CINEMA AT THE GALLERY - 19th April

We have been very fortunate to secure two documentaries from the internationally renowned film-maker DAVID BRADBURY. David is a local documentary filmmaker from Mullumbimby who has won many awards for his heartfelt and often controversial documentaries. David will be at the Blue Knob Hall Gallery to present two films:

'Fond Memories of Cuba' - A mature reflective portrait of Cuba some 40 years after Castro took power. Exuberant music and vibrant images counterpoint with a narrative that documents the erosion of the revolution in Cuba and the filmmaker's own recognition that the socialist dreams of earlier decades have been lost in reality. An affectionate and good humoured study of a people trying to balance their revolutionary aspirations with the harsh realities of Cuba today.

'Hard Rain' - This is still a work in progress and so hot of the press! David's latest documentary on nuclear energy in Australia today. This personal journey covers thirty years and looks at the option and ramifications of nuclear power in Australia. Hard Rain particularly focuses on the current reality of expanding uranium mining and the debate and possibility of building nuclear power plants. Is the nuclear power the clean, green, cheap, safe option to help combat global warming?

Cost is \$12 per person and includes the films, coffee and cake. 'Cinema at the Gallery' will be held on Thursday 19th April at 7.00 for 7.30pm at Blue Knob Hall Gallery.
