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
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Thankful generosity at NYE fundraiser

am feeling conflicted. The future looks both frightening and hopeful. As Greta Thunberg says, "I don't want you to offer us hope. I want you to panic... and act as if your house was on fire... because it is."

Our political leaders do not think our fires are emergency enough to call out the military. Threatened infrastructure is the priority; wildlife is helpless. What about trying to save what we have left of the natural world so that disasters become less frequent and less severe? That would leave more of everything for more species to share.

Instead, we face spending \$225B on new submarines, \$1B to move the Powerhouse Museum to Parramatta, and still more on Sydney sporting venues. That money could go towards National Parks to re-employ muchneeded staff who could carry out hazard reduction programs.

Instead, our volunteer RFS is tired and traumatised from months of unpaid dangerous work. Our local RFS stopped the fire on Mt. Nardi but only with the help of untrained locals who bravely pitched in. Homes and forests were saved, thanks to them.

If we are to get serious about fire emergencies, our governments must recognise that the catastrophic conditions we face are the result of anthropogenic climate change. We need a full-on commitment to a global effort, not the paltry, parsimonious platitudes offered by our national leaders. To pretend that Australia is "doing it's bit" is weak and ineffective when we continue to mine and export coal and gas.

We must all embrace new ways of living. We need to get out of environmentally destructive operations such as raising beef, turning precious trees into wood chips for export, mining our water to sell abroad, and approving developments that destroy critical wildlife habitat. Our governments should protect our resources, not exploit them further.



They should work on preventing disasters, not say they can help only in "the recovery phase" after a disaster.

Precaution is even more important now. NEFA President Dailan Pugh said: "We have these mega fires that are moving across the landscape. The biggest difference [from past forests fires] is we're not getting much landscape left unburned or fauna refuges left..."

Pugh continued: "An expert workshop in 2012 estimated that Koala populations on the north coast had declined by 50% in the past 20 years, leaving an extant population of around 8,400 Koalas. It is likely that thousands of these now have been killed, with many populations now on the verge of collapse.

"In just one fire season, which is not over yet, thousands of koalas have lost their homes, and most of these are likely to have died. These fires have greatly compounded the plight of Koalas and driven them, and numerous other species, further towards extinction.

"If we want to give Koalas a chance to survive this unfolding catastrophe then a logging moratorium must

immediately be placed upon all potential Koala habitat in order to allow burnt (scorched) feed trees a chance to recover, and to protect the remaining intact refuges essential as source areas for re-colonisation."

The biodiversity that makes for a sustainable world is becoming dangerously depleted through misuse of the environment, such as forest clearing to create more grazing space for cattle. More smoke, more hamburgers. Crunch Time is now. The decisions we make in 2020 are critical to the planet's future.

Jane Goodall said, "What you do makes a difference, and you have to decide what kind of différence you want to make."

I sometimes worry that we can't turn things around before it all falls apart. Then I remember the ozone crisis of the 1970s. World leaders got together and banned the use of the CFCs that were causing the problem. By the end of the century, the emissions had reduced to nothing and the hole in the ozone layer had filled back in.

Yes, we can do this. All we need is the political will to make changes and – dare I say it – some real leadership.



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

Mulgum Creek remediation

Nimbin Environment Centre has received funding from the Australlian Government's Communities Environment Program for a hands-on project to restore riparian rainforest on an upper section of Mulgum Creek.

This stretch of creek was chosen because it has some serious incursions of environmental weeds and provides connectivity with other areas where bush regeneration activities have taken place.

Removing pest plants in this zone will also reduce their impacts further downstream.

The project will include

workshops on plant ID. Participants will learn to recognise emerging native plants as well as exotic species, and join in hand weeding and planting

working bees.

The aim is to use best practice bush regeneration techniques with a focus on green and organic methods.

To reduce the use of chemical requires many hands. It is labour intensive but the rewards are many.

