I'm pleased to report that the Federal Government is to legislate to ban gag-clauses in Commonwealth contracts with the not-for-profits (NFP) sector.

I believe in free speech, even if at times, it can be uncomfortable, and our NFP sector must be able to speak out.

In our area the NFP sector contributes significantly to delivering services and improving our community. I want them to be free to put forward whatever views and policy ideas they want to, and not be gagged as part of funding agreements.

A strong, independent and innovative NFP sector is essential for the functioning of our society and good for our way of life. The people who work in this sector as employees and volunteers contribute hugely to our community.

The NFP sector is a key partner in developing and delivering major policy reform and creating opportunities for all Australians.

The past few weeks in Queensland have reminded us of the repressive days of the last Federal Coalition government, when the then Prime



Minister Howard attacked the rights and legitimate role of the NFP sector and diminished its capacity to represent and advocate for its members.

In 2008 the Federal Labor Government removed the gag-clauses imposed by the Coalition that had restricted the sector from engaging in policy and political debate.

And the Labor Government will now legislate to ensure the Commonwealth cannot include gag clauses in contracts with the NFP sector.

Recent gag clauses introduced by the Queensland Coalition

government will result in a censoring of public debate unlike anything we have seen since the previous Federal Coalition Government, when Prime Minister Howard made gag clauses mandatory in all funding contracts, which also led to significant defunding of community organisations.

We can only hope the O'Farrell Coalition Government doesn't follow the Queensland Government down this track, but given what it is doing to education and health we need to be on guard.

Super Trawler

It was a great victory for common sense when Parliament passed the Government's legislation to prevent vessels, like the super trawler FV Abel Tasman, from fishing in Australian waters while further scientific assessments are

undertaken.

I was one of the Labor members of Parliament who pushed this issue in Caucus. From day one when I first heard of this rapacious proposal I voiced my opposition to it, to concerned locals, senior ministers and the media.

We were told that this floating fish factory, able to suck in mega catches, was sustainable but I was not convinced that a vessel of this size would operate in a sustainable way. And, who wants a ship that can take in one go what a few vessels would take over time. Common sense prevailed.

North coast kids to benefit from historic dental package

People on the North Coast are smiling after the announcement of the Federal Labor Government's \$4 billion dental package.

"About 20,800 children in the Richmond electorate will now be eligible for government-subsidised dental care, just like they're eligible for Medicare funded visits to their GP," Justine said.

Under the package the Gillard Government will also provide dental services to more than one million low-income adults and Australians in rural and remote areas, focusing especially on pensioners.

The six-year package announced includes:

- \$2.7 billion for around 3.4 million Australian children who will be eligible for subsidised dental care.
- \$1.3 billion for around 1.4 million additional services for adults on low incomes, including pensioners and concession card holders, and those with special needs, who will



have better access to dental care in the public system; and \$225 million for dental capital and workforce will be provided to support expanded services for people living in outer metropolitan, regional, rural and remote areas.

Justine said the package would address increasingly poor oral health amongst Australians, particularly people from low and middle-income families. "For

decades Australians have used Medicare to visit the doctor when they're sick.

"Unfortunately millions of people don't visit the dentist because they just can't afford it – we know low-income households have more than double the number of family members with untreated tooth decay compared with high-income households.

"That's why Labor believes we have a responsibility to ensure people who are least able to afford to go the dentist, particularly children, should have access to government-subsidised dental care." Justine said.

The \$4-billion package is in addition to the \$515 million announced in the 2012-13 Budget, which included a blitz on public dental waiting lists, additional dental training and support for people in rural and remote areas.

Children aged two to 17 in Family Tax Benefit Part A-eligible families will be entitled to subsidised basic dental treatment, capped at \$1,000

per child over a two-year period. This \$2.7 billion initiative aims to address dental decay in children, which has been increasing since the 1990s.

The Gillard Government is providing \$1.3 billion to states and territories under a National Partnership Agreement to expand public dental services for low-income adults. This funding will depend on the states and territories at least maintaining their current level of dental care services.

And \$225 million in funding for dental infrastructure in outer metropolitan, rural and regional areas will assist more Australians, regardless of their location, in gaining access to high-quality dental care.

Many thanks to Nimbin voters for your strong support for the Greens: Vanessa Ekins, Susan Stock, Shae Salmon, Beth Shelley, Amanda King and Adam Guise in the Lismore City Council elections. You

elected Vanessa Ekins.

