Council Jottings . . .

December meeting:

As predicted, the last Council meeting of 2006 was lively and 5 1/2 hours long as we dealt with a wide variety of issues prior to the holiday break. Individual Councillors proposed seven motions ranging from investigating shade cover at the Memorial Baths (Carried), enhancing the entries to Lismore (Carried), a Heritage study for Eltham (Lost), extending water conservation measures to other Councils (Lost) and opposing a nuclear power plant (Lost).

Film:

I had success with a motion to approve the public screening of 'A Place in the Sun', a promotional film on Lismore, made in 1979 by 5 local filmmakers and considered lost for the past 13 years. After commissioning the film, the Council of the day resolved in May 1979, that it be screened at the Centenary Gymkhana in June of that year but the screening did not eventuate. Councillors and the Town Clerk have told me that they became concerned that the film was 'too hippie' and so resolved never to screen it. Interestingly they also resolved not to record that

Many long-term residents will recall that 1979 was a time of great change in our community. The organisers of The Channon Markets were seeking support from Council, there was growing interest in Multiple Occupancy developments and the application to log Terania Creek Basin was

being considered. ABC TV has transferred the 16mm film to DVD and it is hoped that the Richmond River Historical Society who have held the film for the past 13 years, will hold a public screening to expand the number of in the coming months



and we will all have the opportunity to see what all the fuss was about.

Climate Change:

My second motion was not so successful. Samlara Canin-Henkel, aged 14, wrote to Council requesting that we sign the Kyoto Protocol and asking for the opportunity to address Council. My motion was that Council write to the Federal Government requesting that it ratify and implement the KP and that Council undertakes a campaign to promote our own progress towards reducing greenhouse gas emissions through our participation in the Cities for Climate Protection program. The second part of my motion was accepted but unfortunately some of my fellow Councillors regarded the first part as too political and two even denied that global warming is an issue. Samlara spoke very well and is to be applauded for her initiative. One can only hope that she continues her efforts despite this setback.

Major Works:

The December meeting also agreed to the process towards the design and construction of the Goonellabah Recreation Centre. The \$12.5 million GRC will comprise 2 courts, youth activity space, gymnasium and leisure water (all indoors) and a skate park with room HAPPY NEW YEAR. courts. Council is currently lismore.nsw.gov.au



working with 2 preferred tenderers.

Also on the drawing board is a Regional Gallery and Exhibition Centre. Council has committed \$6 million and will aim to match this amount from external grants and other sources. I had argued that the Museum be including in the multi-storey complex but Council resolved to support it at its current location in Molesworth St.

Council also gave inprinciple support to a \$41 million Major Capital Works Schedule for the next 5 years and another similar amount for the following 5-year period. The plan will be advertised for community comment.

Other:

- The Council is in the process of assessing the management model for the Memorial Baths as it continues to lose over \$1000 every day of the year. The large pool will be closed June-August but the opening hours will be made more flexible as demand fluctuates. Council will also investigate solar heating.
- Rural areas that currently have a waste collection service will be offered a recycling collection (fee \$20)
