State Government announces faster funding pathways to recovery

here was quite a bit of discussion at Council's March meeting about the Nimbin Advisory Group and whether it should be broadened to include other villages within the Lismore Local Government Area.

In the end, it was decided to set up a separate advisory group for our many villages to give them a voice to Council, while retaining

the NAG as it currently operates. I believe this is the best outcome.

Council continues to work with the NAG and the local community on projects like the Nimbin Place Plan. During last month's consultation phase, Council received 181 survey responses and the two public workshops were well attended.

Once Council develops a draft of the Place Plan based on the feedback received, we will host another workshop, as well as publish it on-line.

This will ensure that Council has interpreted all the information correctly and has developed a plan that authentically reflects local aspirations.

Greens Bridge

Later this month, I will be joined by State Parliamentary Secretary for Regional Transport and Roads, Anna Watson, to officially open Greens Bridge on Stony Chute Road just outside of the village.

The ageing wooden bridge was replaced with a threespan 38m-long concrete bridge on bored pier foundations designed to provide unhindered clearance over Goolmangar Creek.

The deck height of the bridge is also 1.2m higher than the previous bridge, which was submerged during the 2022 natural disaster. Council engaged Quickway Constructions Pty Ltd, which used its Northern Rivers-based team to build

the project. More than 30 local subcontractors, suppliers and workers were involved in its construction.

The \$4.5 million project was jointly funded by the NSW Government's Fixing Country Bridges program and Lismore City Council.

Recovery funding

Lismore, and our recovery effort, received some great news late last month, which I believe is probably the most significant day in our rebuild.

The NSW Government announced a new, faster funding pathway to make it easier for Northern Rivers communities to rebuild vital roads and transport infrastructure following natural disasters. The Tripartite Agreement

between the NSW Reconstruction Authority, Transport for NSW and seven local councils will ensure a speedier roll out of

reconstruction funds after floods, fires or other natural disasters.

Prior to this agreement, Council had to finance the rebuilding of infrastructure before we could access additional funding from government.

Now, we can access critical funds upfront at each stage of reconstruction, easing the financial burden and making it easier to undertake reconstruction work more quickly.

Expect to see the pace of our recovery take off very soon.

Landmark environmental reforms pass NSW Parliament

have a lot of environmental news to share with you this month, as there have been some significant developments.

Ban on offshore mining

The Minns Government has moved to protect our beaches and coastal environment by banning seabed petroleum and mineral mining and exploration off the NSW coast.

The Government secured support from across the NSW Parliament for the ban, making NSW the first state in Australia to prohibit offshore exploration and mining.

Offshore mining activities can have a devastating effect on our marine wildlife by releasing toxins, destroying habitat and creating harmful sediment levels.

I am pleased to be part of a government that is prepared to lead the way on protecting our marine life and coastal environment. No other state or territory has acted so comprehensively to prevent the environmental impact that can result from offshore mining.

Giving the EPA some teeth

The Minns Government has brought in the biggest changes to environment protection rules since the Environment Protection Authority (EPA) was established

a difference.

The Parliament has passed legislation giving the ÊPA stronger powers to deter environmental crimes and respond faster to pollution incidents, giving us the strongest environmental regulations of any state or territory in Australia. This fulfils Labor's election commitment to provide the EPA with teeth.

Legislation Amendment (Stronger Regulation and Penalties) Bill 2024 includes:

 Doubling maximum penalties - the most serious offences will carry penalties of \$10 million for companies and \$2 million for individuals.

• Raising on-the-spot-fines – fines for common environmental offences will more than double nsw-koala-strategy

to \$30,000 for companies and \$15,000 for individuals for a first offence, going up to \$45,000 and \$22,500 respectively for a second offence.

Councils will have authority to issue illegal dumping fines of \$5,000 to companies and \$1,000 to individuals, with higher penalties for dumping in sensitive places like a school, hospital, or national park.

Public Transparency - a 'name and shame' process will issue warnings about poor environmental performers and substandard practices.

Penalties for serious environmental offences had not been raised since 2005 when Labor was last in government.

Grants to reduce food waste and feed those in need

Two new grant programs have been announced to help reduce the tonnes of food that go to waste every year in NSW.

An estimated 70% of food wasted in NSW is still edible, and meanwhile more than 30% of the state's households are experiencing some level of food insecurity.

Through the new Business Food Waste Partnership Grants, businesses, peak industry bodies and councils can apply for grants of up to \$200,00 to reduce food waste and boost recycling.

And food relief organisations can apply for funding of up to \$500,000 to better manage increasing amounts of rescued food and delivery to those in need.

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Pointing the finger at Labor on forests

housands of wonderful people from everywhere gathered around the country this March to march for our precious native forests.

In NSW thousands showed up in Sydney, Lismore, Bellingen, Newcastle and Bega. It was an incredible show of force and determination and the finger was pointed at NSW Labor for radically failing us on forests.

