### Landslip victims abandoned

The Community Disaster Action Group (CDAG) has called attention to the severe human cost of the NSW government's lack of action on assistance for people whose properties have been affected by landslips.

The NSW Reconstruction Authority (NSWRA) has completely abandoned people affected by landslips. There's not even a policy 21/2 years on, yet hundreds of landslip-affected residents are still living in damaged homes or caravans or unable to return home," CDAG co-ordinator Chels Hood Withey said.

The group maintain that NSWRA is failing to fulfil its legal obligations under the NSW Reconstruction Authority Act 2022, which explicitly includes landslides in its definition of disasters, and outlines the functions of the Authority which include to "assist in prevention, preparedness, response, recovery and reconstruction in relation to disasters.'

"Despite this legal mandate to assist, people remain without support. There are severe mental health and financial stress impacts on affected families," Ms Withey said.

Among many personal stories are those of Main Arm residents Edward and Vicki Burke, aged 63 and 71, who are living in a caravan beside their

destroyed 200-acre property; and Jesse James of Nimbin, whose application was approved for funding in principle, but he is unable to access it due to legislative oversights.

Ms Withey said, "These stories raise critical questions about government accountability, the human cost of bureaucratic delays, and the broader challenges of climate adaptation in rural Australia.

"While we've heard rumours of a

policy in development, the fact remains that for 30 months, these residents have been left waiting, completely stranded next to their damaged homes."

CDAG is calling for immediate action from NSWRA to fulfil its legal obligations to landslip victims, and provide financial support for all disaster-affected residents, regardless of insurance status.

Michelle Agioritis - secretary, and Rachael Wilhelm treasurer.



Nimbin folk have been patiently waiting, waiting, waiting, for an amenities block to be built in Peace Park.

If ever there was an urgent need for such a facility it's right there: our recreation park in town. The pool was opened in 1978, 46 years ago, with one unisex toilet. No shower, no change-room.

Just one toilet for the hundreds of people who use the pool each season, and all the folk who use the children's playground, the outdoor exercise equipment, the skate park and the busy barbeque area.

This toilet is only available for the six months of the swimming season. For the remainder of the year, there is no toilet for all the users of Peace Park.

Two years ago Nimbin Advisory

Group submitted a plan for a multipurpose facility to the Lismore City Council.

The plan positioned the amenities block on the fence line of the pool with access to it from both the pool and the park. With disabled access, a change room, a shower and three toilets, it would cover most needs. There was no action on this plan.

18 months ago our local State Government Member, Janelle Saffin successfully lobbied for a grant of \$400,000 specifically for the amenities block. This money was allocated to the Council in May 2024.

Ms Saffin said, "The next step will be community consultation on the concept and design, to be undertaken in the second half of this year. The funding agreement has completion of the project by 30th June 2025."

Cliff Chadburn, Assistant Head of Fleet and Outdoor Spaces at Council, has said that a project officer is yet to be appointed.

So we have another swim season starting in September with only one toilet for all the park and pool. Despite Nimbin being advertised as a tourist destination, and with an increasing population, we still don't have a basic facility found in all public parks in NSW.

Let's hope the grant is wisely invested, quietly increasing while we patiently wait. It could increase the grant up by at least \$8000, enough for solar panels for its power needs, or boxes and boxes of toilet paper and paper handtowels.

Meantime I might be practising the art of holding on. It's a bit like standing on one leg!

### **PALESRAEL: Sharing together**

**√**he brutal genocide we are witnessing taking place in Gaza is a wake-up call for humanity. It is also an opportunity in working together towards eliminating all prejudices destroying all life on Earth.

I was brought up in a Yiddish-speaking socialist Jewish Labor Bund community centred in Carlton, Melbourne, who have been questioning the creation of a Jewish Zionist State since the last century.

In 1945, following world war two and the holocaust, the International Jewish Labor Bund were initially against the UN vote on the partitioning of Palestine and re-affirmed its support for a single bi-national state that would guarantee equal national rights for Jews and Arabs alike under the control of superpowers and the UN.

