



Second Life - second chance

Didn't quite get the genes you would have liked at birth? Time and the elements battered your appearance a bit too much? Don't worry, this can all be changed with the click of a mouse button.

Second Life (SL) www.secondlife.com is a virtual cyber world, created by Linden Laboratories, which is very similar to our own so-called real life (RL) world. You may buy or rent land, build buildings, create artworks, animals, speedboats and clothes or dance the night away at hippy-happenings or discos. Everything we do in RL has its own virtual counterpart in SL. The realism, diversity and "weirdness" of SL is astonishing.

Don't rush away to your computer full of enthusiasm before finishing this article, a few introductory tips will help you get started in SL. Your computer needs a fair amount of "grunt", especially in the graphic/video card department. A minimum of 128 megabytes on the graphics card is essential. One gigabyte of system memory (RAM) is required and broadband, the faster the better, is also essential.

If your computer meets these requirements you also need to "tweak" it, so it is operating as fast as possible. Things like removing cookies and temporary files, defragmentation as required, setting RAM and Cache allocations correctly, and running a minimum of background programs when on SL will enhance your virtual life significantly.

You may register on SL with a basic account for free and there are no other charges to participate in SL activities. You have to upgrade your account to premium if you wish to own land. If you wanted to buy designer clothes for example, you can exchange RL dollars for Linden dollars through the Lindex Exchange, this will be credited to your account and you can then shop-till-you-drop! (\$10USD = \$2,000L) Did you really think there would not be stock brokers and money merchants?

Your presence in SL is through an AVATAR. You select this basic figure when registering, you may then change your appearance in all respects - hair, height, eye-shadow, shoes and gender, as you like. At the time of registering you download the free software to run the SL simulation on your computer. You also have to choose a SL name for your avatar (alter ego?) Avatar is a word to remember, as in the next few years many RL

day to day activities like banking, shopping and getting information will make use of the avatar concept.

SL is not a fancy computer game, though it does resemble sophisticated games in some respects. It is totally interactive and you choose your own destiny - well at least that of your avatar's. There are astrology groups and clairvoyants, wonder how that works when you decide your own destiny?

Individuals have become RL millionaires from conducting businesses in SL! The Australian ABC has an island in SL, a couple of bona fide universities are establishing campuses on SL so they can teach courses, virtually and interactively. A friend quipped over dinner last night that perhaps we should lobby Lismore City Council to become the first virtual local government organisation on SL?

There is a fairly steep learning curve in becoming really competent in SL but for those who are a bit jaded with RL, hate traffic jams, and the tedium of wet seasons the learning will be worthwhile. The skills learnt carry over into day-to-day RL computer operating, and the more we learn the less chance of becoming senile or suffering dementia as we get older.

I've dreamed of and investigated the possibilities of teleportation for many years, and bingo, this is the standard way of moving from place to place in SL. Just stand on the teleporting pad, click, and whoosh you are instantly teleported to your new location - I guarantee, "it's the only way to travel. Da, da, da". (Moody Blues)

I think Nimbin should establish its own village on SL. Like blogs, SL has the potential to make others aware of important issues, these can be discussed by all avatars present whilst seated comfortably by the seaside or rainforest, there's lots of rainforests in SL. I realise Nimbin is as close as you can get to being a RL virtual village but I still think we should have a virtual presence in real cyberspace.

Communication between avatars is done by typing at the keyboard, the text appears in a dialogue section on the screen, or by using a microphone headset and real voice communication. In Utherverse, darling kiss me

Utherverse is a roleplaying, sexually-oriented internet site, www.utherverse.com, contested by a range of players in an environment patterned on the famous red light district of Amsterdam.

One type of players, who can be seen coming, and are usually unwelcomed, are naive young males trying to hit on people whose avatars they genuinely and naively believe are lingerie-wearing females.

Another group, genuine roleplayers, professional sex workers, and computer nerds, are either having fun, trying to make money, or exploring the possibilities of 3D sex simulation with artificial intelligence.

Then there is the grouping of those with similar interests and proclivities, into 'Clans' or 'Families', 'clubs' and cliques. Finally there is a small but healthy minority of people who seem to be able to happily enjoy socialising in



the midst of the mental and libidinous mayhem described above, remaining above or beneath it all ... sound familiar?

It's an interesting tension between groups of unlikely players. As it occurs in internet interactions, there are processes of mutual discovery of eccentricities: poets, perverts and primal activists, philosophers and dabblers, explorers and experimenters, in new and ever-surprising contexts.

Each player is given his or her own blogsite, access to a forum, and an internal mail network to one's personally selected and controlled 'friend' list. One of the more common comments made on the internal personal blog

sites are written by women, trying to explain, as gently as they can, that male avatars walking up to a complete stranger and saying 'wanna ****?' will not, in most cases, get a receptive response. In fact, some young women (who do actually 'wanna ****', albeit virtually) have even posted blogs explaining to the sexually retarded what they would like to hear if the young Lotharios seriously want to 'score'.

And then you get the cross cultural posts ... the site includes 'dimensions' that include various nationalities, (there are Spanish, French Greek and even Turkish 'dimensions'). although the 'English, anything goes' dimension hegemonises the game (with amateur streaming audio DJ's hiring out a nightclub/disco for special events on particular nights), it gets interesting.

