
## Peace sign plaque unveiling

On Market Sunday 27th September, the Peace Sign "fingers salute" sculpture that has been erected in the grounds of the Nimbin Community Centre will be the focus of a ceremony to celebrate a new sign describing the significance of the artwork.

Created by local artist Graham Knowles, the statue was displayed at the Bentley Blockade Info Tent during the 4-month long vigil to protect the Northern Rivers from unconventional gas mining last year. On the back of the sculpture, Graham has added what he calls a "Podcast," a glazed ceramic insert showing defenders Daniele and Lee coiled yin/yang inside the concrete bunker at Gate A.

Following suspension of the drilling licence, Liberty Camp closed and Graham donated the sculpture to Nimbin. An explanatory sign has been commissioned by the Nimbin Community Centre committee and will be unveiled near The Fingers at noon on Sunday 27th September. Text for the sign was written by Neil Pike, who will provide music for the event.



Graham's work has already become a much-photographed iconic focus for the many visitors to our village. The sign to accompany it will highlight the importance of environmental activism to our local community. Please come and help celebrate this historic event. All welcome.

## Nowin around with PA-C

Most of us have heard this term 'Natural Horsemanship' by now, but what does it actually mean? Obviously keeping a horse in an enclosed space and sitting on its back are not natural, and never will be. It's important that we remain aware of this, and so view anything that a horse does for us as a gift and a blessing, especially when they allow us to sit on them.

For this reason all our attempts at being 'natural' with a horse will be a compromise between what we want and what the horse wants. To ensure that our interactions with a horse are humane and acceptable to the horse it is necessary to meet the horse where they are. By this I mean listening. There is much media hype about 'horse whisperers' and while it is extremely desirable to communicate with as small an aid as possible, it is also imperative that we listen to the horse all the time we are in its presence.

To do this we need to be present. Horses do not live in the past or the future but are very firmly alive in the here and now. To meet the horse we need to let go of all thoughts about our lives as we approach the paddock and from the first moment we greet them be fully in the present moment. Because horses are so good at this they can help us find this place if we're open to it. In this way (and many others) they become our teachers



just as we can be theirs. If your relationship with your horse is based on open two-way communication then what the two of you can do together will truly amaze you.

In order to foster a healthy relationship between you and your horse it is first necessary to remove pain from your interactions. Pain has been the traditional method of controlling horses for thousands of years. Humans inflict pain on horses to get them to do their bidding by using bits (metal in the mouth), spurs, whips and chains (over the nose and through the mouth) among other control/torture devices. These are basically abusive relationships.

Unfortunately pain is a great motivator, and so the horse will do the humans bidding in order to get relief from the pain. Because of this a mentality has arisen that the only way you can control a horse is with the use of pain. This is completely untrue as many of those horses with bits in their mouths and spurs and whips on their sides are definitely not in control. Horses bucking, rearing,

bolting etc. is not uncommon in the horse world, the pain method obviously doesn't work yet it is a very hard concept for people to let go of.

Natural horsemanship is about painless horsemanship, an equal partnership rather than one of domination. Once the pain and abuse is removed from a horse's world, they blossom into the most communicative and willing animals. When you 'ask' a horse to do something using a language they understand instead of forcing them to do it, they nearly always say yes. In fact it's so amazing how willing horses are to hang out and do stuff with us humans when we ask nicely that it's hard not to feel like a barbarian in comparison to them. As soon as we change the way we think about and handle horses, they change right along with us, they don't hang on to baggage.

This amazing creature, the horse, has been intimately involved with humans for thousands of years. They have fed us, ploughed our fields, taken us to war, entertained us and carted us and all our stuff around for thousands of years. I think it's time to say thank you and give back to the horse

# Rochdale Thriller







# National industrial hemp body formed

While there have been Hemp Industry Associations in most states for some time, the recently formed Australian Industrial Hemp Alliance is the industry's first collaborative national body. Its main focus is to fully develop the low THC hemp fibre and seed industries in Australia for their multiple industrial applications.

According to the founding members of the Alliance, representatives from the Queensland Industrial Hemp Association, Northern Rivers and NSW Industrial Hemp Associations and the Dungog Growers Group, industrial hemp has too much to offer in terms of regional renewal, employment and too much manufacturing potential to be ignored. Especially in light of the massive growth in demand for hemp products globally and Australia's need to transition to sustainable manufacturing industries.

Consumers are increasingly leading the response to the environmental issues we're facing with their spending, rather than waiting for governments. According to the Alliance, that's a healthy thing.