The Six-day war was fought between Israel and a coalition of Arab states, primarily Egypt, Syria, and Jordan, from 5th to 10th June, 1967.

Recent history shows that Egyptian President Abdul Nasser did not start the 1967 war, but that Israel launched a pre-emptive bombing on



Egyptian military airfields. In Melbourne, the Jewish community asked for volunteers to go to Israel to replace civilian jobs while the conscripted population engaged in war.

I discussed this with my Lebanese friends as I wished to see first-hand, and bear witness to what was going on in and around Israel.

I was assigned to work with irrigation at kibbutz Misgav Am on the Lebanese border overlooking the Galilee. See: https://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/ Misgav\_Am

While moving irrigation pipes one day, a formation of fighter planes flew over me and bombed the Golan Heights. The next day the kibbutz organised to check out the bombed-out villages. An area was cordoned off. Body parts

were being gathered up.

At one bombed-out site, I was drawn to some photographs blowing around where a once-thriving family lived. I left the kibbutz soon after to further explore, observe, sketch and paint.

I dropped in on an artist colony for inspiration along the way. I eventually based myself near the old city of Jerusalem observing the community in this historic centre to three Abrahamic religions. I built up an extensive collection of art which ended up being exhibited in Melbourne.

On my second visit, I went to Israel to attend a meditation retreat with my Insight meditation teacher Christopher Titmuss (pictured).

After the retreat, I sought out allies to paint a PALESRAEL design for both sides of the Jerusalem/ Bethlehem separation wall, which I had designed at my studio in Nimbin.

I successfully painted on the Bethlehem side of the wall, but was stopped by the IDF on the Jerusalem side. Palestinians I had made friends with introduced me to some city elders. I took on the role of a human shield to guard a family in East Jerusalem against raiding Israeli forces.

I have come to the conclusion that the best way forward to a lasting peace, to end the apartheid and the destruction of communities, is to take down the separation walls, to confederate as one nation, with equal rights and opportunities for all.

The one-state solution is a proposed approach to resolving the Israel-Palestinian conflict, according to which one state would be established between the River Jordan and the Mediterranean.


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### Looking for a good read for a good cause?

# Death threats for McBride in gaol

David McBride (pictured), whistleblower in the Australian Defence Force (ADF) who did two tours to Afghanistan as a lawyer, was found guilty in the Supreme Court of stealing commonwealth property and leaking it to journalists, which he did.

He thought he would be protected by whistleblower laws that allow you to share documents to the media, once he had exhausted all other avenues of complaint, which he had.

Eddie Lloyd, lawyer for David McBride said, "David maintained that these documents show unlawful conduct on behalf of the leadership. So he went to the ADF to report the crimes.

"They said... 'nothing to see here'. He went internally, again, "nothing to see here'.



Everyone just gaslit him, sent him to a psychologist and then they ended up charging him."

The trial started on 13th October 2023 and he was sentenced to five years and eight months on 14th May 2024. In his eight weeks of imprisonment he has been held in isolation, and is now segregated in the maximum security area.

Ms Lloyd said, "David McBride hasn't done anything wrong while he was staying in a minimum security area of the gaol. He was stood over

and issued a death threat. So the gaol moved him from there to maximum security where he received another death threat. So the gaol moved him into isolation.

"He has now only one hour a day out of his cell. Before, he was using the gym daily, had contact with his family through the internet and contact with other prisoners. So he has no contact with anyone. This is the punishment he receives for getting death threats in gaol.

"It's cruel and inhumane punishment. I do whatever I can talking to people, escalating the situation to the Commissioner level now to ensure that they comply with the Correction Act, that he is housed somewhere in the least restrictive place in the gaol, given his minimum classification. There is also the Human Rights Act and International Law they are


We are lodging an appeal. I've got two amazing barristers briefed to junior counsel and senior counsel briefed. We are still waiting for security clearance to touch the paper with the classified information."

Senator David Shoebridge has asked the government for a pardon for McBride. So far the government has spent \$2.5 million on the prosecution, and the defence is fighting without any funds.

