he United Nations declared 19th November World Toilet Day – the official day to ponder toilets, appreciate toilets, and recognise the serious health problems that arise with inadequate public toilets.

Unfortunately the Nimbin community can't celebrate this day because we still don't have one in Peace Park.

The Lismore City Council has at last weighed in on the toilet issue for Peace Park. They have come in as featherweight, easily blown away.

Councillor Adam Guise proposed a motion to actively seek funding for a toilet block at the last Council meeting on Tuesday 11th October. This was in addition to Janelle Safin's commitment to apply to the NSW Government for funding.

Councillor Rob amended this motion, excluding the need for the Council to make any application. It passed, despite the explanation from Councillor Ekins, that doubles the chance of success when supported by two bodies.

Cr Rob argued that because Janelle Safin represents the Labor Party in NSW Parliament, and Adam Guise is an endorsed candidate for the Green Party, the Council would be taking sides.

Looks like anything can be turned into a political football and kicked around, until lost in the mud. It's not a Labor vs Greens

It's not a Labor vs Greens issue, it's a Lismore City neglect.

One of the new councillors asked why has it taken so long for the council to consider the problem, then voted against the Council seeking funding. She was happy for Janelle to apply, but not the Council, as were another five councillors. To clarify the location, Scott Turner, Assets Manager, explained it should be positioned to service the pool, accessible from inside and outside in the park, seats, close to the children's playground, outdoor exercise equipment and skate park. It's hardly radical stuff, a toilet block in a park. But there is hesitation, obscuration, twists and spurious allegations.



Community Care Teams and local emergency radio network launched

he Nimbin Disaster Resilience Group (NDRG) has been working hard not only to assist the community in recovering from the 2022 floods but also to prepare for the disaster events that we are inevitably going to be experiencing with more frequency and severity in the future.

A huge thanks to the tireless efforts of all members of the Nimbin Disaster Resilience Group and to all members of the Nimbin Emergency Radio Network for your dedication to the project and the many winter nights spent standing outside performing radio tests.

We are very proud to finally share the details of Nimbin Emergency Radio Network and announce that we have received funding to roll out the much anticipated Community Care Team project.

If you missed our Q&A sessions at the Nimbin Community Disaster Plan launch and workshop day in October at the Nimbin Bowling Club, you might be wondering what we are talking about. Let me explain:

What is the Nimbin Emergency Radio Network?

The Nimbin Emergency Radio Network has been developed to provide an effective way for residents of the Nimbin Valley to contact response personnel when their region becomes geographically isolated and phone services are lost.


Community members in strategic locations were invited to become radio holders in early 2022 and have been provided with equipment and training. The role of the radio holder is to access 000 emergency services as needed, request necessary items and services (food, water, medical supplies etc) and to provide information to response agencies as needed.

The project essentially divides the Nimbin Valley into 14 localities (*see map*) and aims to ensure that there is at least one trained radio holder in each locality at all times. Additionally, Nimbin town is equipped with a radio "base", to receive transmissions from radio holders and relay them to relevant response personnel during a disaster event.

The network is tested monthly to ensure everything is working as it should be, and our wonderful radio holders continue to develop their skills and training on an ongoing basis.

I have my own CB radio, can I join the Nimbin Emergency Radio Network?

Due to the nature of citizen band radio, it is essential that our network remains





relatively small to be effectively used in emergency situations.

Once a channel is public, anybody, anywhere can listen to transmissions, and as an emergency network we need to be able to share information which may be personal in nature, for example if you are having a stroke and trying to call for an ambulance, you don't want everybody to be able to pick up the phone and listen to your 000 call.

It is also essential that in disaster events, response personnel can rely on trusted information sources to effectively distribute resources. A prank call that gets a helicopter sent out to the hills for no reason can cost lives and extraordinary amounts of resources. For our network to effectively serve our community in times of crisis we have decided to remain a private network.

However, we are still looking to recruit additional radio holders for the following regions: Stony Chute, Mountain Top, Blue Knob, Lillian Rock, Jiggi Valley and Tuntable Falls Road (Lower)/ Kirkland Road. If you are based in these localities and are interested in becoming part of our team, please get in touch.

What are the Community Care Teams?