The Alliance's first task has been to write to the Ministerial Forum on Food Regulation about their refusal to recommend a change in legislation to allow Australians to eat hemp foods, announced in February this year after a meeting of the Forum in Auckland. Approval has been refused despite Food Standards Australia and New Zealand again confirming that hemp foods are a safe food source.

What is also clearly recorded in the submissions is hempseed's overwhelmingly beneficial nutritional profile. The health benefits of low THC hemp seed have been



thoroughly researched in modern times and they are also well-recorded in Chinese and Ayurvedic medicine. As a food, hemp has a history spanning thousands of years. Up until prohibition that is, when the Western world outlawed it.

According to Klara Marosszeky, President of the newly-formed body, the Alliance which welcomes industry collaborators to its membership, has requested meetings with concerned Ministers and the opportunity to have industry input to the Forum.

"We believe that the hemp industry which is operating successfully within a regulatory framework particularly in NSW, where hemp farming is seeing solid expansion, is well positioned to discuss the issues, to bring the relevant research to the table and to clarify issues in such a way that meets the needs of government, agriculture and industry. We look forward to having the opportunity to discuss the issues and to have input to the solutions. "

# CBDs, the hippies' bane

Ah, the irony! For years the hippies and pot smokers of the world have been breeding in THC (Tetra Hydra Cannabinol) and breeding out the CBDs (Cannabidiol) of our cannabis plants; little did we know.

THC is the larrikin, the joker in the pack, the active ingredient in the pot that gets you wasted. That's why we have been selecting for it, that's the reason the pot we grow gets us all so happily smashed. But it has turned out a mistake.

While Delta 9 THC holds the key to many of weed's medicinal attributes it is by no means the end of the story. And yes, THC is necessary to relax, to dull pain and to open up the dopamine and serotonin receptors so the other components of the cannabis plant can operate within our cannabinoid system: a system endemic in every creature with feet and a heartbeat. It is necessary, along with terpinoids and flavinoids within the plant, to deliver what is called the entourage effect. Think of THC as the one who knows the bouncers at the door of the nightclub we call the cannabinoid system: without him the other CBDs would be left outside to mill about

ineffectively.

Only recently have we had the means to check our pot scientifically, and the information we have uncovered has been startling: the pot we grow, although rich in THC has proved decidedly lacking in CBDs, the other 100 or so active chemical chains involved in all vertibrates' wellbeing.

Recent studies from the Guzzman clinic in Spain and several Israeli studies have found CBDG will heal broken bones at an amazing six times the rate of untreated broken bones. Mothers' milk, it turns out, has the second highest concentration of CBDs after the cannabis plant, and it is these cannabinoids that plasticise the infant's skull to allow for brain expansion. CBD coats the telomeres on neurones that regulate the electric signals; in the real world this means epilepsy and assorted twitching are no longer the curse they once were.

Recently we have been formulating medicines using our own high quality THC plants with the addition of imported CBD oil from Denmark. The THC component was illegal but the CBDs were available, if sourced surreptitiously. They recently re-scheduled them even, getting us all excited,

but customs clearly missed the news and grabbed the lot for themselves.

There is no good reason for this confiscation of the non psychoactive component of cannabis, as all it can do is good: there is no lethal or even harmful dose, but Big Pharma has got the word: the medicines we are making were effective, cheap and easy to manufacture. Anyone can grow and mix their own, and this is just not cool for Big Pharmas business model.

So we have been forced to breed our own high CBD strains. This will sideline customs and allow us to continue with medicinal development and manufacture.

Our government would regulate our new industry as they would regulate pot growing on every level, but sadly (for them that is) cannabis will not be regulated: she has a mind and spirit of her own and cannabis prohibition will go the way of alcohol prohibition of the 30's.

There will be a time lag between growing our own CBD rich plants and the extraction into our medicines but only that, a delay. And then we will have our own supply. So thank you customs and thank you Big Pharma, you have forced us to grow up.

# Hemp Headlines

### Fairfield doctor leads Australia's first medical cannabis trial [Daily Telegraph]

Thirty terminal cancer patients could have their last days drastically improved thanks to Australia's first medical cannabis trial. The groundbreaking trial, headed by Associate Professor Meera Agar, palliative care clinical director at Fairfield's Braeside Hospital, will focus on helping terminally ill cancer patients who have lost their appetite. "This trial is a really big first step," she said. "Eating is not just a medical problem. This is a trial about quality of life."

