




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Buy Back Nimbin launch

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The continuing trials of Julian Assange

The UK High Court is currently hearing the US appeal against the decision of a lower court to deny the US request for the extradition of Julian Assange.

The punishment meted out to this award-winning Australian journalist has been epic. He has been detained in the UK by Australia's two AUKUS allies for eleven years.

Despite never having been convicted of a crime, Assange has spent the past two years in Belmarsh Prison, awaiting deportation to the US, where he faces a possible 175 year sentence – an innocent man in a living hell.

In 2019, Nils Melzer, the United Nation's Special Rapporteur on Torture, denounced the action of Sweden, the UK, and the US, in ganging up to deliberately isolate, demonise and abuse Assange.

He declared their systematic misuse of legal procedures was a form of legal torture and warned that Mr Assange's human rights would be seriously violated if he were extradited to the United States. Julian Assange's father John Shipton, who was in London for his son's latest judicial hearing, spoke about the importance of the court case.

He was pleased that Lord Chief Justice of England and Ireland, Ian Duncan, England's most powerful judge, was on the bench with Lord Justice Timothy Holroyd.

"The judge is the most powerful judge in the UK, the chief justice of England and Wales, and it was in his court that the hearing was held," he said.

"This is a sign of an absolute seriousness within the English judiciary emerging. They want to settle this case. It is timely the Chief Justice has involved himself." Since the US launched their appeal, argues Mr Shipton, the revelation that the CIA were planning to kidnap Assange from the Ecuadorean Embassy and they had solicited scenarios on how to murder him have become a huge story.

As well, the Icelandic intermediary, who was the prime witness for the hacking charge, has recanted his testimony.



"I feel they are embarrassed by their behaviour," Mr Shipton said.

Twenty months have passed since Julian Assange first appeared in the Westminister Magistrate Court to face the extradition proceedings. The Judges in this case will consider their opinion for several months more. Even if they lose, the US can again appeal.

One of the worst things for a prisoner is knowing when they will be released, and the legal torture could continue for another decade.

PS: 'The film, *Ithika*, about John Shipton's journeys to the North Coast and even wilder regions in his campaign to raise support for his son Julian, was released at the Sydney Film Festival on the 27th October.

It was directed by awardwinning Australian director Ben Lawrence, who shot part of the film in Nimbin last year.



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Gold in the hills – Mt Carrington near Drake

Gold mining is again on the agenda, this time for the Northern Rivers community of Drake.

The Mt Carrington Gold Project is a proposed open cut gold mine and processing operation, to be developed approximately three kilometres north of Drake. The township of Drake is around 40km east of Tenterfield.

There is an existing operation on site that hosts legacy issues in the form of acid mine drainage. The mine sits on Sawpit Creek, which flows into Plumbago Creek and then on into the Clarence River.

be mined and processed, to produce approximately 165,700 ounces of gold. The community is invited to subscribe for project updates at: https://form.jotform. com/212641504675858 The NSW Department of Planning, Industry and the project. The project will be assessed as a State Significant Development (SSD), under Part 4 of the NSW Environmental Planning and Assessment Act 1979. This will involve preparing an Environmental Impact Statement (EIS).

The project is commencing a Scoping Phase, which

the specialist environmental, social and economic studies to be undertaken, as part of preparing an EIS.

The way SSD projects are assessed in NSW is changing. From 1 July 2022, all environmental impact statements attached to state significant development (SSD) and state significant infrastructure (SSI) applications will need to be reviewed by a registered environmental assessment practitioner (REAP).



Open questions

How do you see Council's relationship with the business community?

Custodians again reject dam proposal

The Widjabul Wia-bal people reaffirmed their opposition to the Dunoon Dam during National Water Week last month, which had the slogan 'Caring for Water and Country'.

A statement from the Traditional Custodians reads:

We, Custodians of Widjabul Wiabal lands of the Bundjalung Nation and neighbouring tribes, want you to know that the area to be affected, the proposed Dunoon Dam, is significant to us, to our people.

We need to protect this land. It is important for the connection to our ancestors and for our future generations to be able to connect to their ancestors and traditions.

This land holds our relationship with

our living heritage and our culture. For thousands of generations we have lived on this land and protected it while it protected and fed us. The proposed dam would destroy the learning

grounds for future generations. The valley to be drowned by the dam at the end of Fraser Road is the site where we were moved to after we were dispossessed just over 100 years ago. It is an important as part of our survival journey.

We, the traditional custodians of this land, will not accept its destruction. No compensation will replace its importance to us and our following generations.

We call on Rous County Council to return the lands that it controls

to the traditional custodians. Do not construct the Dunoon Dam. Do not destroy our living culture.

Uncle John Roberts, a senior Widjabul Wia-bal Elder said, "I was one of the stakeholders consulted in 2011 about the impact of the Dunoon Dam on cultural heritage.

"In the 2011 Cultural Heritage Impact Assessment prepared for Rous, we stakeholders said with one voice that no level of disturbance was acceptable to us.

"We still say that. Nothing has changed. There is no need for another study. Our opinion has not changed." To find out more about

The Richmond Valley Regional Jobs Precinct in Casino, the beef capital of NSW, has been identified as one of four regional locations to build a toxic waste to energy incinerator, according to the NSW Government's recently released Energy from Waste Infrastructure Plan and NSW Energy from Waste Policy Statement.

