Centrelink clarification

Following a recent item in your paper titled, 'There are benefits to being over 55', I'd like to clarify some points regarding concession cards.

Centrelink issues three concession cards, the Pensioner Concession Card, the Commonwealth Seniors Health Card and the Health Care Card.

The Pensioner Concession Card is automatically issued to all pensioners, people receiving Mature Age Allowance, Mature Age Partners Allowance and Carer Payment, and to Newstart Allowance and Youth Allowance customers who are single and have a dependent child; or who have been assessed as having a partial capacity to work. It is also issued to people over 60 years of age who have been continuously receiving certain other payments for more than nine months.

The Pensioner Concession Card entitles holders to extra concessions. These may vary from State to State and include reductions in property and water rates, reductions in gas and electricity bills, reduced fares on public transport, reductions in motor vehicle registration and one or more free rail journeys within the State each year.

The Commonwealth Seniors Health Card is issued to people of Age Pension age who don't qualify for the pension. You can have an annual income up to \$50,000 for singles, \$80,000 for couples, and up to \$100,000 for illness separated couples. You must be an Australian citizen living in Australia and you can apply for the card

Grants Program (CSGP).

Children and relevant Police checks.

separately, there is no need to claim a pension.

The Health Care Card is issued to people receiving most other Centrelink payments, including Newstart Allowance, Special Benefit, Sickness Allowance, Partner Allowance and certain Youth Allowance recipients. Lowincome earners whose income is less than \$3,432 for singles and less than \$5,984 for couples plus \$272 for each dependent child may also apply for a Health Care Card. Income is assessed over a 8 weekly assessment period and if eligible the card is issued for six months. The card is also available to foster carers under certain conditions, and from 1st October 2007 former holders of the Carer Allowance Health Care Card who are aged 16-25 and who are full time students may also be eligible.

Pharmaceutical concessions are available with the Health Care Card and limited concessions for household. educational, recreational and transport may also be available. If you believe you are entitled to a concession you should enquire directly with the relevant organisation.

Nimbin Community Aged Care Packages

by Helen Simpson

Community Support packages are available to help older people remain in their own homes preserving their independence.

Nimbin Community Health are now offering Community Aged Care Packages (CACPs) which are planned and coordinated packages of care to help older people remain living in their own homes.

They are subsidised by the Commonwealth Government to provide for the complex needs of older people. For people on the maximum basic rate of the aged pension fees will not exceed 17.5% of that pension and are negotiable with the CACP Coordinator at Nimbin. It can include up to a 7 day per week service if necessary. Community Aged Care Packages may be an alternative to an aged care facility and can alleviate some of the stress

and anguish associated with caring and being cared for. They are designed to be very flexible and to provide a variety of services by trained assistants in nursing, coordinated by a registered nurse and in contact with that nurse if a medical problem arises. These services include:-

- · Personal care bathing, showering dressing
- Housework and laundry
- Transport, outings
- Meal preparation
- Shopping
- Social supports • Respite Care
- Monitoring of

medications. A care plan will be developed outlining the services to be received and a copy is kept at the recipient's home. We try to maintain consistency with staff so that confidence and trust can be developed. To receive a CACP, an assessment by the Aged Care Assessment Team

is required to determine

if a CACPs can meet the person's needs.

People receiving the service have the right to:

- · Qualified competent staff
- Have respect for their values, religion and convictions
- Fair treatment regardless of race, nationality, sex, disabilities
- + Seek information and advice from other sources
- Make complaints about service delivery
- Absolute confidentiality
- Refuse the presence of people not directly involved in their care.

Once approved, the CACP Coordinator for Nimbin Health will be in contact, to arrange a visit to discuss needs and type of care required. Applications for an ACAT assessment can be made directly through ACAT, based in Ballina 6620-6290 or

McLeans Ridges

The Mayor surprisingly moved a Mayoral Minute at the September meeting to progress rezoning applications for two proposals in McLeans Ridges. A Mayoral Minute is a mechanism for Council to debate an urgent matter that has arisen since the production of the Agenda.

Fortunately, a majority of Councillors were able to persuade the Mayor that there was no urgency and that a perception of undue haste could send the wrong message to residents. The Mayor withdrew the Motion and the matter continues to raise considerable debate in the McLeans Ridges community.

In recent times the residents of North Lismore have also challenged Council to present a vision for their community. It is apparent that Council's community consultation processes need a thorough review. As a start, I am proposing that Council engages a consultant to work with the McLeans Ridges community to develop a vision for future development and identify the necessary infrastructure and facilities that will be needed to support the new and existing residents in years to come.

Lantern Parade

As anyone who attended this year's Lantern Parade will know, wet weather put a severe dampener on the event and kept crowds down. As a result, the donations did not cover outgoing costs so, at its September meeting, Council agreed to advance the organisers the \$15,000 that had been approved in the budget for next year's event. LightnUp is heavily engaged in raising revenue by providing expertise to similar events in other cities so there is confidence



that the advance will be recouped well before the 2008 Lismore Lantern Parade.

Budget

Competing demands always result in some budget requests being unmet. At its June budget meeting, Council had requested staff to prepare a report on how several outstanding projects could be funded -water, energy and climate change initiatives, a trial Lismore library Sunday opening and the appointment of a Cultural Development Officer.

Unfortunately the report that came back was an explanation why these projects could not be funded. After much debate, staff were again requested to prepare the report on how these projects could proceed.

Nimbin Road Realignment

In order to progress the construction of a new Blakebrook Bridge, there was a need to realign the road and so Council has approved the purchase of some additional land and sold another piece to adjoining landholders.

SK8 Park

I attended the community forum on September 20 and was impressed by the level of support given for the completion of the current noise reduction works. While residents spoke enthusiastically for the facility, they were mindful of the potential disturbance to neighbours.

