Their action is based on the expectation that, when the new Public Heath Act comes into force - Council speculate some time in 2012- it would be too costly make the water meet health guidelines.

No public consultation has been conducted - we simply got a letter advising their decision on 28th July.

As affected residents discussed the implications and circumstances, the Council's precipitous action seemed suspect. If you have an interest to know more I'll be happy to speak with you.

Lismore desperately needs a new gallery as the current gallery is falling apart. It is very disappointing that council's poor financial situation prohibited such a project going ahead.

It has been said that those of us who were concerned about the state of our roads 'scuttled' the project. That is a distasteful over simplification of the real reasons and unfair to those like myself who have worked hard for responsible local government.

Let's be clear, Lismore has two major swimming pools that bleed council's budget and no art gallery. Both those projects were approved by previous councils with no long term financial plan. Services in other areas of council have had to be wound back to run the pools. Council could not afford the new gallery, even with substantial Federal funding without further reducing Council's level of service.

The Dept of Local Government makes it clear that if funding for a new project, even with substantial grant funding, requires the winding back of Council's services, then that project is unaffordable and should not go ahead. This is the hard economic fact behind spending ratepayer's money and a cornerstone of sound financial planning. Had the two pools come under such scrutiny then we would not be in the current poor financial state.

If we must blame anyone (I personally think that is distasteful), blame the councillors who supported the poor decisions to build the GSAC and the Memorial Baths. We should have had one pool and a new gallery.

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

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Frack off

The NSW State Govt.'s new rules for coal seam gas mining and exploration, as reported in the *Northern Star* 25/7/2011, are a fraud and a sham being perpetrated on all the citizens of NSW for the following reasons.

- 1. No BTEX chemicals (Benzene, Toluene, Ethyl Benzene and Xylenes) are allowed. This applies to existing licences. Well and good, but what other chemicals are to be allowed? What chemicals are released from the coal itself? These questions need answers.
- 2. Hydraulic fracturing (fracking). Although the 'moratorium' has been extended to 31/12/2011, fracking is not banned, only postponed. Up to 22 chemicals have been implicated with fracking, some have no testing for health and environmental safety.
- 3. CSG companies are to hold water access licences for extracting more than 3 megalitres per year. This only applies to new licences however. 70% of NSW is covered by existing licences, so new rules do not apply to them.
- 4. Ban on use of evaporation ponds. So what do CSG mining companies do with the contaminated water? Spray it along roads as has been reported in Qld? Again this rule only applies to new licences. In the over 70% of NSW covered by existing licences evaporation ponds can still be used.
- New guidelines to increase transparency & accountability. Great.

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Again they will only apply to new licences. What a fig leaf.

It is worth bearing in mind that existing gas exploration licences run for 30 years, so sixty day and six month moratoriums do very little to alter the big picture.

They are only window dressing designed to lull communities and citizens into believing that the Government is acting for the common good, when the truth is that they have already signed contracts worth tens of billions of dollars, which if honoured, have the potential to damage and pollute our ground water aquifers and alienate our farm lands and food security.

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Delivering a clean energy future

The carbon price will commence on 1st July 2012 and will be fixed for the first three years before moving to an emissions trading scheme in 2015.

But because some of these big polluters

Nimbin Water Supply

Council water engineers have made a presentation to Councillors on the need to be proactive in protecting the health of 79 households that receive water from the Mulgum weir before the water reaches the dam that supplies water to the village residents.

While there have been no reports of health problems associated with the water supply to the 79 homes, new water standards expected in 2012 require Council to determine how to proceed.

A range of options will be presented to Councillors including the provision of large rainwater tanks. The report will go to the August Council meeting for determination.

Lismore Club

Council is nearing the end of the Local Environment Plan process with 6 workshops open to the public. We still have 3 workshops to go.

Last Council meeting was significant for the decision to retain the former Lismore Club and build the levee behind it. There was strong pressure on Councillors to demolish the building, but thanks to the casting vote of the mayor it was saved. I hope Council is able to sell the building as soon as possible because the last thing Council needs is another piece of high maintenance infrastructure. Other highlights of the meeting included acceptance of my motion that staff prepare key performance indicators to bench mark an aimed for 10% increase in

efficiency in road building and maintenance. A proposal to investigate rating buildings separately on Rural Land Sharing Communities was lost. Though this idea has some superficial attraction it has been investigated before and as I said at the meeting it is a "can of worms" that will consume large amounts of staff time in a pointless exercise.

Letters about a proposal to create a new locality "Tuntable Falls" will be sent shortly from Council to residents and landowners in the Tuntable Falls area. This letter is in response to a request from a resident to consider formalising the naming of the locality. The letter offers landowners and residents an opportunity to comment on a proposal, which would formalise the status of Tuntable Falls as a defined area, becoming a formally recognised locality/ suburb, to be approved by the Geographical Names Board.

For some residents in this area the lack of acceptance or ability to use "Tuntable Falls" as the locality name in their property address


has caused significant frustration. Some residents of "Tuntable Falls" have experienced difficulty because that name is not recognised by the Government as a place, and residents must currently use the locality of "Nimbin" as their formal suburb address. For residents, this proposed change would facilitate processing of applications and registrations with the various organisations and agencies who rely on approved (Council) addressing for their business activities.

