Our community has suffered a great loss with the passing of much loved local man Darcy Goodwin, who fed and comforted so many from his Five Loaves Mobile Soup Kitchen.

I paid tribute to Darcy and his tireless work in a speech in Parliament. This is a short excerpt:

"I want to pass on some quotes from locals that describe this wonderful man. Two pastors officiated at his funeral: Pastor Horace Evans and Pastor Keith Jackson. Pastor Evans summed up Darcy's philosophy on life by saying, 'Darcy's true gift was that he valued people more



than material possessions.' Pastor Jackson said: 'He was a genuine Christian

through and through and somebody to be admired and respected for sacrifices he

made, forsaking comforts to improve the lives of others.'

Michael Fox said, 'I have never seen so many Indigenous people in my life love a whitefella.' Laurie Marriott said, 'I have known Darcy for 20 years. Darcy was a good man and an angel who treated everyone like a king.'

What I said publicly was: "Darcy was pure goodness and that is how he lived his life. He always said to me that out on the 'highway', as he called the journey of life, all was good and we had to help our fellow travellers. He did more than his share. May he rest in peace for a job and a journey well done."

Telstra jobs

I was shocked and sickened when a Telstra executive rang me in Parliament on August 21 to say he was about to tell staff in the Goonellabah Call Centre of plans to close the centre, at the cost of 116 jobs. Telstra has proved again

that they are without heart and can abandon the country just like that.

I rang Telstra CEO David Thodey and followed up with a joint letter with State MP Thomas George and Mayor Jenny Dowell, calling for a reversal of the decision. Mr Thodey responded saying staff are being offered jobs in capital cities. That is not what we want. The 116 employees facing the axe at Goonellabah are people who live and work in the Lismore area.

Mr Thodey has not given any credible reason why Telstra can't adapt the Goonellabah site to other Telstra work. There has been a strong community response and we need to keep the pressure on Telstra to keep jobs in Lismore, to keep jobs in regional Australia, and to keep jobs onshore.

Super-trawler

Recreational fishers and others in the community

have raised the issue of super-trawlers with me and I share their strong concerns about the potential impact of allowing the foreign super-trawler the FV Margiris, to operate in Australian waters.

I am not convinced that there are any benefits to allowing this floating fish factory, twice the size of any boat that has ever operated here, into Australian waters to harvest tens of thousands of tonnes of fish.

Senior Labor members, including the Federal Environment Minister Tony Burke have also raised concerns. Mr Burke said his priority was the issue of by-catch of various listed species of environmental concern, whether it be dolphins, sea lions or sea birds such as albatross.

NDIS scheme "an idea whose time has come"

I recently spoke in Parliament about the importance of a National Disability Insurance Scheme (NDIS). Here's my speech as recorded in the *Parliamentary Hansard* on Monday, 20 August 2012:



and permanent disabilities will start to receive support. By July 2014, that figure will rise to 20,000 people. For the first time in our nation's history people with a significant and permanent disability will receive lifetime care and support, and that is regardless of how they acquired their disabilities.

There are so many people right around the country who have worked for so long to see a national disability scheme in place. Under an NDIS, people with a disability will have their individual needs assessed and they will be able to have much greater choice over the standard and quality of care that they receive. It is a scheme that will deliver Australians with disabilities the services they need when they need them.

Indeed, Australians with a disability and their families and carers have waited long enough. We must act, and the government is acting, to make the NDIS real. The fact is that everyone knows someone who struggles with a disability. Everyone knows a family that struggles to find care for their family member who has a disability. It is an issue that many locals continue to raise regularly with me.

We also note that currently there are vast differences in the care that people get. It often depends on where they live. Of course, that is grossly unfair for those living in regional and

rural Australia. When people talk about the care that they receive today, they often say that it can be rationed, that not everybody gets care and that many people do not get enough care. We want to see a national disability scheme make a difference to people with disabilities right around our nation, in every state, territory, suburb and, indeed, town – particularly, as I say, for those from rural and regional areas such as in my electorate.

