Entry to the exhibition by the public is free of charge, though donations are welcome. Vote for the people's choice prize for the chosen artist to receive \$100.



The exhibition "Antarctica" is showing at the Lismore Regional Gallery.

It consists of wonderful landscape photos by Angus McDonald and the late Frank Hurley.

Angus McDonald (*pictured*) recently travelled to Antarctica as an exhibition artist for a month at the invitation of the Mawson's Huts Foundation, which was formed to "conserve in perpetuity for the Australian people, the unique historical buildings, known as Mawson's Huts, base for one of the most significant expeditions in Antarctic history."

The colour photographs present McDonald's experience of the extreme and spectacular landscapes he encountered. These images are shown alongside the memorable and iconic black and white photographs of Frank Hurley, who was the official photographer for Sir Douglas Mawson's Australasian Antarctic Expeditions between 1911 and 1913.

Angus McDonald states in his exhibition, "Nothing I've ever seen can compare to the arresting hard-edged beauty that Antarctica presents. It is pure there, but also fearful and very very still. The essence of Antarctica for me lies in its astonishing scale.... nothing can compare with the extraordinary power that exists in this astonishing place."

The exhibition continues until 13th October and is well worth a visit.

It was a weekend of high drama, laughter and tears, but most of all. an extraordinary range of contemporary poetry, delivered live in polished performances.

Nimbin's 5th annual Performance Poetry World Cup went off without a hitch, which was a credit to the organisers. Jane Treasure, who described her role as 'dogsbody' said, "It worked so well, there was quality right from the beginning."

Judging panels distributed wry observations, salient andvice and encouragement, as well as \$50 consolations prizes, as the competitors were whittled down through the heats from 40 to the final eight.

The Sunday night final was a tour de force of the poetic arts, with each eight-minute piece finely honed, and timed almost to perfection.

After due consideration by the three judges, Tug Dumbly was declared the winner, with Tessa Leon taking out the \$500 People's Choice Award.

Tug Dumbly received the \$2000 prizemoney, as well as the very shiny Cup. "I'm thrilled and it's a buzz," he said.

"This is the first cup I've ever won, for anything. I'm going to fill it with champagne.'

Though a frequent performer at festivals around Australia, it was Tug's first visit to Nimbin, and he was suitably impressed. "It's a beautiful village, with great accomodation, generous folks, I was visited by wallabies galore," he said.

Organiser Gail M. Clarke thanked all the local businesses that had supported the event. "We couldn't have done it without them," she said.

The Cup winner returns the following year to be a judge, "I'm looking forward to it," said Tug.














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
