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Symbols of belonging and feeling located

It is always thought-provoking to return to a place that we have inhabited before, and to comprehend this place in a renewed light: places change somewhat because of transformations within the immediate environment, and because of the people returning to this place with different perspectives, experiences and ideas.

Returning to Nimbin Preschool, our place, has motivated different responses, thoughts and actions that have cemented our individual and collective expressions of being in this place. The visibility of these expressions are now being shared with others as messages of how we belong to the place, and importantly, how we feel 'located' within this place.

When Luna returned to preschool, one of her first thoughts and actions was to create a significant symbol embedded

within the entrance to our place: to enter you had no choice but to look down upon this symbol and to ponder its meaning and consequence.

As Luna's teachers, we agreed that this symbol rendered our immediate attention as a momentous semiotic marker of how Luna interprets her belonging in this place, how she communicates this feeling to others, and her own sense of being firmly located within this place.


The richness of her design is perhaps what we pay attention to in the first instance. However, this design is so much deeper than that. Luna's capacity to immediately affect our own sensibilities is depicted in the layers of hearts and swirls that radiate outwards to draw the observer in.

One cannot help but feel love being shared before you step inside: a response that takes your breath away and immediately enables you to step into the



place that awaits you, welcomes you and respects you.

The anonymity of this symbol at the time, enriched our sensibilities and delivered an empowered message of strength and of feeling located.


My wife always cooks with wine. Sometimes she even adds it to the food.

The philosophy of inclusion encompasses all aspects of our club – the players, coaches, committee representatives, volunteers and parents or carers. The FFA 'let them



play' catch-cry encourages clubs to ensure participation at all levels of the game is equitable, regardless of factors such as age, gender, race, sexual identity and ability.

As one of the few sporting outlets available in our little village, it is our mission to ensure that the club reflects broader community values of respect for diversity. The Headers community has always prided itself on our welcoming and inclusive attitude, and the conception of the new inclusion program is about enshrining these values, and shouting about them so that the whole community is aware of our aims.

We hope that kids and adults alike choose to play with the Headers, not just because we are the local club, but because they feel aligned with our values and feel welcomed to participate because of who they are, not in spite of their differences.

This spirit of inclusion extends to our coaches. Children who thrive often do so in part because of the adult role models who contribute to their upbringing. The Headers Club

welcomes anyone with an interest in football or physical fitness, who is aligned with our values and, if not familiar with the rules and regulations, at least has a willingness to learn.

Our Coach Co-ordinators are tasked with the support and education of our coaches. They have committed to overseeing our coaching programme, offering encouragement and advice where appropriate, and acting as liaison between players, parents and the club.

Any not-for-profit organisation relies heavily on the input of volunteers, and our spirit of inclusion is reflected here, too.

The Management Committee meets once per month to oversee the day to day running of the Club, and manage larger projects such as grant applications, grounds maintenance and the care of club infrastructure.

The effectiveness of the committee's role is determined by the number and the quality of its

members, and so we encourage anyone – players, parents, supporters – to become a member and have some input. We currently enjoy representation on the board across age, race and gender lines and not all of us actually play the game.

If you are not a committee-type person, there are still many ways to be involved, and get the most out of your club membership. Regular workdays provide an opportunity to meet and work alongside others in the club performing tasks as varied as mowing and brushcutting, painting, cleaning, pumping up balls, small building projects, and organizational tasks.

On match days, our canteen is operated by volunteers and we always require helpers on these days to ensure the smooth running of schedules, and to set up and pack down the goals and field markers.

If fundraising is your thing, we always have a raffle on the go, and various other social events throughout the year, and outside input is appreciated here, too. Or

perhaps you can offer your goods or services as a prize?

Volunteers and coaches can register as such with FFA, just as players do, and this gives you insurance cover whilst you are participating. This is important to assist you in the event that you are injured whilst working with us, as insurance coverage will contribute to any ongoing medical costs or loss of income which may result.

The Nimbin Headers Sports Club has a proud history of collaboration with the Nimbin community, and we wish to see this continue well into the future. *We need you!* Don't be shy. Come on down and take a peek at what you are missing out on.

Social soccer is still happening on Mondays from 5.30pm, fitness sessions are running on Tuesday evenings, and many of the seniors are now training on Thursday afternoons. Keep an eye on local noticeboards and social media for workdays and social events throughout the year.

Registrations for the 2018 season close very soon and scheduled games begin on the first weekend in April for seniors and juniors (U12 and over) and the first weekend in May for miniroos (U11 and younger).

It is important to register early so we can determine numbers and begin putting together our teams, allocating coaches, and start the work of building strong networks of players and supporters, across the age divisions.


