The Nimbin Organic Food Co-op is a not-for-profit community-owned and managed organisation, with the day-to-day running managed by volunteers. There is a strong committee and co-ordinator roles have been filled by dedicated and skilled individuals.

Founded in 2014 by an enthusiastic group of local people, the Co-op is forging a strong presence in the local community, ensuring regional food security for the future. The hard work of establishing the Co-op and overseeing the day-to-day running in the first instance was taken on by Jay Kelly and Rindi Harradine who put in superhuman efforts and we are very grateful for their commitment.

As a fledgling Co-op, there have been some wobbly moments as we scramble to get our heads around how the Co-op can run in the most efficient and ethical way and to reward our volunteers who keep everything afloat. To that end, the volunteer discount has been increased to 20% on top of our already low prices.

The Co-op is planning to implement a membership discount to incentivise membership. Currently the discount is built into the low prices, so please do support your Co-op by becoming a member, continue shopping and watch



this space for increased and more visible member rewards and incentives.

The community mandate to the Co-op was to 'keep the organics shop running' and we have been faithful to that community request. Shortly we will run a member survey to begin evolving a unique co-op guiding vision beyond this vision.

The Co-op runs regular meetings and the actions that arise from these meetings have led to a lot of change, growth and development in all areas of the Co-op. The current management structure has been working to define roles and assign responsibilities. Co-ordinator roles have been assigned to people in the areas of produce and grocery, bulk foods, local

producers, membership, volunteers and web and media.

We are seeking an accounts coordinator, an off-sider for the produce and grocery ordering who is available during office hours through the week, and a cleaner who is available outside of office hours.

Volunteers are always needed, so if you have the time and commitment, pop in to the shop and arrange a training session, check it out and maybe commit to a regular shift if it seems like your thing! We're back! Did you miss us? Due to the ever-generous and supportive editors of NGT (Bob and Sue) giving us so much space in the last two editions for the Sibley Street updates, we thought we should forego our column, so as to not hog too much space. Thanks as ever for the support, *NGT*! As a result we have a fair bit of news to report....

Emergency relief

Most of you will be aware of the savage cuts to social services funds by the federal government last year, including to the Emergency Relief program. The bad news is that as of 1st April, NNIC will no longer be delivering ER as we have known it for the last 20 or more years.

The good news is that the CONC (Consortium of Neighbourhood Centres Far North Coast) successfully tendered for the new ER program funds and we are currently working on configuring the new program to achieve the best outcomes for our disadvantaged clients.

The funds across the region for ER have been very significantly reduced, so whatever we will be delivering it will not look much like the old ER program you are all familiar with. In the meantime, NNIC has been preparing for this by increasing our food

storage so that we can continue to provide food relief for people in need, even though we will no longer be able to provide food vouchers. There will be more info about all this in the coming few months. Donations of non-perishable foods can be brought to NNIC anytime during our opening hours.

Northern Rivers bio hubs project

You may also have heard that NNIC is the lead agency of a large consortium which received funds to undertake pre-feasibility assessment work in relation to a bio hub in Casino, and a trial bio gas plant at Nimbin Valley Diary.

This work has been going on for the past five years and it is fantastic to obtain some funds which were granted by the NSW Office of Environment and Heritage under their Growing Community Energy grants scheme. The project includes conducting conversations around a social license for bioenergy and in particular biogas, so watch this space for info about upcoming community surveys and workshops.

7 Sibley Street – why are we painting it?

We were instructed by council to remove and stabilise any lead paint in-situ before we move the house, to avoid

spreading it all over the site. Harmony worked hard over two weeks to painstakingly scrape off and catch all the loose flakes of old paint to prepare it for painting. We also want to preserve the exterior cladding boards (which are hardwood and probably come from irreplaceable old growth trees) whilst we raise the funds to relocate the house. All the exterior cladding boards will be used when we move the house. Plus it just looks better and a bit less neglected.

Thanks to Lismore City Council for funds provided via the Heritage Grants program (\$2000) and to Painted Earth and the Green Building Centre for giving us special mates rates on the (non-toxic, environmentally friendly) paint.

Kyogle Council notebook

It's been a big month already with various meetings and workshops. Council has been busy around the Long Term Financial Plan (LTFP) and trying to find a way forward in terms of Fit for the Future. (FFTF).

