part of parental responsibility.

Research confirms that the most accurate predictor of a student's achievement in school is not income or social status, but the extent to which that student's



family is able to create a home environment which encourages learning, communicates high but reasonable expectations for their children's achievement and future careers, and become involved in their children's education at school and in the community (Henderson and Berla, 1995).

All those present at the forum agreed to become more involved and to support the movement toward a true partnership between home and school in Nimbin for the

benefit of our children.

The Department of Education and Training recently introduced a teaching framework that all teachers in NSW public schools are encouraged to follow. It emphasizes intellectual quality, quality learning environments and significance and basically encourages teachers to create interesting, challenging and relevant learning experiences for their students, consistent with their culture at home.

This 'Quality Teaching' framework has been 'translated' into a parent friendly version that is very useful for parents and care givers who may ask themselves how they can help their children at home to be more successful at school. Parents instinctively know what makes a great teacher, now research has examined and labelled those skills and talents. This is called Quality Teaching.