The government is getting on with the job of building an NDIS, and we are working with the states and territories through COAG. We have set up the Select Council on Disability Reform of treasurers and disability ministers from around the country. This is the appropriate forum to progress this work because states and territories have primary responsibility for the care and support of people with disabilities. We do not want people with disabilities to have to wait any longer. We do not need another committee. We cannot let anything delay the NDIS. This is a long-overdue reform that we are delivering on and we cannot have it delayed. An NDIS will give all Australians with significant disability the peace of mind to know that their care and support needs will be addressed no matter where they may live or how they acquired their disability.

It is intended that the NDIS will produce the following outcomes for people with disability:

the individualised care and support that they need over their lifetime; more choice and control in their lives through a person centred, self-directed approach to service delivery, with that individualised funding; and disability care and support that is more accessible and which will meet nationally consistent standards. So it is certainly very wide ranging.

At its heart, the NDIS is all about our nation working towards giving people with disabilities a much better future – more care, more support and more choice about how they run their lives... It is a very long overdue reform that many people throughout this country have called for, over a long period of time, and we want to do it by working with the community, working with the states and working through COAG to deliver this real reform. This is an idea whose time has come. We have to move forward with this. We cannot have further committees to hold this up. We need to all work together to get an outcome that actually delivers for Australians right across the country. Those Australians who have a disability and their families and carers need to have this reform in place.



The Nimbin Annual Country Show Brewers Corner is now into its fifth year and keeps getting bigger every year.

Coopers DIY Beer will again be the major sponsor with all the excellent prizes they have offered in the past, and this year Jude and Graham Hardy, owners of Richmond Home Brewing Supplies in Lismore, are also awarding vouchers for winners in specific categories. Graham has also kindly offered his time and educated palate as a judge this year.

Exhibits must be delivered to the Nimbin Showgrounds pavilion on Friday, 21st September between 7.30 and 10.30am, in quantities that are the equivalent of 2 x 750ml bottle of beer and 1x 750ml bottle of wine and spirits or liqueurs.

This allows sufficient quantity for the judging on Friday, with the balance for the exhibitors tasting on Saturday, 22nd September, from 11am to 1pm in the main

Showground pavilion. Early birds get to taste the winning brews, and prizes awarded to exhibitors can be collected within these hours.

As in previous years, there are several categories, including:

- Light to medium bodied beers – pilsener, ales and lagers
- Full bodied beers and stout
- Dry white table wines – all fruit, vegetable, herbs must be declared on the label
- Sweet white table wines – all fruit, vegetables, and herbs must be declared on the label
- Red table wines – all fruit, vegetable, and herbs must be declared on the label
- Liqueurs – type to be declared on the label
- Spirits – type to be declared on the label

The judges reserve the right to move an exhibit into a different category if they think the exhibit is more likely to be successful in that category.

Monsanto has bought a leading US bee research firm, despite it (Monsanto) being implicated in bee colony collapse – a major cause for dwindling bee populations around the world.

According to a company announcement, Beeologics handed over the reins to Monsanto in September 2011, which means the gene-manipulating giant will now be able to control the flow of information and products





Sustainability Alley – Blue Knob Farmer's Market at the Nimbin Show

When you visit the Nimbin Show this year be prepared for a different experience. The Blue Knob Farmer's Market is creating a Sustainability Alley – showcasing some of the simple, low-tech sustainable achievements that Nimbin is becoming increasingly well known for.

The Paddock to Plate Café features delicious handmade meals made from local produce. Hand made, local ice-cream is also a feature along with locally grown coffee, roasted on the spot. Several stalls will sell samples of Blue Knob Market's fare as well as organic seedlings for spring planting.

Other stalls include; Northern Rivers Hemp, Rainbow Power with solar pump and cooker displays, Nimbin Natural Bee Keepers, composting toilet displays, locally made compost for sale. The neighbouring Djanbung Permaculture Gardens and Environment Centre will also be there along with a display of quails and their beautiful eggs. Worm Farming is a feature, and many more.

Treat yourself to a different show experience by also visiting the Speakers Tent in Sustainability Alley. The Tent will host a packed series of seminars on sustainability and self-sufficiency. Presentations are 45 minutes long and start on the hour.