When people hear the truth about what is happening across our incredibly important but small public native forest estate (less than 2% of the area of NSW); that we still allow the industrial logging of our native forests, the response is "How is it still happening?"

The answer is simple, "Because NSW Labor have not yet stopped it." The fact is NSW Labor could end logging our public native forests today, they are choosing not to.

It doesn't matter which way you look at it, the evidence says we should stop logging our public native forests immediately.

Actually, it shows that we should have stopped a long time ago and we should have boots on the ground regenerating them and removing the invasive species that are within them. Every time NSW Labor logs our forests they are driving us further into the extinction crisis. Our precious forests are literally refuges to some of the country's most threatened wildlife that can't and don't live anywhere else.

Every single logging operation is driving them closer to extinction and some of these animals, like Greater Gliders, which require the big hollow old trees, are so close to extinction it's scary.

Every time NSW Labor logs our native forests they are driving us further into the climate crisis. Not only through the releasing of around 3.6 million tonnes of carbon (CO2e) into the atmosphere every year, but destroying the health of our forests reduces their capacity to draw down and store carbon most effectively.

3.6 million tonnes of carbon is equivalent to the annual emissions of 840,000 medium sized cars or four and a half times the annual emissions of domestic aviation in NSW.

If we end native forest logging immediately it would prevent the short-term emissions of 1.8 million tonnes of carbon (CO2e) per year and long-term emissions of around 76 million tonnes of carbon (CO2e) by 2050.

This is a carbon mitigation cost of around \$2.5 billion, based on the current low costs of carbon per tonne.

Every time NSW Labor logs our native forests they make our communities more at risk of dangerous wildfire. The research



has now shown, what so many of us already knew, that logging makes our forests more susceptible to more intense and more frequent wildfires.

Taking timber from forests dramatically changes their structure, dries them out, making them more vulnerable to bushfires and fires that are more likely to burn out of control.

Every time NSW Labor logs our native forests they spend millions of dollars from the public purse. We literally prop up the native hardwood industry every year to the tune of millions, and that's just in losses, it is not including the actual subsidies. It is not lost on me that the day before I rallied and marched with the thousands in Sydney calling on NSW Labor to stop being shit on forests, hundreds of us gathered in the beautiful hand-crafted wooden Tuntable Falls Community Hall to farewell our forest friend Gum.

It was there I once again strengthened a resolve I did not know was possible to strengthen: to end the destructive logging of our precious public forest estate.

Funding secured for rehabilitation of coastal estuaries

have announced funding from the NSW government for the rehabilitation of three key coastal estuaries in the Ballina Electorate, as part of the 2023-24 Coastal and Estuary Grants Management Program.

The projects being funded include:

- The Western foreshore of Lake Ainsworth, Lennox Head – \$321,999 to fund the design, approval and works of a rehabilitation project.
- Cavanbah and Belongil Beach, Byron Bay
 – \$31,559 to restore dunes that have been
 impacted by coastal processes.
- Along Maguires Creek, in Ballina Shire

 \$240,672 to fund restoration of a large stretch of riparian area with high importance to the Richmond River Coastal Zone Management Plan.
 I'm proud to have secured funding for these

three critical restoration projects in the Ballina electorate.

The Greens have long been advocating for



a real plan to protect the environmental and cultural values of Lake Ainsworth, and this funding will support restoration works right across our beautiful lake.

The project also includes building a boardwalk across the western foreshore,

which will protect some of the sensitive areas, as well as provide an opportunity for the community to learn more about the lake's environmental and cultural values.

At Belongil Beach, the dunes will be reshaped and revegetated to stabilise them, and funding to repair the large stretch of riparian area of Maguires Creek is an important step in improving the health of the Richmond River.

The Maguires Creek project has been a top priority for me in parliament. I acknowledge the amazing work of students at Alstonville High School, who have partnered with LandCare groups and organisations like OzFish to lead the charge in protecting Maguire's Creek from degradation and the negative impacts of extreme weather. I'm hopeful this funding will facilitate

I'm hopeful this funding will facilitate even wider involvement from the community in protecting Maguires Creek.

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Extradition looms for Julian Assange

The UK High Court has delayed the extradition of Julian Assange to the US for a further three weeks, requesting the United States give assurances that Assange will be protected by First Amendment free speech rights, that he won't be discriminated against as an Australian citizen, and that he will not face the death penalty.

The High Court judgment said that if those assurances were not given by the United States, leave to appeal will be given to Assange, and there will then be an appeal hearing.

The US will no doubt give the required assurances. They will extradite Assange with High Court approval, and then do what they like.

It seems purely pantomime; the UK High Court washing their hands, Pontius Pilate-like, before dispatching Julian Assange to his US crucifixion. In this current round of the Game of Empires, the US is the hegemon, and the UK is the vassal, and the power relationships dictate that the vassal will comply with the hegemon's requests.

