
Elspeth Jones - a Life in Art - an Artful Life Nimbin Central School - Girls' Artwork



isn't fussed about a name for her exhibition at the Nimbin Regional Gallery. "Think of it as an archeological dig," she said. "It's not a retrospective," she said. "It's more like a diary." Her large collection of artworks from high school and art school to the present are displayed on walls, on tables, in workbooks, and pegged to the clotheslines that dissect the space. "It's like I'm hanging out my dirty laundry, and I suppose I am," Elspeth said. There are works in oil, acrylic, watercolour, chalk, but the predominant medium is charcoal, utilising wide range of styles and ubjects - family portraits, ife drawing, landscapes, poster art – which represent people, places and events which have been important in her life. 'My mother collected everything, I mean literally everything that I did, so when she died I inherited it all back, and it's been sitting waiting for me to work out what I'm going to do with it," Elspeth said. "Well this is it." These days Elspeth is considered a 'public artist' who, working mostly on a commission basis, has painted huge murals throughout the area, including the Evans Head Post Office. In 1993 she helped create the Nimbin Museum, winner of the 1999 Culture and Heritage Award, and today her work appears on shopfronts and walls, in private houses, on banners, flags, posters, websites, tshirts and even vehicles,

Looking out at Blue Knob

'Looking Out - Looking In' is Blue Knob Hall Gallery's latest exhibition. Fifteen local and regional artists have included works that have been inspired by our beautiful rainbow region and beyond.

The strong theme of this exhibition is based on the artists' experiences of special times, special places and special people.

The sleeping giant of Mount Warning dominates Robert Jackson's views from home, and so his oil paintings show the mountain from several aspects. Shirley Miller has spent much time painting out in the deserts of Australia and so her gouache 'Rock

Springs is a strong reminder of her special time out there.

Adrian Ward's carved camphor laurel bust of 'Ken', a local Nimbin identity and ex-Vietnam veteran who died earlier this year, is a beautiful tribute to a very special person. Warwick Saxby's exquisite Australian White Beech 'The Cube' is a clever literal translation of the title of this show.