#### Disaster readiness

As we slowly move from recovery into the preparation phase of disaster management, now is a great time to develop or review our own personal flood and bushfire plans.

It is important to consider such issues as what to take in case of evacuation and evacuation routes in case of emergency.

Now is also a good time to clean up our properties and reduce fuel loads, e.g., sweep up and compost leaves, pick up sticks, prune trees overhanging our homes and driveways, keep gutters clear

Back up your key documents (e.g. medical, insurance) onto e.g. external hard drives or USB pegs so they are easy to take with you or in case they get damaged/ destroyed in a disaster.

#### **AIDER**

The Assist Infirm, Disabled and Elderly Residents program is a free, oneoff service which supports some of our most at-risk community members, by providing services such as clearing gutters, thinning vegetation around the home, removing leaf and tree debris, trimming branches from close to the home or mowing or slashing long grass.

magine if no-one had stepped up to save the last remaining forests of the Big Scrub. There would be no Nightcap National Park.

Imagine if no-one had stood against the coal seam drilling at Bentley – we would now be living in the Northern Rivers Gas Field and dealing with 'fugitive emissions' and 'natural venting', seeping, leaching, insidiously releasing methane into the atmosphere, endangering the health of people, the wildlife, and that of the planet. Methane is a worse greenhouse gas than carbon dioxide, though the focus seems to be on the latter.

Imagine if no-one was defending the Wallum at Brunswick Heads, it would already be bulldozers, dump trucks, solid fill, curb and channelling. 76 ancient scribbly gum trees would be gone and many other threatened plant and animal species even more threatened in this fragile coastal wallum heathland.

Sorry glossy black cockatoos, sorry Wallum froglet, sorry wildflowers. There is only 1% of this ecologically important ecosystem left in the Byron Shire. The rest is already under luxury homes.

The Wallum defenders have achieved a temporary stay of execution with a federal court interlocutory injunction and the matter is currently under review. With bare blocks on sale for around \$700,000, this development has been modified to accommodate some

ecological needs but significant trees are still under threat.

Where and when do we draw the line? When there's nothing left? What will we tell the children?

#### Logging native forests

Logging continues in the NSW State Forests. Forestry Corporation of NSW are making sure they suck every last splinter they can out of the state forests before they are protected by the establishment of the Great Koala National Park. This promised park encompasses existing National Parks and adds 175,000 hectares of state forests.

While logging has ceased in several key koala hubs in the GKNP, there is important glider habitat in many other areas that are still being logged.

Greater gliders, another endangered species, are dependent on having access to numerous hollows for their survival as they like to move around and don't always sleep in the same spot. Forest defenders and citizen scientists are busy observing and recording locations of glider dens as Forestry Corp struggle to find them during their own surveys.

Glider habitat trees require a 50-metre exclusion zone, but evidence shows that this doesn't always happen during the timber harvesting.

Despite racking up over \$1 million in fines and criminal convictions over the past five years, Forestry Corp continue to flaunt

the rules.

Members of the Southeast Forest Rescue community group recently alerted the EPA to more breaches of the code and illegal logging

carried out in the Styx River State Forest in areas where glider dens had been located and recorded. Where is our park, Chris Minns?

#### **Nimbin Nesting Box Project**

Projects like the Nimbin Nesting Box Project, funded by the Wires National Grant Program, attempt to redress the issue of lack of hollows in settled areas. The Nimbin valleys have been logged, farmed and grazed for generations, and only a few old growth trees remain in fragmented pockets.

While many landholders these days are planting trees, it will take 100 years or more before suitable hollows develop in them.

Through the nesting box project, NEC and WildBnb have installed 31 boxes across 16 properties stretching from Whian Whian to Mt Burrell.

These locations have provided excellent connectivity for wildlife across a wide area centred on Nimbin. The new boxes will provide critical breeding sites and homes for hollow dependent species such as owls, cockatoos, parrots, possums, gliders and microbats.

The boxes will be monitored in Spring to check the level of occupancy.

