Mulgum Victory



To all the wonderful wellwishers and sympathisers who have shown their support of the residents of Mulgum House, we have some good news to report. It has come at the end of twelve months of harassment, neglect and abuse and means we can now set about the serious business of asserting our rights without fear of retribution and humiliation.

On Friday July 8th (the last meeting of the Tribunal which was hearing our application to have the eviction notices cancelled), the Management asked to withdraw. An agreement was reached. The eviction order would be cancelled and we would withdraw the application.

The Tribunal issued its consent orders to this effect, - adding two more: (1) That the Management will write a letter to each resident, withdrawing the Notice to Quit and apologising for the inconvenience, and (2) That the Residents' Association and the management will enter into negotiations about the future provision of services.

So that's how it stands at the moment. The Tribunal has spoken. Now we must wait to see if the Management has listened.

Good doctor

I am writing on behalf of the staff of Nimbin Medical Centre to clarify some misleading statements in the article "The Hospital with no Doctors" in The Nimbin Good Times July 2005.

I myself worked the afternoon of Thursday 16th June and my co-worker Dr Oscar Serrallach returned to work at the hospital on Sunday night and the medical centre on Monday 20th June.

We also wanted to highlight that this is the only weekend when there was no doctor at the hospital, as we were both attending a GP function representing Nimbin, and although Dr Dan Oxlee has gone for a time, we have another Dr Dan (van Dyke) already started at the hospital and is soon to join us at the medical centre.

We share in Amanda's and the community's distress in the difficulty in immediately accessing a doctor, and if your child is unwell this can be heightened, but rest assured that if it was an acute or environmental protectors, health emergency it would have been attended to by our nursing staff, who are trained to give medications in life threatening situations.

The fact that she wanted a script filled highlights the need for some awareness and forethought on the part of our clients in this time of shortage, so think ahead if you can, as our waiting time is currently 3 weeks. We are all trying very hard to keep up acceptable access and are thinking of developing dayonly access schemes to help.

I also think we should be appreciative of the service we have available. Rural centres our size often don't have doctors, let alone a hospital service and there needs to be some recognition of this.

We as a community could also be proud of the complementary and functional medicine practice we are fast becoming, and not feel like our efforts are being ignored.

This reflects the creativity and abundance of this area and the people it attracts. It is time to remind ourselves of our role in Nimbin as pioneers in the grander scheme of things and be patient with ourselves and each other.


