



Rally calls for kids off Nauru

About 150 people rallied to support the 'Kids off Nauru' (and their families too) campaign at Lismore City Hall on Saturday 27th October.

They were standing up for people who are voiceless and defenceless. 296 letters were written to politicians.

Three speakers described how off-shore detention was destroying lives. Cath Napier had worked on Nauru with Save the Children, so could talk from first-hand experience.

Janet Wilson has been in one-to-one contact with men on Manus for years, and could explain the destroyed lives they are enduring.

The Winsome choir led a song written for the asylum seekers and everyone joined in. A minute's silence followed, with hands held high and wrists crossed. This was a moving and fitting end to the rally.

Currently there are 47 children on Nauru. The government has stopped fighting *every* medical transfer in court. New arrivals however are being put into onshore detention centres and not the community. The new arrivals will add to the three children currently in on-shore detention.

There are many stories of what off-shore detention looks like, none of them good.

The last man to commit suicide on Manus Island, Sri Lankan Rajeev Rajendran, 32, had a wife and children living in Australia. He was told he would never be allowed to go to Australia, and the distress caused him to lose his mind. He jumped off a moving bus and a wheel ran over his head.

This did not need to happen, it is the result of a deliberately cruel and inhumane policy designed to deter people who are fleeing for their lives. This is the reality of off-shore detention. We must end this once and for all. We must end it now.

A group stopped two trucks carting water through Uki on a Saturday when they are forbidden.

Now, more water mining applications have been prepared for Council, and Tweed Shire is becoming the water mining capital of Australia.

We live in this stunning region largely because we appreciate the beauty and tranquillity of our unique pristine environment.

Massive amounts of water are being

pumped from the earth and trucked to bottling plants where it's put into disposable plastic bottles for sale.

This is another sharp blow to the environment and a big con-job, as tap or tank water is better anyway. It's on our doorstep.

We need to come together as a community to stop water mining. I propose a community meeting to discuss how we can better support the Uki residents in their push to stop this insidious wrong-doing.
