George joined the Royal Air Force in

After two years in Cyprus, George realised the Airforce was not for him and he followed his dream and sang his way around the world.

He first arrived in Oz in the early seventies and stayed for three years before heading off to the USA, Europe, Middle East and Asia, honing his singing and guitar skills.

He returned to Oz in 1977 via Fremantle W.A., where as a result of a minor hashish bust, he changed his name to George Scot and place of residence to Nimbin.

For the next 32 years, George's amazing voice reverberated from Nimbin to Byron Bay, Cairns and Kuranda forging a legion of 'Fons and friends along the way.

His prowess on the soccer field was matched evenly by his prowess with the ladies and as a result he fathered five beautiful children, Jordy, Pearl, Lara, Tam and Fiona.

George will be dearly missed by all, particularly his children and his former wives, Rhonda, Sue and Christine.

Goodbye my friend, you live in the heart forever.

Reviving the old Bush Factory

fter my globetrotting of late, I have moved back into the Nimbin Bush Theatre studio behind the café and theatre. The theatre is still closed and up for sale. A number of us are interested in energizing this wonderful gateway, events and studio space.

During the May 1973 Nimbin Aquarius Festival the then dormant Buttery was converted into a performance space. I performed with our then Melbourne Metaphysic Theatre Company, a multimedia experimental hippy version of H.G Wells' Time Machine.

When Bob Marsh retired as the community police officer after the Nimbin Aquarius festival. he converted the Nimbin Buttery into a pet food cannery. A few years later Terry McGee, a former founding member of Tuntable Falls Co-ordination Co-op, facilitated for a group of shareholders in buying the former Nimbin Buttery/cannery.

Terry, along with share holders and volunteers, were instrumental in building the Bush Theatre, at which a couple of his one-off musicals premiered. The theatre was also wired up to Bush Traks for recording live concerts, believed to be a first in



Australia. Later on, Sandy Wise bought the theatre and cafe and has managed it ever since converting it into a regular movie house to help pay its way. Consecutive groups have since leased out the space to make a go of it. Over the years, the cost of running this place has risen considerably. To creatively help solve this problem, I wish to discuss with interested people about co-opting the use of this space again for regular consciousness-raising events. This requires sorting out binding financial and management agreements.

Nimbin Dance Studio

The Dance Studio in the Community Centre in Nimbin has been operating for the past 12 years and dates back to when the Community Centre was born in Nimbin. This all came about after The Visions of Nimbin festival in April 1997. \$30,000 was raised at this festival which was the deposit for the C.C.

Many of the events that happened at the Visions of Nimbin were dance events that helped raise these funds. Many dancers and performers volunteered for the cause in the true spirit of Nimbin.

After the C.C. was purchased many of the Nimbin dancers i.e. Inez, Bobbin, Poppi, Deborah, Chantico, Biskit, Pammy, Danielle, Janie Treasure and others, leased the studio for \$120 per week.

When they first took over the studio, the mirrors had been taken out by the Nimbin Central School (who owned it previously). The dancers retrieved them and put them back in place. The bar



was made by John Wright and put in place (and what a good stretching bar it is too). The carpets were pulled up and the walls painted and all with voluntary help mostly by the dancers themselves.

Many years later, some further fundraising by the dancers bought the sound system, TV and DVD player. These were installed in the studio for all to use. After some time, the dancers ceased leasing the studio and it was offered to the broader community for use on a Casual Hire basis. That still is the case now with rates of \$11 per hour being very reasonable.

There is a very real possibility that we could lose this wonderful asset in this community simply because it is not being used enough. Consequently, the NCDA is considering renting it out for office space and getting funds for the C.C. that they say they need for running costs. This would be an absolute shame.

The hire of the dance studio always fluctuates. It generally is busier in summer and quieter in winter as is the rest of the town. Bobbin, who is usually here in the summer, offers all sorts of classes for ages ranging from Primary school to teenagers and beyond. She has always been a great inspiration to us all with her dance and costuming.

Regardless of her absence this year we still have a wide range of classes happening in the dance studio. These range from Tribal Bellydance to Hip Hop to Qi Qong. Adult Education



meetings as well.

For a young person growing up in this area, there aren't many facilities. We don't have a skatepark YET, and the youth club is not used by the youth. If you aren't into playing sport then you don't have many other ways to express yourself physically.