Lismore now has eleven Councillors: one Greenie (that's me), one Sustainable Future, our hard working Mayor Jenny (and her three Labor mates), and five so-called independents who are actually two un-endorsed National party members, one Liberal who recently

resigned, one town planning consultant who will be busy, and an unknown young man (hope he likes to read because there are lots of 200-page reports).

Councillors make sure that the roads, rubbish, water and sewer services are funded and parks, pools, libraries and art galleries are provided. It is also the councillor's job to represent your needs and interests. How do we know what these are? It is up to you to tell us. We welcome phone calls and respond promptly to emails. You might want a park or a riverbank restored. You may have a question about the water supply or tree clearing on the neighbour's place. Remember to tell us what the story is so we can take some action.

I want to see more footpaths and cycleways and habitat corridors through urban and rural areas. What do you want?

The big issue for Nimbin now is increasing residential development. Council has already

approved a lot and there is a push for more land to be turned into houses. Is this what the village wants? We need to make sure council consults with the villages about future growth and that we maintain food security by protecting farmland from residential development.

New housing needs to be low-cost and sustainable, with solar panels and rainwater tanks. If every house uses rainwater in the toilet and laundry, there is no need to build a Dunoan dam or desalination plants all along the coast. At the moment the Nimbin community is examining million-dollar options for a centralised water supply. Only 2% of household water is used for drinking: most is flushed down the toilet and the laundry drain. Do we really need expensive, heavily treated water for these purposes?

Well, it's good to be back at my desk again and to be writing my column for the *GoodTimes*.

Thank you to everyone who voted for me and, even if you didn't, I am here to work for all of our Local Government Area for another four years. That means working for the people of Lismore, our other urban areas, Nimbin, other villages and for people in our rural areas. Council represents everyone whether ratepayers or renters, whether adults, children and young people and we make our decisions while considering their impact on future generations.

New Council

Your newly elected representatives are returning councillors Isaac Smith, Neil Marks, Vanessa Ekins, Ray Houston, Simon Clough, Graham Meineke and Gianpiero Battista and new councillors Glenys Ritchie, Mathew Scheibel and Greg Bennett.

As I write this piece, the new councillors are being orientated into their roles with iPad training, briefings on how Council works and introductions to key staff. I have met the new councillors individually and am confident that they appreciate the honour and responsibility bestowed upon them by the community.

The first formal meeting of Council



will be the Extraordinary Meeting on Tuesday 2nd October when we elect a Deputy Mayor and delegates to county councils, council policy advisory groups and committees. I'm sure there will be healthy interest in these additional roles that provide councillors with the opportunity to become involved in a wide range of council-related matters.

The first ordinary meeting will be held on Tuesday 9th October. Ordinary meetings are on the second Tuesday each month, except January, at 6pm at 43 Oliver Ave, Goonellabah and are open to the public.

CSG

Along with the ballots for mayor and councillors, there was the opportunity to vote in a poll asking 'Do you support Coal Seam Gas (CSG) extraction or production in the Lismore Council area?'

Despite the poll voting being non-compulsory, 24878 people cast their

Yes/No answer. The result was an astounding 86.86% No.

It is my intention to move a Mayoral Minute at the October council meeting in which I propose a letter to the NSW and Federal Governments indicating the lack of social license for CSG in our LGA and urging our parliamentarians to represent the community in refusing CSG here.

The road-by-road surveys on CSG are also continuing with a further 59 roads in Bexhill, Numulgi, Woodlawn and Eltham declaring their desire to be CSG-Free. My office is now the repository for 245 declarations and we see more and more of our LGA turning yellow with signage. If mining companies fail to see there is no social license here for their industry, they must be willfully blind and in denial of community will.

LEP

Readers will recall that council ratified our Local Environmental Plan in July and sent it to the NSW Planning Minister for approval. The LEP was developed over several years of intensive and extensive community consultation and amended drafts. The final LEP had modified the zones applicable to rural areas and was developed with funding assistance from NSW Planning to ensure environmental zones were accurately mapped.

It was therefore a surprise to receive a media release from the Minister stating that the environmental zones will be removed

from the LEPs of five North Coast councils and referred back to stakeholders and government agencies for further consultation.

The decision to split the LEP is of great concern from a government that purports to support local decision making. It is also of concern that, the day after the announcement was made to the media, departmental staff had no knowledge of the Minister's decision. At the time of writing, council is still to hear officially of the decision or its detail.