#### Together we are strong

NEC supports and is involved in a range of causes from on-ground bush regeneration projects to hands-on citizen science and protests as well as helping effect change at a social and political level.

### Jabiluka mining lease will not be renewed, merged into Kakadu

Prime Minister Anthony Albanese has announced that the Northern Territory's controversial Jabiluka uranium mining lease will not be renewed and will be absorbed into Kakadu National Park.

In a major win for the Mirarr traditional owners that shields them from any future expanded uranium mining, Mr Albanese says that the federal government will begin the process of permanently

protecting the site as a final tribute to outgoing Indigenous Affairs Minister Linda Burney. Mr Albanese says it, "means there will never be mining at Jabiluka".

The NT government said that it had taken federal government advice and rejected an application for a 10-year renewal of the mineral lease for the Jabiluka site, which has never been mined or developed by its holder, the majority Rio Tinto-owned Energy Resources Australia (ERA).

Many north coast locals in the late 1990s joined a blockade by the Mirarr traditional owners alongside rock bands including Midnight Oil, Regurgitator and Coloured Stone, and the fight over the uranium mine has been a long-running saga.



"We have always said no to this mine; government and mining companies told us they would mine it but we stayed strong and said no. Today I feel very happy that Jabiluka will be safe forever. Protecting country is very important for my family and for me," Mirarr

Senior Traditional Owner Yvonne Margarula (pictured, above) said.

ERA has held a lease over the Jabiluka site – one of the world's largest and richest uranium deposits – for 42 years. The lease has long been a contentious proposal, staunchly opposed by the Mirarr and various environmental groups.

Australian Conservation Foundation nuclear-free campaigner Dave Sweeney said he was stunned by the decision. "It was a genuine and welcome surprise and it was really a positive piece of news to hear," he said. The ACF wants to see ERA now focus on its rehabilitation of the massive Ranger Uranium Mine at Jabiru after concluding production in January 2021.



CEO of the Gundjeihmi Aboriginal Corporation Thalia van den Boogard said the rehab project was crucial. "Mirarr are very concerned that ERA has been in serious financial decline for the past 18 months. Focus now needs to be put on the rehabilitation of the nearby former Ranger uranium mine.

"It is up to the mining company and the Commonwealth Government to ensure that site is fully rehabilitated so it can be safely returned to the Mirarr and included in the national park," she said.

The land will be released from the mining lease on 11th August.

China, which most deem a communist regime ('swipe left'), actually embodies all the attributes of a fascist



state. So does North Korea. Russia and the one party state of Saudi Arabia, Iran, Cuba, and Myanmar all come a close second.

### Finally! A solar battery rebate for NSW

The NSW Government has announced a new initiative to lower the cost of batteries for homeowners and small businesses. The goal of this scheme is to reduce peak electricity demand in NSW.

By promoting the use of batteries throughout the state, the initiative aims to make the grid more reliable and stable while also decreasing reliance on fossil fuels during peak demand periods.

Here is what we know so far:

The subsidy is being offered as part of the ongoing NSW Peak Demand Reduction Scheme. This scheme has been running since 2022 and aims to improve the efficiency of hot water, air conditioning, pool pumps, and now solar batteries across NSW.

Batteries have been out of reach for

most people, but with this subsidy finally, they will be more affordable. If eligible for the subsidy, the cost of adding batteries will likely be reduced by between \$1600 and \$2400.

To be eligible you must:

- Have an existing solar PV system or install solar PV with the battery
- · Not already have batteries installed
- Install a battery from 2kWh to 28kWh Additionally, the scheme gives incentives to connect your existing or new battery to a virtual power plant, the NSW Government will give you between \$250 and \$400, and this payment can be claimed a second time three years on.

The scheme starts on 1st November. We expect a rush on batteries to come in November, so Nickel Energy are accepting pre-orders which will put you at the front of the queue.

Just like when you install a new solar PV installation, we will claim the subsidy for you and reduce your installation costs

As with any government initiative, there are a number of rules and regulations that need to be adhered to when claiming the subsidies, and there is still some uncertainty around exactly how the scheme is going to work.