Dance is a great way of doing this. It is good for the soul. Not only is it a way of working off those excess calories, it is fun and interactive and is really for people of all ages. Yes and it would be great to see more of our elders coming to use the studio as well. This is something that really hasn't been explored in the studio as yet. Quicksteps, foxtrots and waltzes could add a whole new dimension to our beloved dance studio.

Having used this studio for a good ten years myself, I can only sing its praises. However, like our own bodies, we need to use it or lose it. So come check it out! You might find a class you want to do or offer one yourself.

It will be a sorry day if we have to take the colour and rhythms that flow out of this beautiful space and turn it into just another office space.

As a result of secret deals, the New South Wales government passed special legislation to allow Repco Rally Australia to run a series of the World Rally Championships in the Tweed Valley and Kyogle areas in 2009 and every second year to 2017 (with the option of a 10 year extension).

Aquarian NYE at Noel's Shed

Events NSW committed about \$6 million of taxpayers' money to rally organisers, as well as "in-kind support."

The 2009 rally promised \$30 million "economic benefit" to the region, but there is so far no sign of any net benefit at all.

The No Rally Group was formed by local residents to fight the proposed rally and protect the Tweed Valley from damaging uses and inappropriate development, working closely with residents of Kyogle (7th Generation).

The No Rally Group will screen *The Age of Stupid* on

the Murwillumbah Regent Cinema to raise money to help Tweed Shire Councillor (Greens) Katie Milne pay legal expenses incurred while trying to get a Federal Court injunction to stop the stupid Repco Rally last September. A \$20 donation for the

Long wait for the train

Richmond MP Ms Elliot turned the first sod of the Banora Point Pacific Highway upgrade on 16th December.

Ms Karin Kolbe, President of Trains On Our Tracks said, "TOOT would like to know how long we need to wait for Ms Elliot to deliver on her 2004 election promise to get trains running on the Casino-Murwllumbah line?"

Also during December, Queensland opened another 4.1km of rail and a new railway station at Varsity Lakes.

With the extra 4.1 km of rail, 7000 car trips per day will be avoided, according to the Final Assessment Report by Parsons Brinkerhoff.

"The Federal government is happy to spend billions on new roads and \$375 million on the Gold Coast light rail, but our rail gets nothing," she said. "Over 86% of the residents

"Over 86% of the residents in Lismore and Byron Shires live within 5km of the railway line, according to the ABS the Casino-Murwillumbah line is a vital asset for both tourists and residents to move around and access the resources of the area," Ms Kolbe said.

Federal Infrastructure Minister Anthony Albanese said in March 2009, 'We need to encourage more people out of their cars...' Providing a commuter rail

service on the north coast's currently disused rail line would go a long way towards achieving this goal.



Alesco School future bright

Axel Nelson enjoyed doing his school certificate at Alesco School so much, he wants to go back and do it again.

"At first we didn't all get along," he said of his classmates, "but now we're like one giant jigsaw puzzle that fits together."

Isabelle 'Sparky' Rossiter was enrolled in 2009 and will be back this year to sit her School Certificate. She hopes to build a career in medicine and "find a cure for cancer".

"I love it, this place reminds me of home," she said. "It's much easier to work in this environment, instead of crowded classroom with 20-30 kids. I'm happy here."

Lismore's Alesco School has had much success turning around the lives of local kids, many who found themselves in trouble at a mainstream school or felt they didn't fit in.

Head teacher Marcus Peace said Alesco gave them options, a safe learning environment and the opportunity to discover and develop their individual talents and abilities.

"Individually, these kids may seem different or difficult in the mainstream schools," he said. "Here they are all on the same level. Their awareness of their similarities then brings a

respect for themselves and others."

The school is approved by the Board of Studies and follows the Year 9 and 10 curriculum, just like a mainstream school. All the core subjects and key competencies are covered through community based learning projects which are integrated into their lessons.

"For example next year we're getting involved in Lismore's community garden," Keshet Cohen, teachers aide, said.

"It's a great way to teach them about sustainability and their place in the

community." Marcus said many students learn to reconnect with their community through their

studies at Alesco. "They re-engage with the community though work, securing traineeships or continuing with study.'

Best of all, the school gives them hope for the future. 'They come here having lost their dreams and goals,"

Keshet said. "They seem to come out

of here with an idea of what they want to do and a stronger sense of self. They see that life can be good."

Nimbin CTC hosts Broadband for Seniors


The Nimbin Community Centre is hosting a seniors kiosk that provides free access to computers, broadband services and training.