Long Term Financial Plan

Councillors had a workshop recently to discuss the LTFP. Some of our figures rely on external funding so when we don't receive that funding, obviously it makes it difficult for us to deliver on the plan.

Recently Kyogle missed out on funding through the Federal Bridge Renewal Program, which has affected our capacity to fund the repair or replacement of additional bridges. We will be appealing this decision in Canberra but won't have a result until after March 25.

The LTFP gives us, and you, the chance to see the big picture of how Council is managing the resources and service delivery of the LGA.

We have an achievable plan and a workable budget, but this budget is affected by state and federal sources of funding. We are looking at opportunities for potential resource sharing and working across LGA borders to achieve good outcomes for our communities.

Fit For The Future

I have had a lot of people approach me about what



is happening around amalgamations. The simple answer is: we don't know.

Kyogle councillors and the general manager had a workshop on Thursday, 12 March, prior to meeting with both Lismore and Richmond Valley councils individually on what our best, possible, negotiated outcome could be.

We will be asking about possible cost efficiencies, maintaining (if not improving) service delivery levels and of course, representation. After these meetings have been held, we will be coming out to the community to talk to you. After all, it is your future we're talking

know we have featured Brush Cherry a couple of times over the years, but this I month I cannot go past it, it's stunning. Mass flowering at the end of March after good rains and hot weather have combined to offer us a massive crop of the delightfully tasteful and beautiful brush cherry.

It's one of my favourite trees, in some ways unbecoming, but it's the feeling that I have of the tree, an old friend, reliable, freely offering food, shade and shelter. There is a very old tree in Nimbin with much history and cultural connection opposite the tip on Calico Creek, check it out, it's a ripper.

So be in the lookout this month for the red/ pink ovoid pear-shaped fruits which will no doubt be gracing the restaurant plates of the rich and famous gorging on new "tastes" as they crap on about this and that!

Paul Joseph medical fundraiser benefit at Bush Theatre

History and the future will collide in the Bush Theatre in Nimbin on 11th April in a community celebration to help support Paul Joseph's battle with cancer. The event will feature healthy food, historic film and live music including local and visiting artists. The event kicks off at 5pm, Saturday 11th April at the Bush Theatre, Nimbin.

Paul Joseph is often referred to as a legendary early hippy settler in the Rainbow Region. As Aquarius Songman, he travelled Australia with the White Kompany, promoting the original Aquarius Festival in 1973.

Following the festival, Paul then became the salesman for Nimbin's first large multiple occupancy community at Tuntable Falls, selling shares in the fledgling co-operative all round Australia for \$200 a share. The founding members managed to raise the money to buy the land outright in less than a year, and so began Nimbin's journey from ghost town to the thriving, unique global village it is today.

With over 500 shareholders expected to arrive and, with no dole or welfare support available in those early days, Paul Joseph and other community organisers realised they needed to create local economy and enterprise for people to be able to survive. They bought the old Nimbin Butter Factory, which for

REPAIRS Amp, Guitar & Computer many years had been a pet food factory, for \$19,000 and established the Bush Co-Op.

"We created the Bush Co-Op so that new settlers then could establish a livelihood," said Paul. "When we set up Tuntable Falls community, we established hamlet development over the 1000-plus acres, so that small groups could have more immediate management of their home space and integrate with the rest of the community through monthly Tribal Meetings."

In establishing the Bush Co-Op, the early Nimbin settlers identified individual businesses as "work groups", who could share the space and support services. Paul explained, "We had a wide range of start-up enterprises and saw that the Co-Op idea would be of mutual benefit to the needs of these micro businesses, especially in promotion, administration and joint purchasing."

"I was a founding partner in four different businesses as part of the Co-Op," said Paul. "They were the Summerland Times Magazine, which was the local official tourist monthly, produced in Nimbin and distributed throughout the region; a recording studio which went on to become the very successful "Bush Traks"; a film making group called "North Country Flix" which made four films including

Give Trees a Chance, Save the Trees (made in 1976 and the first community action in the battle to save Terania Forest), as well as Birth and Beyond and a movie made for Lismore Council in 1978 called A Place in the Sun which Council controversially banned after their first viewing."

