The 18th MardiGrass was again a wonderful weekend for thousands of people, despite a significant police presence on the roads, including two Winnebagos where drug testing was being undertaken, plus sniffer dogs at Goolmangar.

This certainly turned a lot of people off the idea of attending the Rally on the Sunday, which was unfortunate. However, in the village itself, the police were much more reasonable than the last few years.

Yes there was a definite chance of rain, and it was a real concern. It would have been a disaster for many stallholders who invest a lot of money in perishable food, as well as for MOB who have to outlay an ever increasing amount of money to satisfy regulations and infrastructure.

Even without the appearance of rain, several of the stalls still had considerable wastage. Sunday's crowd was down on that of recent years and more and more, MardiGrass is getting all-weekend campers, as it's becoming an annual gathering of fans of cannabis from all over Australia and the world.

However I was very positive regarding the overall policing of the event. Despite their inflated numbers, the tenor of the policing was much better than it has been in recent years. This was reflected in fewer arrests and a much happier event. And more significantly, it has gone a long way towards bringing back some respect for the authorities amongst the event organisers and those attending. This



sensible policing style was commented on by a lot of people. And who knows? Maybe this is the start of a more mature relationship between event organisers and the police?'

One tragedy clouded the festivities. A fatal accident on the Kyogle road on the Saturday night was tragic in many respects; most especially for the family and friends of Dennis Whittaker, yet also for all the people who agree it's a good thing for the young people to get out of the village after midnight.

James Moylan, the Convenor of the Civil Liberties Observer Group who attended the event, said, "It has marred an otherwise excellent and peaceful event."

ne highlight was a speech by Dr Bob Melamede from America, an exceptional speaker who entertained a large and enthusiastic Peace Park crowd talking about recent changes in legislation relating to medical cannabis in his country and indicating a gathering momentum behind a huge shift in attitude. Amongst many interesting observations, he indicated that cannabinoids are a natural part of the human constitution and babies get a big dose as soon as they suck on the breast. Within a couple of weeks organisers and relevant parties will meet together to learn from the weekend for next year.