CD Review The Tendons: "Cult: Leader"

few weeks ago I bumped into Glen from *The Tendons* at a Lismore gig and he handed me their debut CD.


Glen (guitar, vocals) John (drums) and Guy (bass) are based in Lismore and have been gigging around the traps pretty much since they first formed about eighteen months ago.

This ten track (and one ghost track) CD is heavily influenced by 80's and 90's Aus rock. The hypnotic sway of "Big Guns" has a *Died Pretty* feel to it with wonderful layered vocals. The buzzsaw punk attack of "In your room" reminded me of iconic Aussie punksters X, and the swamp boogie of "King Brown" is not unlike early King Salmon and the Scientists. There are echoes



down to 17. They're all multiinstrumentalists and extremely talented. They sing, they dance, the whole lot! It is an exposition of talent if you like." I queried that with the other

musicians being so young, where did they hear this music, or was it new to them?



of *Buffalo Tom* in "Make Love" and the title track "Cult Leader" is reminiscent of Brisbane's *Custard* with Glen's vocals sounding similar to Dave McCormack. On other tracks such as

"Snow 2480" and "Red Cedar Man", you get that wonderful North Coast earthy feel which is important to local musos and listeners.

All in all, I think it's a great CD from the lads being recorded, produced and mastered locally in Lismore.

You can catch the guys playing live at Nimbin Town Hall on 26th January, along with six other hard rocking bands. So get along to the gig, buy a CD and support local music. You won't be disappointed. Jon replied, "It's a funny thing! You'll find that with a lot of young musicians they're drawn to that period. I know, I've got a couple of them in the family myself! I think it was such a rich vein of stuff coming out, real diversification, real different stuff, that rang people's bells. And of course it was the baby boomers time. When we were all teenagers or young. We still represent, I think, the largest part of the Australian population by a long way. "

The Rock Show has got a long and healthy lifespan for 2010. "It's been immensely popular wherever we have played."

I asked Jon about his many roles in theatre productions. He said," I've done a lot of different stuff ranging from Andrew Lloyd Webber (Jesus Christ Superstar) to Gilbert and Sullivan. Actually, Pirates of Penzance was immensely popular 'cos we mucked around on stage a lot, and people thought that was good fun. I've done Big River, I've done Eurhythmies, ancient Greek theatre, it's nice to dip your hat to that once in a while. I've done French Farce, a lot of different stuff, because I just enjoy the medium. All Together Now, well, that ran for three years, about 100 episodes. That was a sitcom. They're a different animal altogether."

"But to be brutally honest, Rock 'n' Roll and music is my first love, that's what I started off doing." I asked Jon about highlights

I asked Jon about highlights in his musical career.

"Highlights? I was very lucky, as you don't really recognise history when it's happening around you. It's only later you realise and think Oh My God! For my fifteenth birthday my sister took me along to see the Beatles live at the Sydney stadium. That was a real turning point for me, cos I basically went home and told my dad guess what? I know what I want to be. He said oh that's good, what's that? And I said I want to be a musician! I want to be a Beatle! Gee, he bought me a guitar, and one thing led to another. That was one of my highlights.

"The other highlights were, oh a lot of the old shows they had at the stadium, where you get three or four bands for the price of one, like *The Who* with *The Small Faces*, you'd get on the one bill. We accepted that as being the norm. As opposed to paying \$200 a ticket to go and see Brittney Spears."

After The Rock Show, what does the future hold for Jon English? "I'm doing a lot of stuff with Jona Road, who are a big country band. They're kinda backing me, and they're doing their own stuff. The reason that exists is 'cos it's my nephew's band. It's the Partridge Family there! That's been great 'cos they're a good rockin' band. There's a couple of theatre shows I've been asked to do, and there's a TV show.

"I've got lots of stuff on the plate, but at the moment we're concentrating on *The Rock Show*, cos it's such damned good fun to do".

Lucky Wonders have just

returned from a successful tour to Sydney via Bellingen to find that their debut single *Happy Pill* has hit No. 1 on JJJ Unearthed Roots chart.

In the last stages of recording their album and planning a national tour in April, the band has grown to include Brent Calcutt on bass and Anastassijah Scales on



drums, and is sounding great. Sunday 24th January sees them serenading Sphinx Rock Cafe with their insightful, beautifully crafted, award winning songwriting.