"They thought we were trying to make Lismore look 'too hippy," said Paul. "That film was lost for over 30 years, but our mayor, Jenny Dowell was able to find it a few years ago and I have now had it digitised and shown to a full house at the Star Court Theatre in Lismore. It looks decidedly uncontroversial these days, but reflects a lot of community history in 1978."

"The Bush Theatre was my real dream enterprise," explained Paul Joseph. "I literally cut down the trees and snigged them out of the bush with my draft horse to build the stage. Those iron bark poles, cut from a clearance at Woodenbong still look as fresh as when we adzed them by hand nearly 40 years ago. Now they still hold up the stage and also form part of the cafe seating downstairs, now run by Bringabong. There's a nice poetic ring to that."

Paul Joseph said that this event on 11th April at the Bush Theatre is like a fulfilment of a lifelong dream. "I have been overwhelmed with the love and support received from so many old and new friends and am so grateful for the help and real kindness I have received in my healing journey," he said. "One of my partners

in the Summerland Times, Trish Strange, instigated this event and Dave Hyett, owner of Bringabong and now managing the Bush Theatre, freely offered the venue. It really feels like a dream will be fulfilled for me," said Paul.

"This may well be my own final performance," said Paul Joseph. "I have what they call Stage 4 cancer and there is no Stage 5. My lung tumour has metastasised into my lymph system, brain and bones, so my life is very day-by-day right now. But I don't discount the option for miracles, and am receiving wonderful support and treatment from Lismore Cancer Clinic. We are truly blessed to have such a worldclass medical facility here. In the past, cancer sufferers had to travel to the big cities and incur huge travel and accommodation costs. I really appreciate the quality of care and the wonderfully dedicated doctors, nurses and staff who help us here."

"I have had radiation therapy for my brain and undergoing chemotherapy, but also balancing that with lots of natural treatment, especially diet and supplements to starve the cancers," he said. "Life is all about finding the right balance, and this cancer journey is certainly challenging my wobbliness. I must say I wish that Cannabis was legally available and clinically proven to offer the outstanding cures that people have been reporting."

"I no longer wish to smoke it, but the claims that the oil has anti-cancer qualities and is achieving miraculous results is very heartening. I just wish we had a compassionate government that would do the decent thing and legalise Cannabis, especially for healing, but also for all the earth saving qualities this valuable plant has always offered humanity.'

The fundraiser event, 'Paul Joseph, Aquarius Songman' program will begin at 5pm at the Bush Theatre, Nimbin on Saturday 11th April. Healthy nutritious food will be available from the Cafe and there will be lots of live music outdoors by the magical creek setting. At 7pm there will be a short movie session with a film made by a national TV program in 1977, which shows a wide cross-section of the new settler community of that time, including a section on the original Channon Market when it began at the Channon Hall and several other historic activities. This film has never been shown live before, or screened at all since it was aired in 1977.

At 8pm the gathering will be asked to join in a project to sing and record the theme song of the Aquarius Festival, "May the longtime sunshine upon you, all love surround you, and the pure light within you, guide your way home." David Pendragon, himself an early Nimbin music luminary, now running a successful music studio and media production business in Canberra has set up the 'Paul Joseph World Singalong Group' (find it on Facebook) to get friends around the world to join in singing this classic Nimbin song. David Pendragon will compile all the contributions and a video will



be put together featuring all the participants. The wonders of modern technology!

Paul Joseph will present a set of songs he has written about the region over the past 45 years, supported by many of his musician friends with his son, Willow Neilson as band leader, and then there will be a variety of musical performances to complete the event at around 10pm.

"It really is a dream come true for me," said Paul Joseph, "to be sharing this event with my family and community. My daughter, Camille has arrived from London and Willow and his wife, Erica from the USA to help and spend special time with me.

"Willow is now a world class jazz musician and tells me his early memories of being put to sleep in my guitar case backstage in the Bush Theatre were formative in his love for music. Now, over 35 years later, to be sharing the stage with him will be a truly joyful experience for me."

The event will be recorded live by Stuart Batten, master soundman of the region, and the video production by Rohan Langford may be live streamed over the Internet to make it available to friends around the world. A true example of global and local interaction.

Burri Jerome returns from Bunya Mountains and the Goomburra Range with more paintings for his exhibition at Boomalli Aboriginal Artists Cooperative in Flood Street, Leichhardt, Sydney.

