Bearing witness and bearing banners for peace

The flag and banner arrayed at Kangaroo Point, Brisbane, drew toots of support and waving peace signs from passing motorists, some stopping to say their support in person.

The occasion was the unveiling of a new banner which I had painted up in preparation for upcoming campaign to obstruct and counter the biennial US -Australian war games which take place at Shoalwater Bay, near Yeppoon in central Queensland.

Scheduled to run for three weeks from July 6 to 26, the live-fire war games dubbed Talisman-Sabre, will involve some 30,000 US and Australian military personnel, cost Australian taxpayers at least \$50 million and bomb and blast coastal waters and pristine rainforest of the largest wilderness area on the central Queensland coast. Peace activists see the

war games as a tax heist to train and prepare Australian defence forces for military aggression and engagement in more US wars. Environmentalists see the war games as

environmental folly and senseless destruction.

The Shoalwater Bay area is one of high environmental significance, habitat to many migratory birds, nesting sites for turtles, feeding grounds for dugongs and home to 26 species of dolphins and whales including humpbacks and the endangered Blue Whale.

Under the former Howard Government an area the size of Denmark was effectively ceded to the US military - the worst polluters on the planet - to serve as a 'test facility' for 50 years.

Environmental impacts include the hazard created for marine and landbased wildlife, water contamination from toxic chemicals and heavy metals, effects on air quality, fire potential, noise pollution, waste disposal and spills as well as erosion created by amphibian craft landings and high explosives.

Our Kangaroo Point banner unveiling was presented as the Brisbane

launch of the 2009 campaign and it was supported by local elder Auntie Lilla Watson, former Democrat leader Andrew Bartlett, Fr Terry Fitzpatrick from St Mary's in Exile, Annette Brownlie of Justice Peace Queensland, Robin Taubenfeld from the Anti-Bases Coaltion, Jim McIlroy from Brisbane Socialist Alliance, and other friends.

In number we were few. But we were convivial, occupying public place with style, sitting around the Peacebus.com folding table, chatting and drinking ginger tea. And the corporate media stayed away in droves. So it is with the peace movement at this time: off the agenda.

This year's operation is the fourth in the biennial Talisman Sabre series, which two years ago saw up to 1,000 protesters travel to the area to express their opposition. In preparation, 600 peace activists marched through Brisbane's West End.

No such mass mobilisation this time around. It's as if the TV-hyped elections of Rudd and Obama have lulled peace activists into complacency even though under the post Howard/ Bush US Alliance, defence expenditure and the commitment of troops to foreign wars has increased.

\$62 million dollars a day is what the Rudd government is currently spending on the military. And for what? Not defence, that's for sure. To the contrary our defence forces have been hijacked for offense in the support of endless US imperial wars.

War and the preparation for war do not security bring. We who believe in freedom will not rest. Nor will we who know that the path to peace is peace.

But no billions of tax dollars for peace work. For the benefit of future generations, we peace activists must do best we can and reinvent ourselves and our tactics in every season.

Rainbow Bridge to Woodstock

"Ecofest is the largest environmental festival on the east coast of USA. This year, its 21st, it's taking place in Central Park. We're really excited about the prospect of setting up our spiral, bamboo exhibit, with our photos and stories and Benny Zable's rainbow flags right in the heart of New York," said Harsha.

"We've also been invited to West Fest, Golden Gate Park, San Francisco, 25th October, and we're honoured to be invited to celebrate the Woodstock anniversary with them," said Harsha.

Organisers are also hoping to collect an archive of locally made documentary films and music to travel with the exhibit. "We've got free surfer Dave Rastovich's film Life Like Liquid that we'll be showing. There's an increasing awareness of our connection with the creatures of the oceans and keeping the peace in the water and Rasta's doco draws this out, accompanied by some great grooves.

Pete Seeger, the legendary folk singer, who's now 90, has given a new focus to water issues. His message is simple - Water, Not Weapons - and we'll be linking up with his initiative" Harsha said.

But it's only going to happen if organisers are able to generate the money to get to Woodstock.

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Repco Rally legislation: Legalised Eco-Vandalism

For some reason that escapes me, motor sport is considered to be such a crucial event for NSW that Ian Macdonald has decreed State laws that apply to mere mortals do not apply where 'Holy Hooning' is concerned.

MacDonald has introduced special legislation to ensure that the Repco Rally goes ahead, regardless of huge local opposition based on the contravention of a number of NSW Acts of Parliament.