At this stage, not all battery models or solar PV installation companies will be able to claim these subsidies.

Nickel Energy has been keeping a close eye on developments since the announcement of the scheme and are keeping up to date with new information as it comes to hand.

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### Secret India comes to Nimbin

"What is the truth behind the fitful hints which reach us intimating that there exists in India an old wisdom that promises the most extraordinary development of mental powers to those who practise it?" asked Paul Brunton in A Search in Secret India.

Since my own glimpse at something beyond our physical reality, I have had a wish to find out more about all spiritual traditions. This wish took me to India with the hope that I could bring back some of the wisdom and practices to the people who come to Flourish Sanctuary, Nimbin.

What I have written here is my first attempt to share the experience. It is a heavily abridged recounting, skipping countless incredible experiences and encounters with amazing people.

It all began with a serendipitous meeting with a swami called Parambodhi at Flourish Sanctuary. After becoming a regular supporter and attendee of the Satsangs I run at Flourish, Swami Parambodhi offered to take me on a pilgrimage in India.

Despite still being on crutches, I was too excited by the offer to wait until my leg got better to go.

After a 15-hour flight I landed in New Delhi and met up with Swami Parambodhi, where a cacophony of hundreds of taxis was waiting to greet me and thousands of other travellers the moment



they stepped out of the airport.

Our first destination was the home of Swami Ved Prakash, a retired Vipassana teacher. Swami Ved Prakash shared with me some profound practices that immediately deepened my meditation.

We also delved into a thought-provoking discussion about why joy is important for meditation, emphasising that true joy is essential to obtain the full benefits of the practice.

Two days later, we travelled to Haryana to stay with Swami Pratik. From his residence, we embarked on a trek into the jungle to meet three sadhus and a baba.

A sadhu is a Hindu ascetic who renounces worldly life for self-realisation, while a baba is a revered spiritual leader, often providing blessings to their followers.

The baba promised to reveal to me the secrets of the universe if I stayed the night, but our commitments elsewhere combined with a sense of looming danger meant I left before the sunset and so these secrets remained unknown to me, still I learnt many interesting things before leaving.

On our way back, a violent storm hit, and we found ourselves driving over fallen power lines, a testament to the unpredictable nature of our travel in India. Maybe this is what I sensed?

The next day our travels then took us to Sangrur, where we stayed with Joga Singh, awaiting the arrival of Baba Ji.

After a night of rest, Baba Ji invited us to run a Satsang for three generations of a family in Samana. This Satsang covered a wide array of fascinating topics, including the true nature of existence and the paramount importance of love.

This wasn't that different to what I do on Sunday afternoons in Nimbin.

The next day, we joined in chanting and Kirtan at a Gurdwara, a sacred Sikh place of worship.

Following this, we accompanied Baba Ji on his rounds, first visiting a stable of horses, then offering blessings to a newborn baby at a hospital, and finally stopping by a local business flourishing under Baba Ji's guidance.

In a gesture of deep respect and honour, Baba Ji presented me with a white robe, shawl

Our farewell to Baba Ji included a pivotal conversation, arranging for him to visit Flourish Sanctuary in 2025. We then drove to Osho Gram, arriving just in time for evening meditation.

The next day, I conducted an intimate Satsang on profound topics such as the afterlife, overcoming grief, and living a meaningful life.

Our final destination was Manikaran, where we met Mehul, an Osho devotee. I compared spiritual understandings with Mehul and enjoyed his company before we headed back to the airport in Delhi.

This condensed version of my travels to India captures but a fraction of the richness and depth of the experiences and wisdom gained.

I am excited to be back and running meditations, Satsangs and more. I am happy to see upon my return that Nimbin is the same special place that I left behind.

It is my heartfelt hope that the connections made, spiritual teachings received, and many incredible experiences will all contribute to the offerings at Flourish Sanctuary and permeate out to Nimbin and then the world spreading peace and happiness.

A big thanks to Parambodhi for his unwavering support and companionship throughout this journey, making each step, despite the crutches, a great spiritual leap for me.

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
