

Members of the Nimbin community expressed their gratutude to Darcy Goodwin, a remarkable man whose mission was to "help the needy, not the greedy," at a memorial gathering at Nimbin Town Hall on Saturday 25th August. Tributes were payed to his selfless dedication to the Nimbin community with his mobile soup kitchen, furniture donations, and even long-term loans of caravans to the poor, the hungry and the needy, and those just down on their luck.

Mayor Jenny Dowell was among those who paid tribute to Darcy's tireless work for the community, describing him as "a great man and a huge asset to our community." She announced that Lismore Council's Australia Day Community Services Award will be named in his honour. Darcy was the recipient of this award in 1988.

Lismore Seventh Day Adventist Church's Pastor Keith Jackson sang a moving tribute with his daughter Kristie, and gave a commitment that the Five Loaves mobile soup kitchen would continue to operate, with assistance from the church.

Harry Westera's portrait of Darcy and his Five Loaves van, on loan from the artist, was on prominent display and is now viewable on the first floor of the Lismore Library, where Darcy had been involved as a 'Living Book'.

The Nimbin-Lismore Bus Extension project, funded by NSW Transport, ended on June 30, and sadly, the additional services did not reach viable passenger numbers over the 12-month project period. However, their usage levels over that time were sufficient for Graeme Waller to extend the additional afternoon bus runs for a further six months. This is due to Graeme's strong commitment to improving public transport options in this area.

Use must continue to grow, to ensure their retention at a time when fuel prices are on the rise, and cars are the source of our community's biggest carbon footprint.

So if you are headed for Lismore, think about taking the bus. With someone else doing the driving for you, you can read a book, study for that exam or listen to some music on the way.

There have been some alterations to the timetables which are available on our website www.nnic.org.au

Overall, the use of all services increased over the period, with use of the 5.30pm Lismore-Nimbin run being the most popular. Although the figures shown are averages and reflect the slow initial uptake (and do not reflect the actual numbers of passengers in the final month, for example),

A full bus at peak hour takes 40 cars off the road. A smaller bus, taking 20 cars off the road, is significant in terms of reduced carbon emissions and wear and tear on our roads.

they clearly demonstrate the need to significantly increase numbers to ensure the viability of some of the bus runs.

The majority of passengers were concession-fare passengers, indicating a low uptake by working people. It would seem that car culture is deeply entrenched in the community, and at this stage the perceived benefits of taking the bus do not appear to sufficiently outweigh the perceived cost and loss of convenience of taking the car.

The total number of passengers travelling on the Bus Extension routes was 2,036.

All eyes on Tara in CSG health analysis

As Brian Monk (pictured) and his family enter their second year of 'co-existing' with major coal seam gas operations in Tara Queensland, his grandson is recovering from yet another unexplained seizure.

Seizures, nose bleeds, skin rashes and headaches in children and adults have become common since CSG company Queensland Gas Company (QGC) commenced operating in Tara.

"A number of people living near where coal-seamgas (CSG) exploration is occurring... are reporting symptoms that are consistent to gas exposure," Dr Rowan of the Australian Medical Association said.

There are five CSG wells inside the large Tara Residential Estates and many more surrounding it. Suspected gas leaks at these wells have contaminated at least one water bore on Brian's 5000-acre property, yet the Queensland Government



has ignored the pleas for help from the Monk family and other community members affected by suspected CSG poisoning.

Adrienne Stones from Stoney Glenn Farm in the Northern Rivers has been following the Monk family's story closely since CSG began its ugly impact on their life.

"Somebody has to care about this. These people are suffering and are now having to leave their family homes," Adrienne said.

"They have nowhere to go and no money to start again. They're essentially gas refugees. I wanted to let them know that there are people everywhere in Australia watching how they're dealt with by the Queensland government. We're behind them.

"The health minister, Lawrence Springborg, has so far ignored these people and their suffering, and the government's lack of understanding or accountability for CSG industry impacts means this could be any one of our own kids very soon."