MacDonald overcomes this small hiccup by changing the relevant Acts that should by rights, if implemented, be enough to stop this maniacal motorfest from going ahead:

• The Environmental Planning and Assessment Act 1979 Part 5, which includes protection of threatened species; adverse affect of life cycle of species; critically endangered ecological community; and threat to habitat of endangered species.

• The Environmental Planning and Assessment Act 1979 Part 3a currently the Minister of Planning has to assess development applications before determining them.

• The Environmental Planning and Assessment Act 1979 Part.6 2a in which if a project is refused on environmental grounds an appeal by the proponent is to be lodged within 60 days

• The National Parks and Wildlife Act 1974 part 8a in which penalty infringment notices can be imposed for minor one-off offences. For more serious offences (i.e. intentional damage) EPA prosecution deadlines are recommended

• The Local Government Act 1993 section 68 in which A person may carry out an activity with the prior approval of the council, except in so far as this Act, the regulations or a local policy adopted under Part 3 (Water management Act 2000) allows the activity to be carried out without that approval. A person who fails to obtain an approval or who carries out an activity otherwise than in accordance with an approval is guilty of an offence.

• The Forestry Act 1916 which includes: offences relating to dangerous activities; control of persons, vehicles and machines; lighting of fires in forestry areas; camping in forestry areas; licenses and permits; and activities prescribed for special purposes permit.

• The Water Management Act 2000 which includes the ruling that the fundamental health of our rivers and groundwater systems and associated wetlands, flood plains and estuaries has to be protected.

• The Motor vehicle Sports (Public Safety Act) 1985, in which the NSW Government declares that Motor sport is inherently dangerous and NSW is the only state in Australia that has specifically legislated for public safety at motor vehicle sports events.



conducted on private property only (non public roads).

Motor sport events which are conducted on public roads are not required to be licensed under this Act, but are required to be formally approved by the RTA and NSW Police Service under the Road and Transport Legislation.

Under this new legislation, where Repco Rally is concerned, none of these rules need apply! Suspension of this road and noise legislation allows Repco Rally Australia to contravene safety and health regulations.

Concerning the protection of exercise of function of the Minister or public authority under this new legislation, the Act may not be challenged, reviewed, quashed or even called into question before any court of law or administrative review body in any proceedings.

Solar Feed-In Tariffs: What difference will they make?

On 23rd June the NSW Government finally announced its Grid Feed-in Tariff (FIT) policy. It will start on 1st January and will pay \$0.60/kWh for net exported power.

Gordon Fraser-Quick, of the Lismore Council Sustainability Forum said, "This is great news. Congratulations are in order to the NSW Government.

"The added economic return on investment will encourage installation of even more climatehelping renewable energy infrastructure. "

Dave Lambert, of the Rainbow Power Company said that the tariff for net exported power is not as generous as a gross FIT, which would pay a premium for all solar power produced, and not just the portion that was exported, but it is still a huge improvement over the present system of 'net billing', which pays the same for export as you pay to purchase the power.

He gave an example of the savings to be gained from the new tariff:

"First of all let me explain what a Net FIT means. I sometimes refer to it as an 'instantaneous net' calculation. Let's say your solar panels are producing 800 Watts and the only appliance on in your house is a 200 Watt fridge. This will result in the meter showing you are exporting 600 Watts. If this occurs for 2 hours, you will have exported 1200Wh or 1.2kWh. Your credit for this will be 1.2 x \$0.60 = \$0.72.

"This type of FIT billing greatly advantages those who use little power during the day – eg everyone is at work/school or on holiday. If you already have a grid feed system, you can look at your last few bills and multiply your export by \$0.60, instead of the present \$0.16, to get an idea of your savings after1st January.

"If you have a very large daytime electrical load – eg several computers, fridges, pool pump etc) your annual saving from a 1kW solar system will be what it is under the present net billing system – about \$300/year.

"On the other hand if you plan to go to Europe for a year, your total export from a 1kW system amounts to a credit of about \$1100!" Gordon Fraser-Quick had done his calculations:

"The impact on my now solar powered home will be significant. In my last power bill I was paid 16.55 cents per kilowatt hour of energy (Kwh) I exported to the grid. I exported 519 Kwh, from my 10 panel 1.7 Killowatt system, and received a credit of \$84.75. Under the new scheme, for the same 519Kwh I export I will receive \$311.40, or an increase of \$226.65. "

Dave Lambert was equally optimistic:

"I have had a look at my own power bills for the past year. I have a modest power usage – only the fridge on during the weekdays, electric cooking, cooling and heating, medium size TV and computer. I have a 1kW system and a solar hot water system. My current three-monthly bill is about \$90. Looking at my last two bills, I calculate my export rebate will be about \$143 per quarter or \$572/year.