Australia is a poster child for climate chaos

It's the beginning of another year and a new decade but there's nothing at all to be optimistic about and tragically for every one of us, there's no light at the end of the tunnel, not this time.

Australia is making international headlines and the world is watching on in horror as apocalyptic weather cripples the nation. *The Washington Post* has named us 'the poster child for climate change' and extinction of the human race never looked more certain and it's definitely not a farfetched theory anymore.

Before the commencement of the climate summit the Secretary General for the UN announced;

"The point of no return is no longer on the horizon. It is in sight and hurtling towards us."

We had 25,000 delegates representing 200 nations attend the summit in Madrid and a handful were determined to corrupt the process, while the EU, small island nations and many under developed states desperately tried to persuade these major emitters to reduce their emissions.

Australia was one of the accused and is fifth in the world overall, which is shameful from a wealthy nation that has one of the smallest populations.

A report by Greenpeace used satellite data published by NASA, identifying the world's highest levels of sulphur dioxide which is a major pollutant and Australia ranked twelfth. We were singled out for standards that allow power stations at Victoria's Latrobe Valley and NSW's Lake Macquarie to emit

m SO}_2$ at higher levels than China, the European Union and most of the world, where it's illegal and eleven times higher than the World Health Organisation's recommendation.

Decades of environmental negligence and not listening to the world's scientists has brought us here and now 100 fires are burning in NSW alone and half of them are out of control. Hundreds of people are literally fleeing their homes and Sydney is completely surrounded by fire and blanketed in dense smoke that has drifted to the outskirts of Melbourne.

The heatwave in December was frightening when temperatures reached 49 in South Australia and for two consecutive days Australia averaged just above 40, when usually the average temperature for the

nation during summer was 27.5.

It's not only the land that's under attack but also our oceans where warming off Tasmania's east coast has climbed nearly four times the global average and Australia's atmospheric temperature hasn't reached 2° celsius yet, but look at what we're witnessing.

Australia has been facing environmental bankruptcy for some time now, yet the majority of voters turned their back on Labor's comprehensive package aimed at rejuvenating and protecting the environment because in this cut throat world money doesn't talk, it screams. The proposal of franking credits and abolishing negative gearing, wasn't to their liking and instead they chose the continuation of environmental destruction.

On many occasions Greta Thunberg has referred to governments and the powers that be as evil. So you tell me, what does that make the voter of Australia?

Ironically, the economy is taking an absolute pounding and Australia is facing a massive bill from these fires, that have up to now burned an area the size of Belgium, killing eight people and thousands and thousands of defenseless animals. Disturbingly, our forests may never return if significant rain doesn't arrive.

The medical bill is expected to run into 100's of millions because of not only the fires but the smoke haze and insurance companies are being inundated with claims. Some analysts have speculated that it's costing Sydney as much as \$50

million per day, in a city that usually generates \$1.2 billion of economic activity daily.

Last year was the tenth year in a row that the UN has had to release an emissions gap report and the gap is steadily rising by 1.5% and if the world's top fossil fuel producing countries stay on their current trajectories, which includes Australia who is third in the world, production of oil, gas and coal will increase 50% by 2030.

Scientists now realise that irreversible changes in our ecosystems are taking place in nine parts of the global climate system and they are on the verge of reaching tipping point. What this means is a rapid runaway greenhouse gas effect has begun and this is news scientists never wanted to hear.

I've said it before but it really needs to be repeated, Australians are one of the most wasteful societies in the world and were never prepared to sacrifice anything in life but now they're choking on smoke and running scared, suddenly they want climate action. They left this government to their own devices and better late than never, just doesn't apply to global warming and never did. This is why our final curtain call has come and gone.

We were the lucky country once but not anymore and when I contemplate the decade ahead that sense of permanency I once felt has been replaced with fear and apprehension, as I watch the dominoes fall, taking our magnificent monuments to nature with them. Now the million dollar question is, how long have we got?
