On Friday 14th September I went to the the Whitney Gallery to view the 40th Anniversary 'Summer of Love' exhibition. I walked from my abode at the West Side Cultural Center past the Dakota hotel, via Strawberry Fields *Imagine* in Central Park to the Whitney Gallery situated on the fashionable Madison Avenue strip.

That walk was as interesting as going into the exhibition. It was a magical mystery tour of the 60's. Saw lots of people wearing rainbow tie-dyed tee shirts today. It was interesting standing in the long queue of people lining up to go in speaking about their experiences in that period of time. Much reminded me of my experiences in the late 60's in London, Melbourne and later in Nimbin. At that time the war in Vietnam was raging during the Cold War.

Now 40 years later we find ourselves in a similar situation with the war in the Middle East. Speaking in streets and in the news now is speculation that the US is dangerously close to going to war with Iran anytime now. At the entrance of



the gallery was a car painted with planet Earth themes.

Once inside the gallery I hired a headset to guide me through two floors of counter culture art music installations, light shows and movies. Interestingly enough, similar events have been taking place over this summer in San Francisco and London lately. I observed that much of the exhibition is made up of primary English artists who high profiled mainly in New York at that time. Especially the influences of the Beatles and Peter Max's artworks. My experiences at the London Arts Lab in Drury Lane came to light, which

led to the formation of the Melbourne Arts Co-op and later Nimbin and the Rainbow Region people power culture.

The forming of a planetary Aquarius culture with great influences from the ancient Vedic Indian Cultures that polarized in music and art works at the time through the Beatles psychedelic period. This exhibition was truly an enlightening experience for me. It pleased me to see so many people of different age groups taking such an interest in this exhibition.


Post Script

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
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Sun, sand, rain and gales -

Yes folks, you win some, you lose some. A trouble free drive to Port Brisbane and our four 4WDs loaded onto the barge. We land at The Wrecks on the western side of the island in fine weather. A short drive up the beach then across the island to the ocean beach and head north. Late afternoon, and all comfortably ensconced in marquee tents behind the foredunes at Blue Lagoon campsite - with time for a dip before dinner. Monday dawned fine, with a good surf - the only day that Kay and I managed a bit of "Granny"

surfing (body boards, but not venturing beyond waist depth). Morning dips in Blue Lagoon and a walk along its shore, then through heathland to Honeyeater lake and some skinny-dipping; burning feet on the hot Bulwer Road sand, then beach, camp and lunch. PM saw some going to the Wrecks for snorkelling, others to Cape Moreton Lighthouse for great views over the island and whale watching - alas only a few distant spouts. Tuesday came rain and wind, so waterproofs on for a wet, windy walk around Spitfire Creek, its large aboriginal midden and

A very noisy night with 50 knot winds and flapping, banging tents. Morning showed two tents about to collapse - one unoccupied - one with Shirley calmly and comfortably wrapped up in bed with the canvas drooping down above her.

After evacuation, we collapsed both tents to the ground - no way we could keep them up. Later, some bods drove off to Bulwer (and the Bulwer store!) to tour the northern beaches; some pottered around camp, some explored the area behind the foredunes, north of Blue Lagoon - very pretty and quite calm away from the beach front.

Throughout the week, we enjoyed happy, cosy evenings in the "social" tent, lit by the warm glow of Judy's "hippie" fruit-juice-can candle-lanterns, moderate drinkie-poos, sparkling conversation, remarkable jokes from Joy and Hendrik, and an even more remarkable demonstration (given the overall dampness) by Michael, of fire making by rubbing two sticks together, and by striking sparks.

Thursday, still raining but wind was easing. A few intrepid souls conquered Mount Tempest, despite the weather. Two others had decided to go home early as there was no sign of the weather clearing. So, a thrilling, fast drive down the


beach, over to the barge at The Wrecks, and back, to beat a high tide increased by the strong south east gale.

So it was off down the beach to walk over the Little Sandhills - which are not so little - with fantastic views and wonderful colours in the sands. Then to the Rous Battery - a WW2 gun emplacement, and finally a great climb up through a wildflower wonderland to the summit of Mount Tempest, with fantastic views to both ends of the island and beyond - even to faint, distant Mounts Lindsay and Barney?

Sunday, still fine and an early pack-up and off to The Wrecks for Judy to snorkel, others to explore the Tangalooma resort and others to climb the sand blow to the Tangalooma look out from where we could see a tiny tiny figure splashing around the wrecks. Finally, alas, onto the barge and an easy, thankfully uneventful drive back home to Nimbin.