A submission period of four weeks closes on Friday 2 September 2011. Review of

the responses will culminate in a report to Council at a future date if the proposal is to proceed, and a timeframe for finalisation is yet to be determined.

Cannabis law challenge

n the 23rd of August Mullaways Medical Cannabis will be going to NSW Parliament House to hand over their terms for a treaty on cannabis.

A treaty will be drawn up and presented to the Health Department, which controls the growing and possession of cannabis in NSW for medical purposes.

The Hemp Embassy is supporting Mullaways' bid, and both groups are calling on people to travel down to show support.

Mullaways says it will dispense cannabis tincture free of charge to anyone with a doctor's letter stating they have an illness cannabis is known to treat.

The delegation will also be asking the NSW Health Minister Jillian Skinner to issue a card protecting patients from legal harassment, a move which should have been taken in accordance with the TGA Special Access Scheme.

"If they are unwilling to provide this medicine they cannot stop you from providing your own," said Anthony Bower, director and founder of Mullaways Medical Cannabis. "This is in law."

If the Parliament bid fails, Mullaways intends to take the issue to the NSW Supreme Court.

A Letter of Notice has been sent to the NSW Health Department advising action

will be taken on that day.

"It is time to stand up and show we have the courage," said Mr Bower, "not only to help ourselves but to help others less fortunate. Let's help them have a quality of life they deserve.







This festival is organized by Wednesday Women Weavers who meet weekly to weave together. We acknowledge that the inspiration and techniques were passed on by Aboriginal women to various members of our group.

We feel the need to share these experiences and techniques in the same way, these women shared theirs with us. We hold these stories dear to our heart. We thank them for keeping these ancient skills alive during times of extreme hardships. Basketry, like all the arts is meditative and healing, keeping us in close contact with our Earth Mother.

This year our Festival falls on the Equinox (Friday 23rd) Equal day, equal night. A time of equality.. a good time to converge as equals, a time of celebration to remind us of our essential equality with all life. Equality is also one of the aspects of the New Age of Aquarius soon to be upon us. New influences silently invisibly at work to create change. Aquarius is the 'sign' devoted to breaking down established patterns so change can occur. The birth of a New Age (from the Age of Pisces to Age of Aquarius) is similar to any birth. Women are the ones familiar with the birthing process... the pangs of birth of a New Age are big ones! Uranus, the 'ruler' of Aquarius is akin to this birth process. Listening to the planet

What would possess two young French civil servants to chuck in their jobs and set off on a three-year trip around the world, by bicycle?

It's a question that still puzzles the parents of 30-year old Laure and her partner Pierre, 27, who they have kept in regular contact with, every 10 days, since their departure from France in March last year.

Laure, an economic development project officer, and Pierre, an engineering project officer, spent 18 months planning their trip, acquiring their specialist tent and pair of recumbent cycles, and roadtesting their kit on a trip around Ireland.

"We share common interests in international development and environmental concerns and wanted to look at sustainable ways of life around the world," Pierre explained, "but we are realising that this is about people and their lives, and what solutions they are finding to cope with problems they face."

They call their odyssey 'Deux velos l'ecouté de la planete' (two cyclists listening to the planet). Laure explained, "We want to pay attention to the planet, and to what solutions people are finding around the world.

Travelling by bicycle gives the couple much more contact with local people, and the unusual velos couché machines raise interest wherever they go. Made by Nazca, a Dutch family company, the bikes have 27 gears and a comfortable laid-back



riding position for lugging the 65kg of gear that they share.

Choosing a westerly circumnavigation, to try to get the best riding conditions, their first continent was South America, where they rode through Argentina, Chile, Bolivia, Peru, Ecuador and Panama. To cross oceans, they prefer to travel by boat, on cargo ships, rather than fly. Their passage from Bilbao, Spain to Buenos Aires took 28 days, and while they it was easy to cross the Pacific to New Zealand by cargo ship, the cost of sailing across the Tasman Sea would have been ten times that of flying... so, they flew.

Such practicality is driven by their need to stay within a tight budget, with expenses limited to 20 euros per day (\$A27) for two. About 20% of the cost of the trip was funded through sponsorship, mostly from French government grants, so their expenditure needs to be accounted for.

"We don't see this as a big trip – travelling the world – but within each country, lots of little trips, to investigate other ways of living," Laure said. "The trip keeps enriching our life-skills."

The pair wanted to experience WWOOFing (Willing Workers on Organic Farms), and were able to try it for 12 days in New Zealand, where they met an experienced French WWOOFer who suggested they have a look at the Rainbow Region, which led to them being WWOOFers on Tuntable Falls Community for two weeks.

"This is very good for us," Pierre said. "On the bikes, we don't exercise our upper bodies, it's like being in an armchair."

Laure and Pierre want to disseminate their discoveries to people working in similar environmental fields, and to schoolchildren. They do this by making radio documentaries, mixing in the particular sounds they experience, and putting them with photos to make slide shows, which they publish on their website: www. enviroulemonde.fr

They leave this month for Indonesia, Cambodia, Vietnam, Laos, Thailand, then along the Silk Road through the 'stans to Turkey, traversing southern Europe before arriving home in June 2013.

Laure said, "We'll be taking a lot of information back to France, including the story of Tuntable!"