We are so excited to finally roll out the much-anticipated Community Care Team (CCT) project! The aim of the project is to ensure that all members of our community are quickly accounted for in a disaster, and that everyone has a way to access help when their region becomes isolated and phone services are lost.

We aim to recruit at least six community members in each locality of Nimbin (see map) to form CCT, more may be needed in larger localities. CCTs will be trained in the

knowledge and skills necessary to safely carry out welfare checks and identify needs within their communities when their locality becomes isolated.

Training will include first aid, psychological first aid, trauma informed communication, confidentiality protocols, identifying skills and resources within your locality, identifying likely disaster impacts in your region and more.

Community Care Teams will work in partnership with the radio holders to communicate with local response agencies. The project also aims to hold regular community engagement events in each locality to strengthen community connections, as we have learned, knowing your community is the most important thing in a disaster event!

We would love to hear from anyone interested in joining a Community Care Team in their region.

Revised Nimbin Disaster Plan

The revised Nimbin Disaster Plan which includes the new Community Response and Recovery Plan can be viewed on the Nimbin Neighbourhood Centre website.

We are currently seeking responses to the plan through the on-line feedback and input form on the website, open until Monday 14th November.



The trials of Bernard Collaery

In his first public speech since Attorney-General Mark Dreyfus discontinued his long-running prosecution, Canberra lawyer and former ACT Attorney-General Bernard Collaery addressed the Queensland Council of Civil Liberties (QCCL) on 5th October, demanding a Royal Commission into the affair. The roots of Collaery's prosecution date back two decades to Dili in 2004 when an employee of the Australian Secret Intelligence Service (ASIS), identified only as Witness K, oversaw bugging operations in Timor-Leste ordered by the then Australian Government to gain a commercial advantage during negotiations with the East Timorese over oil and gas reserves in the Timor Sea that promised enormous profits.

Australia's underhanded duplicity might have remained hidden had it not been for Witness K, a senior intelligence officer who felt deeply uncomfortable about the operation. Witness K's disquiet became significantly amplified in 2008 when Alexander Downer, the former long-serving Minister for Foreign Affairs, which oversees ASIS, retired from politics and took up a lucrative consultancy with Woodside Petroleum, which led the consortium that was awarded the contract to develop the oil fields.

Witness K approached the intelligence watchdog, the Inspector General of Intelligence and Security (IGIS) about his concerns and obtained permission to talk to an approved lawyer, Bernard Collaery, a prominent barrister experienced in security matters.

Collaery, who had previously acted as an advisor to the Timor-Leste resistance, told the audience about his indignation when Witness K informed him about the treacherous behaviour of the Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade (DFAT).

"After years and years of assisting the Timorese resistance, and working with the leader of the resistance Shanana Gusmao, and developing what I could in terms of trust ... to have Witness K come to my office and tell me something so marked with treachery, words still fail me," said Collaery.

"So marked with treachery... so immoral... so unethical... but worse still, so counter to all of our national interests! This was putting 30 pieces of



silver – money for corporate mates! – ahead of our interest in ensuring that we develop good relations with the Timorese and outplay those others who were interested, particularly China.'

As Collaery and his team investigated, he stumbled upon another enormous scandal. Because of the unusual wording of the agreement, billions of dollars of the rare element helium were given away for free to two companies, ConocoPhillips and Woodside.

When Timor-Leste took its case to the Permanent Court of Arbitration in The Hague, declaring that it wished to withdraw from existing treaty commitments with Australia because of their bad faith behaviour, ASIO, which is also run by DFAT, and the federal police raided Collaery's offices and seized a draft of Witness K's affidavit and Collaery's legal advice on Timor-Leste's entitlements and its strategy for the court proceedings. Australia also cancelled Witness K's passport to prevent him travelling to The Hague to testify for Timor-Leste.

In 2018 Attorney-General Christian Porter made the decision to charge Collaery and Witness K under the National Security Information Act (NSI Act) with unlawfully disclosing information about the ASIS mission in Timor-Leste.

"It never entered our heads that a law being introduced to deal with terrorism, actually would be employed against us first," said Collaery. "I am the only person to be prosecuted under that legislation to have been treated to the full measure of it."