To date the Monk family don't qualify for compensation or support from either QCG or the Queensland government.

Adrienne has launched an online petition, 'Help the Monk family of Tara find out what's poisoning them'. She used GetUp's community petition portal communityrun. org and has so far generated close to 500 signatures in support of the Monk family and the residents of Tara.

The petition asks Mr Springborg to provide a comprehensive list of the dangerous chemicals and gases the Monk family and the residents of the Tara residential estates have been exposed to since the commencement of CSG mining in their community.

The reality is that the Monk family members face life as CSG refugees. For the sake of their family's health, well being and their right to live in peace they are about to abandon their 5000-acre farm in Kogan on the outskirts of Tara. The health implications of being forced to co-exist with CSG mining have reached a critical point for many Tara families.

Adrienne's efforts have inspired a number of CSG Free Northern Rivers campaigners.

A call for action in October is planned to coincide with the sitting of the Queensland Parliament and the National Week of Action against CSG in NSW.

Tweed puts pressure on candidates over CSG stance

The CSG-free Communities Initiative is rolling through the Tweed Valley, gathering pace as it goes, with the communities of Doon Doon, Mt Burrell and Kunghur the latest to declare themselves CSG-free.

"Over 96% of residents surveyed in the Upper Tweed Valley want their community to be CSG-free" Michael McNamara, from Lock the Gate - Tweed, said in presenting the result to Tweed Mayor Barry Longland.

Mr McNamara also said that the growing community calls for the Tweed Shire to be CSG-free were putting pressure on candidates in the council elections to declare their hands.

"It is time for Council candidates to let the community know what they will do, if elected, to reflect these strong community views. There are strong, positive actions that Councils can take to protect the community from the threat of CSG exploration and production."

"The CSG-free Communities initiative has given communities an opportunity denied to them by the government and the CSG companies – to actually have a say," Mr McNamara said.



Some 2011-12 Project Statistics

Nimbin Solar Farm – power generated from 1 July 2011 to 30 June 2102 = 61,250.630 kWh (target is 61,000 per year). Target exceeded in spite of lots of rain and clouds.

Nimbin Grain Mill - total grain milled in the first year of operation (50 weeks) was 928 kg, with an average of 18.5kgs per week. The most popular grain milled was spelt, (almost 40%), followed by wheat.

Nimbin CSG survey - The survey covered almost every resident (1,830 people) of each of the 42 roads of the Nimbin Valley including the Lismore-to-Nimbin road from Terania Street, and through Booerie Creek and Goolmangar. The survey covered to the end of Stoney Chute Road, and from Nimbin to the end of Blue Knob Road, but did not include the rest of the Nimbin catchment in the Barkersvale, Wadeville and Uki areas... these are being done separately. It seems that more Nimbinites participated in this survey than in any other in history (including the census!), and over 98% indicated they are opposed to CSG development in our valley. A phenomenal effort by the roads' coordinators.

Post Harvest Processing Equipment Library

The shed is finally up and ready at Blue Knob Hall and the library gear will be officially located there as from the start of September. Many thanks to John Bell and Paul Tait in particular, and to everyone else who helped, for getting the shed done.

Nimbin Murals Project

NNIC will be co-ordinating some work around the murals using Local Heritage Grant funding, with the aim to get three done by the end of the funding period (April 2013). Any businesses interested in renovating/restoring their murals should contact Nat at NNIC or Peter Wise at the Chamber of Commerce.

Workshop space

Along with the current construction of our new building, the community owned and run Nimbin Preschool is about to embark on the development of a new workshop space, where children and adults (including staff and family members) alike can go to, to construct and build out of wood and other

We are grateful for the support in funding and development of this project that we have gained from the people at the Lismore Men and Family Centre's 'Dads in School Program', who the children have been meeting with, to discuss and plan.