## US government says cannabis kills cancer cells [Telegraph]

The US government has confirmed that cannabis can kill cancer cells after the drug did so in tests on mice and rats, according to the National Cancer Institute. On its website The National Cancer Institute, part of the US department of health, said: "Laboratory and animal studies have shown that cannabinoids (the active ingredient in cannabis) may be able to kill cancer cells while protecting normal cells. "They may inhibit tumour growth by causing cell death, blocking cell growth, and blocking the development of blood vessels needed by tumours to grow." The studies in rodents show that cannabinoids may reduce the risk of colon, liver and breast cancer, and could make chemotherapy more effective. But researchers added: "At this time, there is not enough evidence to recommend that patients inhale or ingest cannabis as a treatment for cancer-related symptoms or side effects of cancer therapy."

# Massive, long term study shows no health harms from Cannabis. Where are the headlines? [Cannabis Law Reform]

Long term cannabis use by teenage boys is not linked to later physical or mental health issues according to a very large, long term study published by the American Psychological Association. Where are the front page headlines, the hysterical editorials, the hand wringing, bleating and scaremongering from the Daily Telegraph and the Daily Mail? They seem to be very quiet on this one. To be fair the Mail has covered it but the leaders in anti-cannabis propaganda at the Telegraph have ignored it and so have the BBC. What a surprise! Even Jon 'Skunk' Snow, the latest journalist to sacrifice his integrity on the altar of reefer madness, is completely silent. No grandstanding opportunities on this one. This is a huge study of 408 males tracked from adolescence into their mid-30s.

The results have been published in *Psychology* of *Addictive Behaviors* and comprehensively demolish the many, much smaller, 'snapshot' studies that the *Mail*, the *Telegraph* and the BBC have given massive prominence to in the past.

### Novak Djokovic left 'dizzy' after 'cannabis smell' at the Rogers Cup [Telegraph]

Novak Djokovic advanced to the final of the Rogers Cup in Montreal despite the off-putting smell of someone in the crowd smoking marijuana. The world No 1 comfortably beat France's Jeremy Chardy 6-4, 6-4 but not before he had complained about the smell of cannabis. He told the umpire: "Someone is smoking weed, I can smell it, and I'm getting dizzy. Somebody is getting high. Can you smell it? The whole place smells of it."

## Chile Is about to decriminalize marijuana [AlterNet]

With its proposed changes to Ley 20.000 (Law 20,000), Chile joins a growing list of Latin American countries decriminalizing marijuana. The initiative, which would grant Chileans the right to possess up to 10 grams of cannabis and grow up to six marijuana plants at a time, was passed in Chile's Chamber of Deputies on July 7 with 68 voting in favor and 39 against. The bill must first be adjusted by a health commission and then passed by the Senate before it officially becomes law, but strong support for cannabis legalization in the country illustrates that legalizing marijuana use appears to be the new norm in the Western Hemisphere and, once again, that the War on Drugs has been a failed campaign.

# US start-up plans to deliver marijuana to customers by drone [Evening Standard]

A US start-up is awaiting the regulatory green light to deliver marijuana direct to smokers doors via drones. Trees Delivery, which hopes to get the go ahead to start its service in California, will allow its customers to place orders through their phone or computer, pay with virtual currency Bitcoin and receive their goods almost instantly. San Francisco-based Trees offers three 'boxes': the bud box, which includes exotic and hard to find strains, the extract box, which contains hash, and a beginner box. The boxes also

contain accessories such as paper and filter tips, grinders, lighters and rolling papers. The catch? Smokers must have a medical license to order marijuana under the law. Trees is awaiting approval from the US Federal Aviation Administration to fly its drones.

### Drug possession offences should not be used to assess police performance, research suggests

[Telegraph UK]

Drug possession should be removed from police performance measures, research claims. This would allow officers to concentrate on crimes that "cause most harm" rather than targeting low-level possession of cannabis, according to the study. Controversy over police approaches to cannabis possession erupted recently after some crime commissioners suggested that personal users will no longer be actively pursued by their forces.

# Taking cannabis in your teens is 'NOT linked to depression, lung cancer or asthma in later life', study reveals [Daily Mail UK]

Using marijuana as a teenager does not appear to be linked to health problems such as depression, psychotic symptoms or asthma later in life, a study has revealed. Researchers found no difference in the mental or physical health of adults who had smoked cannabis as a teenager, and those who had not. 'What we found was a little surprising,' said lead researcher Dr Jordan Bechtold, of the University of Pittsburgh Medical Center. 'There were no differences in any of the mental or physical health outcomes that we measured regardless of the amount or frequency of marijuana used during adolescence.

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
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