Speakers Tent Program SATURDAY:

10am, **Native Bees** – Steve Maginnity. Information on attracting native bees to your garden, setting up a hive and leasing or buying hives to increase crop pollination. Honey tastings after the talk.

11am, **Rainfed Rice** – Brett Slater. Mostly associated with the Murrumbidgee areas of NSW, rice is now grown locally. Brett has been one of the pioneers in successfully growing local organic rice without irrigation.

12 Noon, **Bush Foods and Edible Weeds** – Peter

Hardwick. What we try and eradicate as introduced weeds were once staple medicinal and forage plants for European peoples. Native plants we ignore in the bush were staple forage foods for indigenous people. Learn to identify some of these plants and try some sample tastings.

1pm, **Growing Alternative Crops** – James Creagh. Many European plants are unsuited to our local climate while food plants from the south/central Americas and South East Asia grow much better. Information about some lesser-known plants that could be staples for our region.

2pm, **Farm Generation of Bio Gas** – Paul Wilson. Biogas is typically made from animal manures and kitchen or green waste and is often used for cooking, heating water or lighting. Paul, from Nimbin Valley Dairy, toured China and Germany studying the use of biogas. He estimates that China has around 30 million households that generate enough bio gas to supply all their cooking and lighting needs.

SUNDAY:

10am, **Making Your Own Bio-diesel** – Dolph Cooke.

An introduction to using

waste vegetable oil as an alternative fuel for diesel engines. Some Biodiesel will be made during the talk and participants can inspect a truck that's been converted to run on bio-diesel.

11am, **Growing and Building with Hemp** – Klara Marosszeki. Learn how its possible, if you have 1 hectare of land, to grow enough hemp to build your own; fire resistant, very economical, hemp fibre house with no need to render, paint or insulate. Hemp houses also have good sound proofing qualities and will easily withstand extreme weather.

12 Noon and 1pm, **TBC**
2pm, **Composting Toilets** – Stuart McConville. Composting toilets make huge water savings and produce valuable fertilizer for your orchard trees. They allow independence from municipal sewerage system breakdowns plus they're ideal for difficult sites such as rocky areas or where there's concern about contaminating ground water or creeks.

Grandmas grow Gold in Swaziland

[New York Times 14/8 Lydia Polgreen] After her daughters died, Khathazile took in her 11 orphaned grandchildren without hesitation. It is what a gogo, or grandmother, does in a country where the world's highest H.I.V. infection rate has left a sea of motherless children. "God will help us," she said. Perhaps. But Khathazile has some insurance in case divine intervention fails: Swazi Gold, a highly potent and valuable strain of marijuana that is sought after in the

thriving drug market of next-door South Africa. In a field deep in the forest, atop a distant hill in this arid corner of tiny Swaziland, Khathazile grows Swazi Gold to keep her growing brood of grandchildren fed, clothed and in school. "Without weed, we would be starving," explained Khathazile, who asked that only her middle name be used.

Online Drug Markets

As well as anonymous marketplace, Silk Road, there are a growing number of businesses selling online at the moment, with or without Tor networks. Pot2Peer has recently appeared: "A compassionate marijuana dispensary utilizing the latest in peer-to-peer and anonymous electronic payment technologies to provide safe and discreet access to high quality cannabis products for personal consumption". NSW: Energy firm fails in bid to enforce urine drug testing

[Sydney Morning Herald 15/8 Josephine Tovey] A state-owned energy company has lost its bid to be allowed to conduct urine tests for drugs on its employees, in a case unions hope will set a precedent across the country. The full bench of Fair Work Australia upheld an earlier court ruling denying Endeavour Energy, which is owned by the NSW

government, its call to conduct urine tests on its employees as part of new health and safety provisions. The earlier decision found such tests were "unjust and unreasonable" because they could detect drug use from days earlier, and instead ruled that oral swab testing, which generally only picks up drug taking in the preceding hours, was a better test of impairment. Debate over the best methods for drug testing is highly contested in a range of industries, with unions arguing urine testing unfairly monitors workers' private lives.

Queensland: Concern over school's decision to drug test students

[abc.net.au 9/8 David Lewis] Civil libertarians and health experts have raised concerns over an elite Queensland private school's decision to randomly drug test its students.