The Government's Plan states it is: "Taking precautionary steps to restrict energy from waste from parts of NSW to protect human health and air quality". The Plan bans incinerators in Sydney because of serious air pollution concerns yet sees fit to dump Sydney's waste and associated toxic pollution in Casino, a region known for its agricultural produce and environmentally sensitive

ecosystems. Outraged residents have quickly formed the group Residents Against the Richmond Valley Incinerator. Spokeswoman Liz Stops is shocked and

angered by the plan, and fears the region will be stigmatised by a polluting incinerator.

"I'm no expert but locating a polluting incinerator right next to cattle sale yards and the meatworks surely poses unacceptable risks to industry, exports and the livelihood of the farming community as pollution is spread all over the region," she said.

"As a grandmother I am also concerned, not just for my grandchildren, but for vulnerable residents who may develop serious health effects from exposure to incinerator

air pollution emissions." The group sought advice from incinerator pollution experts, the National Toxics Network about the risks of pollution from waste incinerators.

'We already know from the scientific literature that communities living in the vicinity of waste incinerators have increased risks of cancers and reproductive disorders from exposures to dangerous pollutants such as dioxins and nanoparticle air pollutants that lodge deep in the lungs. Children are at greatest risk," said Ms Jo Immig, Co-ordinator, National Toxics Network.

"Europe and the USA are removing public subsidies and closing down incinerators because they create pollution and dirty energy while entrenching a

disposal mindset."

"No matter how much you dress incinerators up as 'state of the art technology' and 'worlds' best practice', the fact is incinerators create dangerous air pollutants and toxic fly ash that needs to be disposed of in a hazardous waste landfill. Once up and running they don't provide many jobs either."

"The NSW Government must go back to the drawing board and deliver genuine zero waste policies that incentivise re-design, re-use and recycling, which are the foundations of a real circular economy. Burning plastic in incinerators for 'energy' is no better than burning coal," Ms Immig concluded. A Facebook group,

The great news that councillors on Lismore City Council (LCC) had voted to not pull up the tracks in their shire for a bike trail has since turned sour when the announcement was made that rail embankments would however be pulled down as part of the flood mitigation strategy!

This is unbelievable when this measure, along with four others, will only lower the flood level by 100mm or 4 inches! The deliberate destruction of our heritage railway line doesn't fit with Mayor Vanessa Ekins' statement on River FM recently about retaining our rail lines for the return of future rail

However, it seems that LCC staff had applied for 'rail trail' (trail without the rail) funding with the rails being pulled up, but councillors were not aware of this stipulation. [Rail managers have said that the \$17.5 million allocated to a bike path is enough to bring rail services back to the Casino – Lismore section!] Two railway companies, one a notfor-profit community owned charitable company: Northern Rivers Rail Ltd, have been registered to bring rail services back to our Casino -Murwillumbah line and supporters of the return of rail to the Northern Rivers are incensed that the pulling up of tracks is being promoted. The best win-

line. The cost of rebuilding embankments for rail is massive if lost and we have an obvious public transport and tourism need for residents and visitors to travel safely around our beautiful and much visited region, but time is running out for rail services if our line is lost! The combination of both rail and trail has been shown as by far the best financial outcome (see Arcadis' 'Multi Use of Byron Railway Corridor' report: \$1.50 returned for every \$1 invested). 

About 50 activists from around the Northern Rivers gathered on 22nd October at Condong within view of the smokestacks where Cape Byron Power (CBP) burns biomass to create electricity to share with Sunshine Sugar on the same

premises. The original intention was to burn leftovers from cane harvests, and Mandy Nolan I was glad that burning stopped so the cane ash stopped falling

all over the region. Who could say what toxins were in the ash?

However, the burning in the fields soon started again, and trucks carrying wood waste from near and far rolled in to be burned for power.

The Biomass Action Group sought a meeting with CBP at Condong mill. CBP said they were concerned about global pollution and truck nuisance/danger on quiet rural roads. But they refused to tell us their fuel mix or how much was sourced from timber. as that was "commercial in confidence."

They would not say what subsidies they receive from government or what Sunshine Sugar pays for their electricity. We did learn, however that CBP has nothing to do with Cape Byron. It's owned by Quinbrook, a UK company.

International Day of Action on #BigBadBiomass

As part of the world-wide campaign to focus on biomass burning ahead of the international conference on climate change in Glasgow, forest protectors took action at Broadwater mill on 21st October by hanging a banner on the conveyor crossing the highway at Broadwater, which carried wood for burning in the CBP

The convenor of our regional Friday4Forests action group, Sean O'Shannessy, also spoke and told the audience that saving forests is climate action and burning them is climate vandalism.

NEFA President Dailan Pugh sent the following message: "With only days to go until world leaders gather in Glasgow in an attempt to negotiate significant reductions in greenhouse gas emissions, conservationists around the globe are focussing on biomass."

He went on to say, "The pretence that replacing wood for coal is carbon neutral is a dangerous fallacy because it is actually far more polluting than coal, increasing atmospheric CO_2 , displacing the genuine and cheaper renewables of wind and solar, and taking out the trees we urgently need to capture and store CO_2 over this critical decade.

"Increasing logging and clearing to feed power plants will also compound our rapidly accelerating extinction crisis at a time when we are meant to be increasing habitat protection. Replacing coal with wood is climate and environmental vandalism; we need to stop the NSW biomass industry getting started.