Tuntable Falls Community School

During the period since the election, I've enjoyed three visits to Nimbin. The first was with the Water Wise Team to visit Tuntable Falls Community School to see how the students, staff and community save that most precious resource, water. The school is establishing the most magnificent kitchen, food garden and outdoor learning space.

The Water Wise Team members Barbara Jensen (Rous Water), Danielle McAtee (LCC), Kellie Creighton (Northern Star) and I were so impressed by the students' commitment to and understanding of sustainability.

Nimbin Show

Last weekend I spent some time at the Nimbin Show and saw the fantastic produce display. Like everyone who saw it, I was amazed at the size of that enormous cabbage, the wonderful display of preserves,

cakes, handcrafts and photography and so much more. Despite the shortage of rain, the cattle looked in fine condition. The Nimbin Show has something to interest everyone especially in this the Year of the Farmer and also embraces the latest in sustainability technology. There is no surprise for most of us in that the best farmers have been at the forefront of sustainable practices for generations.

Spring Arts Exhibition

This year's Spring Arts Exhibition maintains the high standard of past years and is a delightful opportunity to take in the excellence of arts practice from Nimbin and the broader community. Whether it is sculpture, ceramics, woodwork, quilting, painting, drawing, photography, glass, felting or weaving, the variety of pieces on display are bound to appeal to the thousands who will visit the exhibition in these school holidays.

Simon says...

Well I'm back on council, after a very hectic election process. I was delighted to see that the poll on Coal Seam Gas had a very high turn out with a resounding 87% opposed to exploration and drilling. This gives a very strong mandate to Lismore City Council to advocate and fight against the 'gas invasion'.

I was elected 6th out of 10 councillors getting strong preference support from the ALP, the Greens and David Yarnall. Unfortunately David Yarnall was not returned to council. This is a great loss as he was a very hardworking and able councillor and a good friend. However we may well see Dave make a return as I think he's been infected with the 'local government bug'.

Mayor Jenny 'Do well' did very well being returned as mayor with an absolute majority and getting in three councillors including Glenys Ritchie who is new to council.



There are two other new councillors, Mat Scheibel ('New Generation Leaders') and Greg Bennett ('Lismore City Council to advocate and fight against the 'gas invasion'').

The polling figures from the Nimbin booth were very interesting. The Greens got the majority of the votes, 312, Country Labor 180, Greg Bennett 76 and myself (Our Sustainable Future) 71 were the main contenders. The major feature of the poll was the 50% increase in the Country Labor Vote, which came from most other candidates. Neil Marks had the most significant drop in votes and they appear to have gone to Greg Bennett.

It looks like the council term will be taking off in top gear with Nationals Thomas George and Don Page

meeting with the Minister for Planning and staging a coup of sorts by getting the Minister to remove and review environmental zones in the Local Environment Plans (LEP) of the Northern Rivers Councils. This intervention by the Minister is unjustified and is totally undemocratic. These LEPs went through an exhaustive process of community consultation and in Lismore's case involving more than two months of public exhibition. Not only that but the LEP was hardly an election issue in Lismore, so it can't be argued that there was a mandate to review the environmental provisions. Interestingly staff of the Department of Planning knew nothing about the review of the environmental zones so it is not based on departmental concerns. My guess is that it is an attempt particularly by Thomas George to try and win back votes from conservative farmers who are disillusioned by his stand on supporting CSG. If Thomas is genuinely concerned about farmer's property rights why

isn't he taking a stand against CSG, which totally destroys property rights and farmer's land at the same time?

The state government has finally released its policies on CSG and what a miserable collection of deceptions they are. We have a Strategic Land Use Policy which does not exclude any land from CSG mining except national parks. This is in direct violation of the government's election policies that vowed to protect prime agricultural areas. There is a newly created position of Land and Water Commissioner who can advise the government and farmers but has no real power. There is an Aquifer Interference Policy, which has no compliance provisions and certainly no provision for fines or punishment for contaminating our precious water. There is a 'gateway' process where experts can decide to approve drilling or approve drilling with conditions, BUT cannot decide to refuse drilling! There is also a Code of Practice for Coal Seam Gas

– Fracture Stimulation Activities. While this policy sounds weirdly sexy there are very few limits of fracking and no detail for the fracking risk assessment and so it goes on and

I find the philosophy that underlies all these policies particularly objectionable it's called 'Adaptive Management'. It amounts to a fancy way of saying we will try and fix it if (when) it stuffs up. And of course if we can't fix then too bad it wasn't really our fault. How do you fix a contaminated aquifer? How do you fix a person's health that has been adversely affected by CSG drilling? How do you fix a beautiful rural landscape that has been turned into an industrial zone?

