We also want to set the theatre aside at particular times of the year to celebrate events in the Celtic calendar. To this end we will welcome people who would be available to help us enjoy the seasons with music and ritual."

Zimmermen at Rainbow Ridge

The Rainbow Ridge Steiner School at Blue Knob is currently having extensions built, with a unique team of builders from Europe.

Zimmermen are carpenters, mainly from Germany, who travel the world to improve their skills, and we get a fair few here in Nimbin. It's an old tradition going back almost 1,000 years, and arose out of the development of carpentry tools in middle Europe. Prior to this, stonemasons dominated the building industry. The Zimmermann techniques are those we use in modern building and house construction today.



Nils Steffen (pictured), who is presently assisting at the Rainbow Ridge School said, "Zimmermen have to travel for three years and one day, cannot stay more than

three months in any one place, and are not allowed within 50 kms of their home town.

"We have many codes of practice, and reliability is the hallmark of our tradition," he said.

Zimmermen are known by their almost gothic uniform of black corduroy flared, zippered and braced pants, black woollen, sometimes badge-covered jackets and black hats. They are always courteous and friendly, another part of their tradition.

So if you see Nils, or any other Zimmermen in Nimbin, say hello and invite them for a cup of tea.

The 50+ Learning Centre has been the major activity of the Nimbin Community School over the past two years. It is entirely self-funded.

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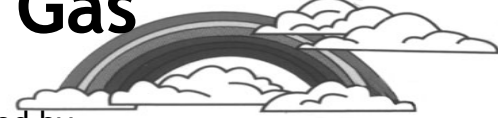
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