The provisions of the NSI Act allow what is called judge-only evidence, evidence that neither an accused nor their lawyers can see. On numerous occasions over the four years of his prosecution, Collaery and his lawyers had to leave the courtroom so secret evidence about him could be given to the judge.

On what moral basis, Collaery asked, do Australian complaints about secret trials of Australians in Iran and China have weight, when the same thing happens here? Witness K was similarly charged and convicted in a secret trial, while David McBride, who blew the whistle on SAS war crimes in Afghanistan, is currently undergoing his secret trial. These cases are comparable to Julian Assange's where national security laws are misused to prosecute whistle-blowers and protect the guilty.

In a devastating development for whistleblower David McBride, his claim to access Australia's whistleblower protection laws failed when the Federal Government claimed public interest immunity. He now faces the prospect of 50 years in prison. A GetUp petition is at: https://getup.to/KEPK4FP2rFNE3sG

Collaery called for a review of the NSI Act and demanded a Royal Commission to investigate the bugging of the Timor-Leste Government in 2004.

What happened in Dili is the greatest scandal in the history of ASIS. It exposes how damaging the blowback from covert actions can be, an important lesson that the covert cowboys of ASIS seem in no hurry to learn.

Powerful forces will oppose Collaery's call for a Royal Commission. Those who approved the Dili bugging are enormously influential.

Did Alexander Downer authorise the bugging without the approval of Cabinet's National Security Committee, composed of Prime Minister John Howard, Deputy Prime Minister John Anderson, Treasurer Peter Costello, Attorney-General Phillip Ruddock, and Immigration Minister Amanda Vanstone?

The LNP Government wasted four years and millions of dollars prosecuting Bernard Collaery and Witness K. It's time the mates who trashed Australia's reputation faced the consequences.

Johnny Allen AM is a seminal figure in alternative arts and culture in Australia. A recognised pioneer of the event industry, he is often referred to as 'the Father of Events'. Indeed, he is the lead author of the standard text Festivals and Special Event Management, published by Wileys, now in its 7th edition.

He started the radical theatre group Cabaret Conspiracy with Michael Murray in the 1970s and proceeded to tour many activists such as Ralph Nader and Ron Cobb. More recently he has managed events at Darling Harbour and has taught event management all over the world.

Johnny Allen, Graeme Dunstan, Benny Zable and Katie Cawcutt were joined by about 50 people, with ten of those having been at the original Aquarius Festival, and spoke of their hopes and dreams and lived experiences since the 1973 event.

We put on a delicious dinner and people established bonds and connections and reconnections on subjects of mutual interest that will help to the evolving program of events now taking meaningful shape.

We broke into groups to discuss individual ideas and then regrouped to share and finish the night.





Labor Environment Action Network resolves to stop de-forestation

lot has been happening with planning for a more sustainable future. The NSW state Labor Party Conference just concluded, with some good resolutions, including a process recommended to reduce reliance on native timber forestry and expand plantation estates.

Jaden Harris, NSW Convenor of the Labor Environment Action Network (LEAN), said after the Conference that it was very productive and included resolutions to:

- Legislate a ban on all singleuse plastics;
- Plan a circular economy, with a long-term goal of zero waste to landfill or incineration;
- Reduce the NSW government's public-sector emissions to net-zero by 2030;
- Scale hydrogen production and ensure that all hydrogen infrastructure is green-hydrogen ready;
- Re-commit to nuclear power not being a climate solution and to reject all pro-nuclear motions; and
- Adopt land clearing laws capable of stopping deforestation.

The Federal Labor Government is not so forward-facing, it would seem. Speaking at a Forestry Australia's National Symposium in Albury, the Federal Minister for Agriculture, Fisheries and Forestry, Senator Murray Watt stated, "The Federal Government has recommitted its support for the sustainable management of the native timber industry", and acknowledged the economic importance of keeping people employed in the industry in country towns.