Things are looking very bleak. Extradition looms menacingly near for Julian Assange.

Julian's brother, Gabriel Shipton, commented:

"This morning, I was hoping Julian

would be granted leave to appeal. At worst, I feared he would be extradited before tomorrow morning. Instead, his purgatory continues — but that also means we have another window to increase the pressure on the people who can take decisive action to make a real difference. Right now, that is the Australian Government."

Outside the court, Julian's wife, Stella Assange, addressed supporters:

"Today's decision is astounding. The courts recognise that, Julian is exposed to a flagrant denial of his freedom of expression, and his free speech rights, that he is being discriminated against on the basis of his nationality as an Australian, and that he remains exposed to the death penalty.

"And yet, what the courts have done have been to invite a political intervention from the United States to send a letter saying it's all OK. I find this astounding. Five years into this case, the United States has managed to show the court that their case remains an attack on press freedom, an attack on Julian's life.

"What the courts haven't agreed to look at is the evidence that the United States has plotted to assassinate Julian, to kidnap him, because if it acknowledges that, then of course, he can't be sent to the United States. Julian is a political prisoner. He is a journalist and he is being persecuted because he exposed the true cost of war in human lives. This case is a retribution. It is a signal to all of you, that if you expose the interests that are driving war, they will come after you. They will put you in prison and they will try to kill you.

"Julian is just a few days away from the 5th anniversary of his arrest and imprisonment in Belmarsh prison. He has been in Belmarsh for five years without conviction and the charges against him are to punish him for publishing the truth, for publishing evidence of the war crimes committed by the country that is trying to extradite him.

"Now the UK courts have invited the United States to issue assurances. The Biden administration should not issue assurances they should drop this shameful case that should never have been brought. Julian should never have been imprisoned for a single day. This is a shame on every democracy.

"Julian is a political prisoner. He is a publisher, and he is being punished for expressing his political opinion, for expressing freedom of the press in its purest form. Free Julian! I ask everyone to rally behind him and call for his Freedom. Call for the Biden administration to drop the case, and support House Resolution 934 before the US Congress to drop this case. Thank you. Free Julian!"

Protest over park closure for brumbie cull

On Easter Sunday, an impassioned protest unfolded at Long Plain in the iconic northern end of Kosciuszko National Park.

Hundreds of individuals and horse riders united to voice their vehement opposition against the government's controversial decision to close the park to all recreational users for six months from Thursday 4th April for the aerial culling of the few hundred remaining iconic Australian wild horses in the north of the park.

The area targeted is a longstanding retention zone for wild horses where 3000 horses are supposed to reside under Legislation. But locals say 3000 horses no longer exist.

The demonstration was marked by a spectacular procession of over 100 horse and rider teams descending the hill, amidst the roaring cheers of a huge supportive crowd. This was the largest crowd seen at a protest of this kind in over 70 years.

Protesters, armed with placards condemning the planned brumby slaughter as sadistic, included hundreds



of generational locals and interstate visitors, also demanding the Park be left open as usual for all to enjoy.

Kosciuszko National Park, a region historically inhabited by pastoralist settlers for grazing before its designation as a national park, is argued by locals and visitors alike to benefit from the presence of large herbivores.

These animals play a crucial role in managing the lush undergrowth that poses a significant fire hazard, especially evident in the aftermath of the last devastating Black Summer fire that left the park scattered with ghostly remnants of dead trees and

devoid of wildlife. Deep concerns were expressed over the park's desolate state, highlighted by this unsettling absence of wild horses, wildlife and birds.

Critics of the cull argue that the park, now marred by signs warning of 1080 poison, Snowy Hydro and ski tourism construction activities, and machinery, is being stripped of its natural heritage.

Speakers at the protest underscored the park's importance to all Australians, lamenting the six-month closure's impact on families seeking affordable holidays and opportunities to connect with nature, and the huge economic impact on local towns.

Highlighting the historical symbiosis between humans and horses, from travel and war to agriculture, recreation and companionship, the protesters called for the preservation of the last few hundred brumbies in the retention zone.

This plea is bolstered by the scientific community's interest in the modern

megafauna for conservation and regeneration, and the unique DNA of the brumby, to any other horse population, contradicting claims by the government of a wild horse population posing risks to native flora and fauna.

Local counts and independent aerial surveys indicate a drastically reduced number of horses to only a few hundred, far below the government's estimates of 17,000 to 22,000.

Among the many passionate speakers, locals Leisa Caldwell and protest co-organiser with the Snowy Mountains Bush Users Group, Dick Roberts, outlined the history of the horse and the people who loved and cared for the area for generations before it was gazetted a Park.

In a rallying cry for action, Peter Cochrane, a prominent figure at the protest, declared from horseback, "This is about our freedom!"

The community is calling on the government to immediately cease the cull and re-open Kosciuszko National Park to the public.