"Overall, my bill will be in credit, even after the 20% power increase next month."

Clearly this adds to the affordability of photovoltaic systems over time and gives even more reason to go solar.

ГООТ slams State Budget

Karin Kolbe, President of Trains On Our Tracks, was non-plussed by the state budget for 2009/10. She said, "Once again the NSW Government is ignoring the needs of this region. The NSW Transport Minister has been in the job for 21 months but has never visted the area to understand

our transport needs. "There is no money for regional public transport. Planning for the highly dubious Sydney metro project gets \$581 million for planning, while our line remains abandoned.

"With a fraction of that, we would create immediate and we know what needs to be done."

She said the NSW budget fails the people of Northern Rivers because, "It ignores climate change and the need for sustainable transport; it ignores the reality of our existing and increasing population; it ignores the needs of lower income and elderly residents; and it ignores the needs of the tourism industry."

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March and Rally to address 'violence pandemic'

Anti-Violence March and Rally, Nimbin, Saturday 11th July, 10.30am

Women are at more risk of violence community, " said group member in the home from men that they know. Men are most at risk in public spaces and licensed premises from men they don't know. (Australian Bureau of Statistics 2006 Personal Safety Survey)

Over one third (39.9%) of Australian women report experiencing at least one incident of physical violence or sexual violence since the age of 15. (ABS National Survey 2006)

Reported sexual assaults in Australia have increased by 51% since 1995 (Australian Institute of Criminology)

With these alarming statistics in mind a group of outraged members of the Nimbin community have been meeting to organise a march and rally against the increasing violence experienced in their community.

The escalating level of violence, not just in Nimbin but also around Australia, is unacceptable. Nimbin has seen an increase in malicious attacks with very few of them being reported to police, often for fear of retribution and intimidation. Consequently charges aren't laid and the perpetrators remain free to offend yet again.

"Indiscriminate brutal violence, drug and alcohol fuelled violence, and gang mentality seems to be increasingly tolerated in our Ms Simpson. "People seem to be afraid to get involved when a violent situation is happening in the streets. It's almost regarded as theatre and entertainment and people are becoming desensitised. Whatever happened to the hippy ethos of peace and love in this town? Why are people tolerating the intolerable?"

"The rally catchcry is "Don't let them hide behind your silence" and we are asking people to come forward and show their adhorance and disgust to the violence that is so pervasive, by joining the march and rally," Ms Simpson went on to say.

There will be speakers addressing many different issues of violence that are committed in the Nimbin community, from violence against children, to violence against older people, and all other aspects inbetween.

The rally will assemble at the Nimbin Hospital car park at 10.30am and march down to Allsopp Park at 11am.

"We are hoping to have ongoing events such as this to promote a culture of non violence in the Nimbin community," said Ms Simpson.



MEN In GREEN campaign Supporting Healthy & Respectful Relationships

It's well recognised that women and children can be the victims of violence and abuse, and some men the perpetrators.

There are some much needed, and fantastic, campaigns aimed at ending violence to women and children, eg "White Ribbon Campaign", VAW etc. Sadly, men can also be victims of violence, but there hasn't been a place for public condemnation of this.

To address this, the Lismore Men and Family Centre (LMFC) developed a MEN In GREEN campaign, and on Wednesday 17th June, during International Men's Health Week, everyone, particularly men, were encouraged to wear something green, as a statement of their commitment to create and

maintain respectful relationships.

The campaign attracted willing participants in the local area and beyond, with Janelle Saffin proudly wearing green in Parliament on the day.

The MEN In GREEN campaign does not want to detract from the very important women's campaigns, but aims to compliment them by inviting everyone, particularly men, to making a statement that violence anywhere to anyone, is not OK – by going Green, it's an opportunity for blokes to declare publicly their support for, and commitment to healthy, respectful relationships.

What are respectful relationships? They are when:

- Loving is being experienced;
- + Compassion demonstrated;

- Caring is happening;
- + Co-operation invited;
- + Feelings of safety and trust are present;
- Relaxation and contentment are evident.

When these things are happening in a relationship, then contolling behaviour (all forms of violence and abuse) is not. Everyone feels safe and contented, able to truly be themselves. When the opposite is happening, when someone is being "forced" to do something they don't want to, then abusive, controlling behaviour is happening.


Vince Jones heads for By<u>ron</u>