The Nature Conservation Council of NSW has criticised the Federal Government for not taking decisive action to protect forests and wildlife by ruling out the use of native forests

for electricity generation. To reach the target of a



The anniversary was celebrated at Nimbin during the week ending 23rd October (see report, Page 14). Among the speakers, NEFA president, Dailan Pugh gave a summary of all the areas protected as a result of successful protest actions, including the historic 1982 NSW Cabinet Rainforest Decision, creating or expanding the Nightcap, Border Ranges, Washpool, Dorrigo, New England, Werrikimbe and Barrington Tops National Parks, creating Mount Seaview and Mt Hyland Nature Reserves, and the Murray Scrub, Sandy Creek and Cambridge Plateau Flora Reserves.

Picnic at The Rocks

The Nature Conservation Council (NCC) of NSW encouraged communities to gather for picnics to promote environmental awareness. Nimbin, Uki, Chillingham, Byron Bay and Lismore were among the 44 venues holding such gatherings on Sunday 16th October.

NEC sponsored a picnic on Widgabul-Wiabal land with assistance from the Ngulingah Land Council. A welcome to country was given by David Laurie, Karen Roberts and Mark Roberts. Ranger Gordon had the native plants nursery open for inspection and purchases.

Musicians Peter Walker and Sophia Fletcher entertained. About 45 people came to enjoy the ambience. The topic was discussed and debated in the Assembly in Sydney on 15th September, 2022. No resolution was proposed or adopted.

The state-owned Forestry Corporation (FCNSW) has stopped logging the Cherry Tree State forest due to a Court ruling on a request for injunction by Bundjalung native title holders, which claim that the forest around Mallanganee is a vital corridor for wildlife occupation and transit to and from the lowland coastal region and the Border Ranges National Park. The FCNSW has scheduled logging to damage Myrtle State Forest south of Casino between January and May next year... unless we can stop them.

Citizen scientists found over 55 logging breaches by FCNSW at Ellis State Forest. NEFA calls for the NSW EPA to issue an urgent Stop Work order. For more info, see 'Real Law Breakers Must Be Stopped', at: www.nefa.org. au/real_law_breakers_must_ be_stopped

Fridays4Forests visited the offices of various federal representatives, including Labor's Richmond MP, Justine Elliot at South Tweed. Justine was asked to add to the community submissions calling for the Renewable Energy Act to be amended to prevent government subsidies going to burning of biomass for energy production.


CCTV cameras

Political will needed

According to historians, the Middle Ages lasted for around 1000 years, and natural disasters such as floods occurred.

Life was harsh, with a limited diet and little comfort. Starvation, disease and poverty was common. Children had a 50% survival rate beyond age one, and began to contribute to family life around age 12.

However, one society for over 800 years was distinctly different, the Khmer Empire - today the land of Cambodia, in that its standard of living and affluence were exceptional.

In 1296 AD, Chinese traveller Zhou Daguan visited Angkor, the capital of Cambodia's powerful Khmer Empire, as a member of a diplomatic mission sent by Chinese Emperor Temur Khan. Today, Zhou's written record of his residency is a surviving eyewitness account of that extraordinary and mysterious time and place.

Put simply, his descriptions plus massive archaeological findings, place the Khmer empire as the greatest society in the world at the time. The Khmer consistently developed and organised an Empire where living standards outshone the rest of the planet.

One of their main achievements, which gave the population security against natural disasters, such as flooding, was primarily the

(53 million m³). Both are considered the largest dams of their type ever built. These man-made lakes or Barays controlled the flooding, of the heavy monsoon rains. Both had walls 13 m high.

The topography of Cambodia is similar to where the Wilson and Leycester river systems meet, originally a former swampland area ideal for such dam construction.

It is proof that the rapid flooding that hits our area can be controlled. The Barays are still working, preventing floods in Cambodia, some 800 years later.

If a development project was begun to establish large man-made lakes to the north and west of Lismore, flooding could be controlled; with organised management, water would be allowed to flow back into the river.

The surplus water would provide opportunity for regeneration of our rainforest, to develop eco tourism, to create an Indigenous cultural centre like Mossman Gorge, allow for new real estate opportunities that would

be built above flood height, and space for regeneration of forests to act as a carbon sink. A great number of new

employment and business opportunities would be created, and the benefits would be enormous not just for our valley, but for the nation. A society in the Middle Ages could solve the problem for over 800 years. If only politicians could seize the opportunity?

Put on top of this, the overall costing of such construction is minimal. How? The sediment dug out would be sold in a way similar to the Penrith Lakes development. The Penrith Lakes was a project achieved by private enterprise, without any cost to the general public.