There is certainly no guarantee that completion of the attenuation measures will lead to the desired compliance, but being so far along the track the community agreed, as did Councillors at a workshop held in August, to at least finish the job and find out.

Fun and Film

On a personal note, Ron and I had a great time at the recent Blue Moon Ball and look forward to the Autumn Arts Festival. Nimbin certainly turns on some great events.

Should any of you want to see a glimpse of Nimbin in the 70's, I'd urge you to be at Star Court Theatre in Lismore on 5th October at 7.30 pm for the screening of 'A Place in the Sun' and 'Give trees a Chance'.

These two fantastic film were made by North Country Flix in 1979 and are being shown as a fundraiser for the Richmond River Historical society. Tickets are \$10 each.

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Don't mention the Nazis!

ft-times lately I have been giving some thought to the similarities between the ways of our (Western) nations and that of the Nazis on their rise to power in Germany in the 1920's and 1930's.

But before you, dear reader, get all upset and accuse me of being trivial, I'll confess that the Nazis in their final solution mode had nothing on us, at least not yet. But I can't help thinking of how delicate and fragile our freedom and rule of law is, and how easily it is all slipping away under the pretence of the so called "war on terror".

Also ever-present in my mind these days, more than ever, is George Orwell's masterpiece 1984, which was compulsory in English way back in my high school days and should be so today if it is not.

- An obsession with material wealth to the exclusion of other considerations such as social equity, the environment and the arts.
- A kind of pathological extraversion by which introspection is stifled, and scapegoats sought (projecting the dark side which is within each person)
- Propaganda used by the government way beyond that previously brought to bear, and the crushing of all opposition, aided by the acquiescence of the media.
- Surveillance to the max - cameras and date collection everywhere you go and exponentially increasing. Go shopping in Sydney for a day and you will be photographed over a hundred times.
- Beating up on minorities like refugees, Indigenous inhabitants, Muslims, the unemployed.
- Creating divisions in society using arbitrarily derived "values" of distinction, rather than universal values.
- Constantly shifting of the debate, changing the subject, redefining the language and repeating the spin ad nauseum.
- · Outsourcing of

responsibility through privatisation and sub-subsub contracting. Equine flu possibly, Wheat Board bribes, pathetic FEMA Katrina response, Halliburton mercenaries run amok in Iraq.

• Radical "reform" by so called Conservatives running rampage like a Blitzkrieg -Shock and Awe economically as much as militarily. What Naomi Klein has called Disaster Capitalism.

nd a few noteworthy facts Ato consider:


- George Bush's grandfather profited from his involvement with the financial backers of the Nazis on their rise to power, up until 1942, when forced to withdraw by

Reclaim the night

Hello, my name is Sally and I will be writing the column for the Nimbin Safe Community Project for the next little while. I have been a member of the Nimbin Domestic Violence Committee for four years now and I sit on the Steering Committee of the Nimbin Safe Community Project.

n the last Friday in October women all over the world take to the streets to celebrate their strength and to draw attention to that most basic human right, the right to live our lives in safety and free from violence.

It's called Reclaim the Night and this year the Nimbin Safe Community Project is organising a Reclaim the Night march in Nimbin and would like to invite women from Nimbin and the surrounding area to take to the streets, to bang their drums and blow their whistles and advocate for their right to live in a world free of violence.

Reclaim the Night was started by Italian women in Rome in 1976 as a reaction to the increase of sexual assaults in that town and the lack of response to the crimes by the authorities.

Later in the UK, there was a notorious rapist at large known as the Yorkshire Ripper and women were warned not to dress provocatively or walk alone at night. Women felt that society was blaming them for the sexual assaults rather than placing the blame on the rapist, and they began Reclaim the Night marches to proclaim the right to dress however they pleased and the right to walk the streets at night.

Today sexual assault is just as prevalent in our communities. Young women in particular seem to be

targeted often via drink spiking which has happened in Nimbin and continues in towns along the coast, particularly those that have a high number of young female tourists coming to town.

And it would seem that women are still getting blamed for their behaviour, as we saw in the terrible response from those called to give evidence at the Diane Brimble inquest over the last year.

The statistics around sexual assault are shocking, with one in four women and one in seven men being sexually assaulted by the time they

are 18. Only 10% of sexual assaults are reported and only 5% of those reports ever make it to court. These statistics show that sexual assault is still a hidden crime with victims feeling shame, fear of reporting the crime and difficulty in confiding to

Given this, it is good to know that there is a specialist service available for victims of sexual assault. The Richmond Sexual Assault Service is a locally-based 24-hour service that assists victims of sexual assault at a time when they are feeling most traumatised. They can assist victims to contact the police if that is what they want to do, they also provide a counselling service to assist sexual assault victims to deal with the trauma of the sexual assault. The Sexual Assault Service offers counselling in a non-judgemental, supportive environment. They can be contacted on 6620-2970.

The Nimbin Reclaim the Night march will be held on Friday 26th October with women gathering at the Nimbin Police Station at 6pm and marching through town to Allsopp Park. Bring along your noisemakers. Whilst we are marching to draw attention to a serious issue, we always come together in an atmosphere of joy, celebration and solidarity.

Traditionally men who want to support women and make a stand against violence against women come along to clap and cheer the women from the sidelines as we march through town. We encourage Nimbin men to line the route and support the women marching in this

Commonsense next asks the question:- "Where is life heading?"

Well, I don't know: and I think nobody can tell us. Religions would give us high sounding phrases, but can they predict which life forms will next dominate Earth? And that's the level of prediction we would need. Science has begun understanding Earth's complexities but is not yet much use as a predictor. So any guesswork falls to you and me.

But hang on! Do we need to know where we're heading? Our lives are