Goomburra is the origin of the eleven thousand years old Talgai skull of a 15-year old boy found at Dalrymple Creek, Talgai station in 1884. It was hidden for years because it defied the

popular view at the time that Aboriginal people had only been here for a few hundred years before white settlement. This skull was the first real evidence refuting this.


The skull finished up in the Macleay Museum in Sydney University's Anthropology Dept. The repatriation process has begun says Burri, who has done several drawings of the skull for the exhibition.

Burri Jerome is an extraordinary plein air artist, capturing the ancient pathways and cultural catchment of his people. Burri Jerome brings the country to life with light and colour. His landscapes are breathtaking and are a continual portrayal of his love for nature.

"I would like the landscape to be recognised as an entity, as a personality I work towards the humanising of the landscape, an old tradition here. Old people talk about figures or personalities; I paint portraits of these personalities in the landscape." – Burri Jerome



Man escapes conviction for driving under influence of drugs after eating hemp seeds [Canberra Times]

A Canberra magistrate has urged ACT lawmakers to test hemp seeds to see if they could trigger drugdriving screening tests used by police on the territory's roads. Magistrate Bernadette Boss made the statement as she declined to convict a Hackett man who tested positive to driving with cannabis in his system. Timothy Pendelton, 33, pleaded guilty in the ACT Magistrates Court to drug driving. He told the court that he had not used cannabis and claimed the positive result had been caused because he had been eating products that contained hemp seeds,

including hemp protein, at the time of the test." I don't smoke drugs," he said and cited a previous Magistrates Court case in which a 37year-old Canberra woman's drug-drive case had been dismissed because she had been eating gluten-free muesli that contained the seeds. Dr Boss granted the non-conviction order, saying that it was incumbent on the state to prove that the hemp could not trigger the same result as cannabis in a roadside drug test. Mr

Marijuana study: Suspending kids for pot smoking may encourage further use [Herald Sun]

Suspending children from school for drug use could actually encourage their classmates to smoke pot, rather than deter them. Data from more than 3000 students from year 7-9 from Victoria and Washington State in the United States was analysed. They found that students who were at schools that were counselled and got abstinence messages about the drug were 50% less likely to smoke pot.



Speaking up for Elio

Food catering, I ducked in and out of the Third Medical Cannabis Forum in Nimbin. The hall was wonderfully decorated and the numbers swelled as the information about cannabis was delivered.

A woman with a pram catches my attention. She looks both serious and incredibly self-contained: that look of a person with a great burden. Her husband stays hovering by her side, their second healthy child in his arms, while their son is propped listlessly in his pram. Elio is his name, and he is three and a half years old and suffering from an unknown form of epilepsy. His eyes are glazed with pharmaceutical drugs that cloud his very existence. When these parents produced a medical cannabis trial form to their doctors, they were met with disapproval and their intentions notified to the police under the medical profession's "duty of care."

"I'm so sorry," I say, giving this brave young mum a much-needed hug. She dissolved into tears in my arms. She just wants to save her child.

Thave blood cancer," a quiet, well-dressed lady in her midthirties says to me as I stand next to the information table at the entrance to the room where the first medical cannabis forum in Sydney is still in session.

"I'm so sorry," I reply, but she brushes my sympathy aside with a mere glance of recognition. "Can cannabis help me?" she continues with serious intent. "My doctor just told me two days ago. I don't even know what blood cancer is and I have to start chemotherapy on Monday. I don't even feel sick." She laughs self-consciously and shrugs her shoulders.

The other ladies at the table and I are speechless, each of us acutely aware of this dreadful reality, the cancer epidemic growing alarmingly in our culture. The fear. Each of us offer our advice. I caution her to the nature of the drugs her doctor is about to inflict of her body and urge her to at least seek a second opinion, research her options.

"Go inside. These doctors speaking today are inspiring," I tell the woman. "I know a family whose son had testicular cancer at 16 and with the aid of cannabis oils, tinctures and cookies he is now cancer-free. I can only share what I have seen to be true," I add.

The lady looks strange. Quickly she says, "I have three children. My eldest boy has just had chemotherapy for that. They removed his testicles."

These memories haunt me. Tears won't help these people. Why does it seem like too few people see the gross injustice and sheer bullshit propaganda that stands between sufferers of cancer, epilepsy, multiple sclerosis, aids, post traumatic stress disorder, glaucoma... the list is long.