I guess it could be seen as a kind of primal grass-roots sex education in an authoritarian-free skateboard park.

For our final May walk, we were graced with steady rain for several days beforehand, and a day-before forecast of much more to come. Judy Hales was leader and since she had no phone we listed ours, and checked with her the day before, that, if there was much rain in the morning, the walk would be off. And was it raining that morn - yes it was. A couple of phone-callers - "yes, the walk is off" - but into Nimbin car-park just in case.... and there was a miserably damp-looking Gerard (he of the Stinson walk). Then, out of the mists looms our intrepid vice president Michael Smith (another Stinsonite), flaunting his shiny new, totally waterproof boots, coat, hat, leggings - you name it, he had it - raring to go - the b*gger will walk in any weather.

Next minute he's joined by another lunatic Stinsonite, Hilary, who will walk anywhere in any weather. Judy appeared and M & H proceeded to put the hard word on her. Suffice to say, she was persuaded and, having collected her wet-weather gear - a plastic bag - off they went. Gerard, like me, chickened out. The following description is from Michael Smith - and I'm really pleased that his gear wasn't leech-proof.

The club planned to walk from Mount Nardi to Tuntable Creek on the last day of Autumn. A night of rain, and the promise of more to come, resulted in just three hardy, cheerful, walkers fronting at the start. It was both windy and raining on top of the mountain. Once under the canopy, in the rain forest, it was just wet, the rain failing to hit the ground. The birds were quiet and the animals absent, as Judy, Hillary and Michael presented their offerings of warm blood to the abundant leeches. The track was down hill, dropping six hundred metres over a distance of six kilometres, gradual enough to barely feel the grade. We were in the forest for five hours, plenty of time for the leeches to turn Judy's pedile extremities (thanks Fats Waller) into rivers of blood. A few hours into the walk the sun came out and stayed, mocking the timid who were still cringing under their doonas at home. We landed safely near the Co-ordination Co-operative and marvelled at the chaos of abodes and scary driveways.

Our June walk to Glennies Chair was abandoned because rain had made the access road impassable. But the day itself was gorgeous - clear blue skies, cool light breeze. So leader Don Durrant led 15 of us to Koreelah Gorge, way over beyond Woodenbong - a long, sometimes bumpy drive - but oh what a beautiful bit of country we live in -



fabulous views all the way, including Mount Lindsay and Glennies Chair. There is a beautiful camping area at the Gorge and we plan a camp there later this year.

The walk starts with small falls at the north end of the gorge, then a rocky descent of 4-5 m into the gorge proper,

which here has a broad saucer shaped floor and spectacular western vertical wall of columnar basalt.

Alas, shortly after the descent, while crossing a shallow flow of water, Kay slipped on wet rocks and hurt her knee. Nevertheless she continued south down the floor of the gorge to a further set of falls and pools. Here we had to ascend a broken, rocky western slope, with wonderful views up and down the gorge. Kay made it to the top, but here decided to return to the cars, via paddocks beside the gorge.

We continued slowly south - slowly because there were so many ground orchids (particularly Green Hoods). Leader Don, an orchid expert, said that he saw 15 different species on the walk. With time going on, I returned to keep Kay company, enjoying wonderful views of Mount Wilson and Acacia Plateau. The others continued south, scrambled to the gorge bottom for lunch then climbing the east wall for the return. Altogether a beaut day - even for Kay and me.

Last year, members of Nimbin Bushwalking and Garden Clubs enjoyed a week camping on Moreton Island. We are proposing a similar self-catering camp August 31st - September 5th or 6th. Wednesday July 16th


Brummies Lookout



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Nimbin girls gee-d up over gymkhanas

Over the past four years a group of up to ten girls from the Nimbin Pony Club have been competing on the NSW Zone gymkhana circuit. This takes a lot of dedicated work and commitment from the parents and the riders.

Most gymkhanas are held over a weekend, with events ranging from showjumping, dressage, hack and rider, sporting and sometimes camp drafting. These events can attract up to 200 riders from all over NSW, so the competition is high, especially in the teen age-groups.

Although the club has come from humble beginnings, the girls are out there placing in all events and winning ribbons.

The club has been running for many years now, and although it started out with only a few members, over the past four years a strong committee has been working hard to lift the profile of the club.

The club committee has invested a lot of time and energy into the whole education, riding ability and presentation of the girls, especially on the gymkhana circuit. With new uniforms, saddle blankets and club flag, the Nimbin Pony Club holds its own amongst some of the bigger clubs.

The Nimbin club has competed at regular annual gymkhanas at Casino, Kyogle, Murwillumbah, Alstonville, Bangalow, Woodburn, Tweed Valley, Channon, Dunoon and Cabarita, then later in the year, at the rural shows.

Nimbin Pony Club meets regularly on a Sunday about once a month where the rider and horse are schooled by qualified instructors in all aspects of riding, horse care and management.

The club is run by a handful of dedicated parents and relies on the generosity of the local community for support and fund raising.

It's a wonderful, healthy interest teaching children responsibility, confidence and team spirit from as young as five years old.