This additional funding recently allowed us to walk up to Charter's Hardware to begin purchasing tools and equipment. Some of the items that the children chose from the shelves at the hardware included hammers, tape measures, pliers, screwdrivers, saws, nails and screws. We still have power tools, shelving and lots of wood on our list.

We are keen to get the preschool parent community involved in the building of

our workshop.

Regarding our new preschool building, surely it must be nearly finished. It's been over a decade in the planning and almost a year in the building. Lucky we are a patient lot. Fingers crossed, we will be in there after the next school holidays.

The opening of the new building will be a huge celebration to mark the conclusion of an enormous amount of work by many, many community members; and the beginning of a new journey for your Nimbin Preschool.

New Garden

Following council directions and by preference, we are hoping to plant more than 20 native species in and around the new preschool grounds that in part reflect the natural diversity of our area.

We are hoping that Nimbin locals will look at their own gardens this week with an eye out for Nimbin Preschool.

If you have any bush tucker seedlings or water sucking native grasses, any selfseeders, any extra local native plants, trees, hedges, flowers, or edible plants in your garden - please consider dropping a contribution of your garden's bounty to the preschool for us to plant.



For this current beautification effort, we would really like lilli pillis, grevillias, banksias, native frangipani (to attract birds and bees), citrus, herbs, and/ or seasonal produce seedlings (ie. spring lettuces and vegies). However, ideologically and otherwise, we will proudly accept all kinds.

We are happy to label the native with your name as well as the species name if you could supply this information to us on a note with your donation. Thank you in advance for your help beautifying and enriching the children's learning and play environment.

Hartje also teaches the children how to skip, using a large rope that she turns for the children. Even some of our two year olds can skip already. We think that they are very talented!

Hartje involves the children in decision making about what they would like to try and works with each individual child's ability and enthusiasm.

enthusiastic about circus and we have observed how their confidence and skills are developing at a fast pace.

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Parallel Universe

The film of the Ballina police bashing Corey Barker is shocking on several fronts.

Not just because police were caught out lying to the court in order to lock up a young Aboriginal man, but the ferocity of their attack on him really surprised me. The film shows the police attacking Corey furiously. What did he say, or do, to make them so angry? Or is it nothing to do with Corey, and just the frustration they walk with every day in their job? Hurt people hurt people. What are they so angry and nasty about?

Equally shocking is the reaction, or lack of it, from so many people I talked to in Nimbin: "Of course Mick, what did you think?" I'm not sure what I expected, but not such fierce hatred from the police, that's for sure.

"It's happened to me," said half a dozen people and not all Aboriginals. I'd heard all the stories before, usually four or five police beating up a, probably cheeky, young lad, usually up the Gold Coast, but the Kooris absolutely thought it was par for the course.

"This is what happens Mick, we grew up with it."

"But it hasn't been caught on camera before," I'd say. "Won't make any difference," was the usual cynical response. "They'll be more careful next time to make sure the footage is properly destroyed."

I'm left with several questions while we wait for the police to examine themselves and decide on a course of action. How can they not all face serious criminal charges? And how come the court now doesn't look at previous cases where evidence from any of these police has locked up others?

As Corey's mother said, he'd be locked up now except for that short piece of camera footage which exposed not just their shocking violence but their complete fabrication of evidence and efforts to pervert the course of justice.

Council has several mechanisms enacted through State Govt. legislation by which the effects of developments on the community can be accessed e.g. roads, footpaths, clearing etc. Conditions can be placed on the development that assist council to minimise the burden to the community. Certainly this adds more cost to the developer, but if the developer doesn't share in the cost to the community then the ratepayers will pay the full cost, most likely leading to a reduction in services and/or lifestyle.

Sustainable development is not about short-term economic gain. Sustainable development is about calculating all costs up-front, and not leaving those costs for future generations to pay. If the costs to the community outweigh the benefits, then the development should not go ahead. Sustainable development is about responsible development that maintains and grows the community into the future.