Children are needlessly suffering here in Australia. They can't speak and their parents and carers are already battling so much. Won't you help Elio gets access to this proven natural ancient healing plant?

Greens MP Dr John Kaye



(pictured, right) attended the Sydney Forum and described our drug laws as irrational. He believes we need to get the law out of cannabis. His experience with a Grandmother ringing him for help for her grand-daughter suffering epilepsy, opened his eyes to the situation and clear medical miracle that cannabis is. He urged other politicians who are unsure to "speak to the Mothers! There is no point waiting for five years for clinical trails," he says.

Dr. Andrew Katalaris reminded everyone that science and the art of prescribing cannabis HAS improved. The Endo-Cannaboid System within the human body is finally being understood and studied. The Hemp seed, one of most nutritious and easily digested foods on the planet, containing protein, essential amino acids and essential fatty acids, is still banned from human consumption in Australia.

Hemp makes more fibre, food, fuel and medicine than any other plant.

One acre of hemp produces 300 gallons of oil, 3 tonnes of protein and 30 tonnes of fibre. As a "smother crop" it is highly efficient in keeping



Australia's voracious weeds at bay and any crop grown after a hemp crop has an increased yield of 20 to 30 per cent.

Mikki Norris, cannabis expert from the US reminded everyone that hemp was the foundation and indeed friend of great civilisations and the growing empires of China, India and Africa. I've been looking for Pipe and can't find him. Most unusual. He knows I have to send in a report on the harvest and he's my best source and happy to co-operate. Of course we play it down and take a few snaps of diseased plants so they are reassured their plant viruses are still alive and the hippies aren't getting rich. The envy in the Force is extremely strong towards stoners and you shouldn't be surprised by it.

How would you like an alarm to rip you out of bed? Hippies don't even own clocks. And the uniform? Half asleep you drag on the uniform and it's like a mask that warps and forces you to become that which you are trained to be. There's no more relaxing and being yourself, whoever that is. After a few years of the morning ritual a new persona takes over and you become just another tool on the workbench at the mercy of the mechanic. And if you think the way

he's fixing the car is insane then you better not mention it, or even let him catch you thinking about it.

Most of us who join the Force are well meaning but naive and by the time I got a mortgage and two kids I was trapped. Applying for Cops, Covert Operations, was the break of my life. I think they expected me to fold after a few years smoking the devils weed but of course the opposite has happened and the jealousy I have to contend with from workmates means they virtually never talk to me. I come in the rear door when I report to the Boss and avoid the oldtimers who know my history.

They've grown fat and soft while I'm thinner and fitter than ever and glowing with health. A lot of it is Pipes orchard and what I've learnt from him about avoiding processed food. And the mountains, walking over the Ranges for hours on end along

barely visible pioneer logging tracks decades overgrown. It's not only wonderland but a fitness camp to boot.

Pipe finally emerged into the clearing where I knew he would eventually.

"I can't show you everything can I," he says with a twinkle.

"I know you don't and fair enough, but I do appreciate our relationship brother."

"Me too," he says and sits on a rock unda some tree ferns and almost disappears. We rarely mention how he knows I'm undacuva like no one else does but alone miles from another human it comes up occasionally.

'What pictures have you taken," he asks and I hand him the tiny thumbnail camera. The snaps are from a few ordinary patches carrying their brown spot disease dropped from the chopper a few years back. Pipe says he has it beaten with new strains he's developed but it angers him. Plants are his life and like brothers and sisters to him. He talks to them more than he talks to humans and says they taught him everything he knows.

I really don't know what's true or not amongst what he tells me because of course he's not sure what I pass on, but he tells me it's a massive harvest. Double double agent stuff can be super stressful as you can imagine but we just don't go there and refuse to worry about it. Who cares anyway? We both know the war on weed is over really, the Gov has been well and truly overgrown and the more they harass the deeper it goes until most Ozweed is indoors now.

But not Pipe's treetop crops that I have sworn to not reveal the secrets of. Hopefully you can work it out for yourself from that. I've been up in the Ranges for two weeks straight and only came down to write this. Pipe won't be down for a month or more. The girls collect the harvest after he's picked and dried it in the caves. I could stay up there forever. After a couple of weeks I noticed my mind started leaving behind the worldly dross and I thought I got a glimpse once or twice of what Pipe calls his.....holy emptiness!
