

Climate activists converge on Canberra

In federal parliament's first week back, the People's Climate Assembly held a programme of events on the lawns of Parliament House.

The Assembly ran from Sunday 2nd to Thursday 6th February, and featured live performances, workshops and music every day.

"We're a coalition of concerned citizens and action groups gathering in Canberra to raise our national voice and demand the federal parliament declare a climate emergency now, and take immediate action on climate change," a statement from the organisers said.

"The people of Australia will no longer accept complacency and denial of the truth."

Talks featured scientists, healthcare professionals and infrastructure specialists.

On Tuesday 4th, around 100 people with signs and costumes were at Parliament House from 7am to meet and greet politicians on their way in to the first sitting day.

A large Climate Emergency Rally was held later, attended by about 2500 people, a great improvement on the 500 last year.

A feature of the four-day Assembly was the presence of the Red Rebels, who converged from Adelaide, Armidale, Bangalow, Brunswick Heads, Lismore and elsewhere, doing slow walks or frozen poses in red on the streets, parks and shopping malls.
