Terania Creek Walk In the 40th anniversary

In the 40th anniversary year of the legendary save Terania Creek campaign, 12 Nimbin Bushwalkers foregathered to pay homage to the protestors who stopped the logging by the Forestry Commission of NSW.

This battle provided a national model for non-violent environmental protest, adopted soon after in the grand battle to stop the damming of the Gordon/Franklin Rivers in Tasmania.

Hales, who knows the creek well, the walk entailed slippery off-track navigation, including creek crossings.

We had our first stop at the 'cave', a large overhanging rock feature that had been favoured by the Widjabul people for camping and cultural and ceremonial activities.

The remnants of the logging era are gradually decaying, and we admired the magnificent old-growth trees, grand bangalow palm forests and a wide variety of beautiful moss and fungi, along with the circular rock pools, understandably popular in the summer months.
