Art blossoms after Japan visit

You may have seen local artist Rikki Fisher (pictured) in the streets of Nimbin with paint brush in hand, capturing a slice of nature on canvas. Often you would find her working on a masterpiece on a Saturday in Rainbow Lane.

"Taking your art to the streets, you get a lot of comments from people", she says. "One recurring comment has been, 'I wish I could draw,' to which I reply "You can."

Rikki Fisher insists anyone can draw, that is, provided you have the desire to learn.

Rikki's theory came from her experience of learning to play a musical instrument as an adult. She says, "As an adult I wanted to learn to play a musical instrument, so I overcame the hurdle'I can't do this' and booked myself into some private classes. My teacher took me back to the basics and taught me to read music and I chose an instrument, a Bass Recorder.

"I've never looked back, I had a hunch learning to draw could work the same way."



Rikki put her theory to the test by offering adult 'Absolute Beginners' drawing classes while living in Melbourne. The results were very encouraging, with students amazed at what they could achieve and coming back for more lessons.

Rikki says, "I teach skills of observation and drawing techniques. A lot of the skill is learning to really 'see'. We often make assumptions about what we see and we draw that, rather than what is in front of us.

"I also teach techniques; tools for the drawing toolbox to set you on your way. I get a lot of pleasure in sharing information and seeing people get excited about what they can do."

Rikki is starting 'Absolute Beginners' art classes for adults on Wednesday afternoons from 15th October, running for five weeks. If you would like to know more about her classes, give her a call on 6689-0001.

A Memoir of Cherry Blossom



↑he cherry blossoms - the national icon of my birth country of Japan - had just begun blooming as I started the trip in Japan in March this year.

It had been 12 years since I visited there last time. The purpose of this visit was to attend my Italian friend and his Japanese partner's wedding party, as well as to see my mother, brother, other relatives and friends. Those were very exciting moments, however, I also found them very emotional sometimes. The cherry blossoms accompanied my trip all the way through. That was so symbolic and had a powerful impact on my psyche deeply for its value in traditional Japanese culture.

I thought that using the cherry blossoms as the theme would be subtle but powerful



I also decided to use the female portrait format mainly for the project, inspired by the traditional Japanese 'ukiyoe' master, Kitagawa Utamaro. Some of the works were influenced by Japanese Manga comic style while others were western.

Knowing that they were not necessarily traditional Japanese media, I used oil and mixed media on canvas, ink and charcoal pencil on paper. I also experimented with locally made ecologically friendly paint on some of the works.

I have been a resident of Terania Creek for about 8 years, and have lived in Australia for over 20 years. So my works were the result of all of my experience and influence, mixture of Japanese and Western, traditional and contemporary. I think this is very much like – Sho Wakejima



Twenty-five years ago Mac established Black Sheep Farm Pottery, and it has been working consistently making ceramics mostly for the local area.

In the beginning Stoneware was produced and after five years, colours were introduced. Nowadays he and Suzanne make a large variety of hand painted earthenware.

The first years he used only a kick wheel and wood fired kiln, but eventually when power was laid, the electric wheel took its place and a large gas kiln was bought.

For the last 15 years Mac has run classes for locals and offers courses for six persons only at a time. This way



everybody gets enough hands on time and can develop skills on the pottery wheel, hand building, using moulds, decorating (especially with bright colours) and simple mosaic making.

The next five-week course

will start on the 17th October running for five full Fridays (9am-4pm). We will have morning tea and lunch together, so bring something to share. The cost is \$150 for tuition plus material cost. Call Mac on 02 6689-1095.

Sayon Souare has recently immigrated from Guinea Conakry, and has lived, taught and performed in Gambia, Senegal and Australia. His mother and father were both artists in djembe and dance.

He has been playing dundun, sangban and djembe with some of the old drum masters of Guinea since the age of 12 at traditional ceremonies, festivals and celebrations and has accompanied some of the most popular Guinean musicians and singers on djembe, bolon, and gongoma.

Sayon was a member of several ballets in Conakry dancing and playing lead djembe, drum and other instruments. He was a member of many Sabar groups playing at sabar parties around Conakry.

Sayon plays Gongoma, a traditional instrument originally from Sierra Leone but very popular in Guinea. He is self taught in Bolon, a traditional hunters' harp of the Manding and Bambara tribes. He plays his original compositions on these instruments and sings.

He was a member of Circus Baobab where he played drum and danced and gained some circus skills, juggling and acrobatics.

Sayon has made his own instrumental groups called "Groupe Yoli" and "Taforiyoge" ("All the rubbish of town"). They played Sayon's compositions on traditional instruments and were very successful. Sayon sang, played drum and danced. Sayon is developing a new group here in Australia called "Bolonbato"

In Gambia and Senegal he has taught drum,



dance and gongoma to students from all over the world, both children and adults. He has also taught many African students. He has been performing and teaching drum and dance at schools, festivals, street parties, and clubs here in Australia since his arrival.

The Seven Network's legal representative has been



Visitors to Nimbin for the wedding enjoyed their stay with Nimbin Rox YHA,





The successful Councillors in the order in which they were elected are Isaac Smith, John Chant, Neil Marks, Vanessa Ekins, Ray Houston, Graham Meineke, Peter Graham, David Yarnall, Simon Clough and Gianpiero Battista. There is a 24 hour period in which a challenge to the result can be lodged but it is anticipated that this will be the make-up of Lismore City Council for the coming four years. I have contacted each of the newly elected Councillors to express my congratulations.

Councillor Orientation

Council is awaiting advice from an independent investment advisor but is inclined to hold our current investments until maturity to minimise any losses. When that advice is available, Councillors will be informed as usual through the regular reporting at each Council meeting.

One of my first invitations as Mayor was to attend the Nimbin Show. It was a beautiful day and as I strolled in the shade with a gelato, I met lots of friends and enjoyed the chat of election results and the likely make-up of the new Lismore Council.