I was recently elected to the national board of Lock the Gate and I'm looking forward to getting involved in the national anti-CSG strategies. Fortunately most meetings will be by phone hook up.

Meanwhile back on the home front my bike has been cleaned and polished and I've managed 90kms in the last 3 days with the hope of another long ride this morning. The weather at the moment is just exquisite

The Clem Four, originally from Bangalow, have developed quite a following on the Brisbane Jazz Scene with their own brand of jazz, blues and funk.

Roo Friend, baritone guitar and vocals, majored in musicology, after completing jazz arranging and improvisation studies at the NSW Conservatorium of Music and studying guitar under Ike Isaacs of Stephane Grapelli fame. He has revamped the electric jazz guitar, removing the frets under half the strings and creating a unique baritone fretless/fretted hybrid that gives the Clem Four an organic bottom end, as well as providing a bluesy solo voice. He has played with many of the icons of Australian popular music as well as two years in music theatre playing Hello Dolly and Crazy For You, the Gershwin musical, amongst many other sessions and tours.

Tristan Hodson, piano, studied under Jeff Usher and also with the late Jann Rutherford and jammed with Ray Charles on Ray's last tour of Australia. As a vision impaired musician, he has the task of playing everything by ear and is a major influence behind the sometimes-dramatic sound of the Clem Four. Tristan uses "found sounds"

which are self-recorded and introduced into the mix as samples, crossing a musical line from song performance into improvised sound tracking.

Ashley Moor, trumpet and percussion, has played as a member of the Tasmanian Symphony Orchestra, the Brisbane Philharmonic and many other classical ensembles and events. He has also played in Latin groups and has a world-class sound, and doubles on bongos and guiro for the Latin numbers as well as providing vocal support.

Peter Keown, drums, a latecomer to jazz, spent earlier years playing rock, blues, funk, honky-tonk, weddings and cover bands. He also toured North America and Canada with the Bushwackers and is currently playing with the Queensland Wind and Brass jazz big band and doing the Masterclass Band with Phil Emmanuel, an annual event on the Sunshine Coast. A busy man, he is adding his experience, style and broad influences to the unique sounds of the Clem Four.

The Speakers' Tent in the Alley ran back-to-back seminars on topics as diverse as making Your Own Bio-Diesel, Native Bees, Farm Manufacture of Biogas, Harvesting Bush Food and Edible Weeds and Building with Hemp. Around 250 people attended the lectures with many signing up for more hands-on training and workshops.

The Paddock to Plate Café worked non-stop, supplying hand-made and home-grown meals, desserts and drinks to a continuous stream of hungry show-goers. Stalls in Sustainability Alley also highlighted Nimbin's interest in self-sufficiency. Lies that prop-up prohibition

At the launch of the National Cannabis Prevention and Information Centre (NCPIC) in 2008, director Jan Copeland declared that the burden of disease due to cannabis use was estimated to be greater than that of HIV, Hepatitis B and Hepatitis C combined.


It was an incredible piece of hyperbole, which she tried to justify by saying the extent of cannabis use in Australia meant that the total burden of disease it caused was greater. She suggested there was a growing body of evidence concerning the impact of cannabis use on mental health, and while little was known about the respiratory effects of cannabis, she had concerns there too.

Four years have passed, and tens of millions of research dollars have flowed to NCPIC and other similarly obscure acronyms like NDARC, QADREC, etc, etc. After all these years and millions of dollars, what has NCPIC found? Where is the proof that cannabis use is more dangerous than HIV, Hep C and Hep B combined?

Since NCPIC was holding its second conference on cannabis in Brisbane, it seemed like an excellent opportunity to investigate. I contacted NCPIC but was informed by their media coordinator Paul Dillon that they would not give me a media pass. He offered me media releases instead and said he might allow me to interview their major speakers, if they were agreeable. Not unexpectedly, these interviews never eventuated.

But the public has a right to know. Ignoring the gatekeeping Mr Dillon, I boldly walked into the NCPIC conference and sat there, a conspicuous hippy among the suits.