It is hoped the current opportunity offered by the NSW and Federal Governments to support flood victims is allocated as soon as possible. This support package though does not look at the longer term of how to alleviate and control the natural disaster of flooding. Mark Pestell Nimbin

Appeal to the Nimbin community for basic shelter for local Aboriginal man

Nimbin Aged Care & Respite Services (NACRS) in partnership with Nimbin Community Centre (NCC) need to find a suitable home or sheltered space for a local Indigenous person until a more permanent solution can be found or developed.

This person is currently sleeping rough at the Nimbin Community Centre.

We are appealing to the broader Nimbin community to work with us to find a quiet, private space within easy walking distance of the town centre – a small unit, a cabin or a space for a basic shelter with ongoing daily support from NACRS.

This could be a covered area such as a carport, or a space where a compact moveable shelter can be placed for sleeping and storage of clothes (eg. small caravan). We are aiming for a

secluded, private spot as close to the town centre as possible, with no interaction



required between the tenant and owners. NACRS Support workers assist this person with activities of daily living - shopping,

food prep, laundry, personal care, clothes storage, bedding, activities, medical appointments, etc – for three hours each day.

This one-to-one support will continue, and will include assisting maintaining their personal space and rental agreement.

Initially this would be on a trial basis, with agreed rent paid automatically, and closely monitored by a key support worker at NACRS.

If you think you may have (or know of) a suitable space to offer and would like to explore, with no obligation, this opportunity to support a vulnerable Aboriginal person, and receive a small income whilst creating a solution to local homelessness, please contact Rose Cubis: rose@ *nacrs.com.au* or phone 02 6689-1709.

Nature-based flood mitigation

An example of a functioning upper catchment floodplain can be seen in the Protestors Falls carpark area, in Nightcap National Park.

The forest in this locale is predominantly Bangalow Palms with some Blue Quandong and Red Cedar among the largest trees.

In the high rainfall event of 2022, the creek running from the Protestors Falls area would have been engorged with high water, a high sediment and rock load, and fallen timber, trees and deadwood being carried in the flows.

The vegetation/wood from the Protestors Falls area seems to have been carried until there was a jam - it was near the intersection with Terania Creek where the waters meeting each other would have created turbulence and added to the slowing effects at this point.

The jam created about a two-metre weir in the main channel, slowing the water above it down and letting the stone and sediment more readily drop out of the waters rather than being washed downstream, adding to the volume of floodwater.

The flooded creek also spread through the surrounding palm forest, dropping a layer of washed stone through it.

Tens of thousands of tons of material was captured in a space of a few hectares of forest.

It appears the plants are well adapted to surviving in such conditions, their roots systems even catching sediment. Some have been submerged up to 1.8m in silt/rock. Each event just creates a new ground zero for the next generations of forest plants.

A new incision was created in the forest floor at one point, creating a window into geological history. It looks



like there is similar material to what has been freshly deposited way down in the soil horizon.

These events have occurred in the distant past, and you could assume the palm forest was there then.

When you look around the Northern Rivers landscapes at the floodplain shapes, even the mini ones along the inside edges of river bends, remember they were once likely vegetated like this one.

Vegetation is a critical part of a healthy natural river system and it has been largely removed from our riparian zones and floodplains by human activity.

If still there, the vegetation would slow the movement of water down the catchment, increasing the length of flooding but decreasing the height. The removal of sediment also reduces the volume of water as the sediment adds volume to the floodwaters.

Interestingly, in a part of the forest miles away, a new bank of deposited material has self-seeded with palms. There doesn't appear to be a single

other species more adapted to this opportunity on this occasion. This area was only about 20m².

Perhaps a floodplain formation in this area much like Protestors may have been in its earliest stages.

Websters Creek Landcare

In late September, a successful community tree planting day was held by Websters Creek Landcare on two sites along the creek.

The first site was at the creek reserve located on Stony Chute Road just before the bridge, which divides the Lismore and Kyogle Council Shires.

The second site was across two properties in the headwaters of Websters at Blue Knob. The Sunday was a perfect Spring day and we had a good turnout. We planted 200 trees

across both sites.