Surprisingly, Jan Copeland seems to



be moderating her message (or does she save the extremism for her media releases?). I was astonished at one stage to hear her refer to CBD, part of the cannabis molecular make-up, as "the good cannabis"! Good cannabis? Good grief! In John Howard's day, she would have been condemned for sending the wrong message.

Some of the display boards of their research were interesting. I learned about the "mull hypothesis. From research on users on the NSW North Coast, NCPIC discovered many cannabis users were using tobacco as spin. The mull hypothesis suggests cannabis may act as a reverse-gateway drug, leading to tobacco use!

The most interesting display board contrasted the incidence of diseases in cannabis-only users, tobacco-and-cannabis users, tobacco-only users, and those who used neither. Not unexpectedly, cannabis-only users fare worse than people who use neither cannabis nor tobacco in incidence of emphysema and bronchitis. It is the delivery system (smoking), rather than the drug that causes harm.

But cannabis-only users have significantly lower levels of cancer and liver and kidney diseases than the other groups. This is not the sort of information that NCPIC sends out media releases on. Maybe the Hemp Embassy should warn those considering

giving up cannabis that they are significantly increasing their risk of cancer and liver and kidney disease?

HEMP had organised a picket – the NCPICKet – outside the conference on Thursday night, and some supporters from Students for Sensible Drugs Policy turned up with placards reading, among other things: "#1 Cannabis Problem: It's illegal" and "NCPIC supporting black market profits".

The picket was organised for 5.30pm because the bar was due to open at 6.30pm, so some of the conference-goers filled in their time as they waited for the bar to open by talking with the protestors. It was a small sample, about 10 or so, but they all agreed when challenged that the main problem with cannabis was the illegality.

Asked why they weren't discussing this at their conference, their defence was that governments wouldn't listen. One attendee said the picket should be directed at a criminal justice conference, rather than them.

The week before, the national president of the Pharmacy Guild of Australia, Kos Sclavos, had suggested at the Pharmacy Business Network conference in Canberra that pharmacists had the experience to dispense legal marijuana.

Mr Sclavos said debate over decriminalising illicit drugs was the number one issue on the health side of politics. He told delegates that while in the capital, he had met with politicians who were looking for a solution as to how drugs such as marijuana could be distributed if they were legalised.

Change is in the air. Hopefully the day is not far off when groups like NCPIC will exhibit the same courage to talk truth to the politicians as the Pharmacy Guild.

Marijuana and Cancer

[Huffington Post 19/9 Robin Wilkey] A pair of scientists at California Pacific Medical Center in San Francisco has found that a compound derived from marijuana could stop metastasis in many kinds of aggressive cancer, potentially altering the fatality of the disease forever. "It took us about 20 years of research to figure this out, but we are very excited," said Pierre Desprez, one of the scientists behind the discovery. "We want to get started with trials as soon as possible."

[Daily Beast 6/9 Martin A Lee] Mounting evidence from research in Spain shows 'cannabinoids' in marijuana slow cancer growth, inhibit formation of new blood cells that feed a tumor, and help manage pain, fatigue, nausea, and other side effects.

[Waking Times 6/9 Becca Wolford] Hempseed and hempseed oil have been found to be a factor in DNA repair. Hemp has the perfect 3:1 ratio of Omega fatty acids (Omega 3 and

Omega 6) needed by the human body. One 'job' of Omega 3 is cellular repair.

U.S. led "war on drugs" questioned at U.N. as drug legalization debate intensifies in Latin America

[Reuters 26/9 Brian Winter] The presidents of Mexico, Colombia and Guatemala all called for a vigorous global debate of anti-narcotics laws at the United Nations on Wednesday, raising new questions about the wisdom of the four-decade-old, U.S.-led 'war on drugs'. Latin America has been (and still is) the hardest-hit region by the war. It shouldn't come as a surprise that it is the part of the world with the most vigorous debate about drug policy reform as governments look for alternatives to the failed policies. The debate is hampered by the long-entrenched prohibitionist credo and extreme pressure from the big northern neighbour. When the Uruguayan president José Mujica was asked about his proposal to make a historic break with global prohibition and put in place a legal, state-controlled market for cannabis, he replied: "Someone has to be first."


people getting access to relief, or even healing. He couldn't look me in the eye, but there was a dramatic change in atmosphere. Almost respectful, hard as it was for him.
