











## Emergency Road Repair funds flow to councils



Member for Lismore, Janelle Saffin has announced more than \$15 million in Regional Emergency Road Repair Funds (RERRF) for local councils managing roads across the Lismore electorate.

Janelle says the funding is to help councils with urgent road repairs, maintenance, and repair of potholes.

"Over the past few years our roads have taken a battering from floods and storms and landslips, and this funding can help councils with priority repairs.

Each council has been notified of the funding they will receive, which is based on kilometres of roads they manage, as follows:

Tenterfield: 1685km, \$4,306,702; Tweed: 1247km, \$3,187,215; Lismore: 1215km, \$3,105,205; Kyogle: 1196km, \$3,056,426; and Byron: 609km, \$1,556,547.

"This funding builds on funds councils received earlier this year under the Regional and Local Road Repair Program. The funding means councils can get on with the ongoing recovery work on our roads, to make journeys safer for all road users," Ms Saffin said.



## What goes around, comes around

Running between 13th and 19th November, National Recycling Week provides an opportunity for residents and workplaces to learn simple methods of reducing their environmental footprint and preventing waste.

Residents can host or join recycling themed events, brush up on their recycling knowledge with educational resources, learn about new developments in recycling policy and technology or discover tricks to reduce what they are sending to landfill and ensure resources don't go to waste.

Much of what we currently send to landfill is actually valuable material that could be reused, repurposed or recycled.

This year's theme, 'What goes around, comes around' is all about providing simple and actionable tips that enable Australians to keep those valuable materials in circulation, whether at home, work or school.

Last year, Planet Ark research revealed Australian households were sending nearly 2.5 million tonnes of unnecessary waste to landfill.

Between 9 and 18%

(about 441,000 tonnes) of all material sent to landfill by households is likely recyclable, while a massive 41-52% (about 2,000,900 tonnes) could be composted at home or organic processing facilities.

Addressing food waste and ensuring packaging is correctly recycled therefore forms a major component of this year's National Recycling Week resources and activities.

"This year Planet Ark is asking Australians to pause and think about what they are currently sending to landfill and ask whether it is waste after all," said Planet Ark CEO Rebecca Gilling.

National Recycling Week was founded in 1996 as an opportunity for Australians to take waste and recycling into their own hands by improving their recycling knowledge and building better recycling habits.

Since then, the annual recycling rate in Australia has increased from just 7% of all disposed materials to more than 60%.

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
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### **Nimbin Roots Festival wows the crowds**

# Nimbin explores life, death and beyond

n a place like Nimbin, we are proud of our vibrant and unconventional conversations, so it's hardly surprising that even the taboo topics trend.

Among the conversations, discussions about death have recently taken centre stage, drawing the community's attention in a thoughtprovoking manner.

A spark for this continued discussion was the launch of Saskia Kouwenberg's book, Death, Dying and Beyond which I had the pleasure of reviewing last month.

The book is a comprehensive self-help guide, offering practical wisdom and insights for navigating the complexities of the end-of-life journey.

It addresses both the practical aspects of death, such as preparations and logistics, and the emotional and spiritual dimensions of this profound transition.

The book's lively launch event, held on Sunday 22nd October at the Nimbin Aboriginal Cultural Centre with more than 90 attendees, became a vibrant gathering of minds and hearts.

The Cultural Centre itself was adorned with the artistic expressions of three late Aboriginal artists - John Wright, Johnny Bayles and Burri Jerome. This touching tribute to their legacy set the stage for a profound afternoon.

Dying, Death and Beyond

Saskia (pictured) began the event with a moment of silence, a poignant reflection to remember the Nimbin community members who had recently passed. She then expressed heartfelt gratitude to the many individuals who had supported her in bringing this remarkable book to life.

Following this, the baton was passed to Halie Halloran from Paperbark Deathcare, who led the audience into a world of diverse ideas and practices related to end-of-life

Halie delved into various aspects of death care, from the practical considerations of when to involve a funeral director to answering questions on more unconventional concepts, such as the notion of burying people vertically. The crowd was engaged and intrigued.

As the event unfolded, Manika Raff, a death doula, and I took the stage to read poignant excerpts from Saskia's book. These passages resonated with the audience. When the floor returned

to Saskia, she spoke about forming a Nimbin volunteer end-of-life care group.

The book is available from the Nimbin Environment Centre, but Saskia shared that only seven copies of the first print run remain, but she assured me that the second print run is already in the works.

In a town where the unconventional is the norm. the discussions around death, re-ignited by the book Death, Dying and Beyond and added to by the insightful speakers at the launch, remind us of Nimbin's spirit - a place unafraid to explore even the most challenging aspects of life (and death).

# Navigating disinformation, uncertainty, individualism and the poison apple of conspiracy

e are living in a massively perplexing age of disinformation.

From cooker conspiracies through to outright financial scams, it is becoming increasingly challenging to navigate the tidal wave of mendacity we find ourselves adrift in.

The collapse of a shared sense of reality and the descent into a post truth world obviously best serves those most reliant upon lies and misinformation to pursue their nefarious ends (the Trumps, Putins and Bolsanaros).

Whilst there are good reasons to hold a healthy scepticism towards the official versions of reality offered by governments, corporations, media owners and militaries, there is an even greater danger in descending into the complete abyss of distrust of all official information.

To mistrust it all simply renders you even more incapable of discernment than if you naively trusted it all. It is the worst of the worst fraudsters, tricksters and dictators who are the principal beneficiaries of the dense smokescreen that is offered by all-encompassing cynicism.

Why do people turn to conspiracy theory and fascism in such large numbers? I believe it is largely the result of two very widespread vulnerabilities in humans in general. One is an addiction to certainty and the other what I call the false promise of individualism.

#### Uncertainty

We live in a very complex universe, it actually began in a very pure form of chaos, so formless that it enabled all manner of experimentation to occur spontaneously enough to produce temporary structures such as swirling galaxies, planets and if you are lucky enough, atmospheres and biological processes like we see on Earth.

The human mind, confronted with infinite diversity and uncertainty has always sought the shelter of certainty. The idea that there is one big sky daddy running all of this, is actually very similar to the deep unconscious need to explain discomforting global events as the work of a single elite illuminati.

The actual evidence though, points to a planet peopled by humans, engaged in multiple competing processes for dominance and power, (and even a substantial amount of well-motivated ones). The swirl of competing

interests, corporations, media moguls, governments, dictators and militaries are all hatching their own plots and propagandas and trying to out-do each other.

Amongst this rabble is also a lot of humans with good moral conscience fighting for things like human rights, transparency, environmental repair and even older more conservative values like an independent judiciary and the equal application of the rule of law.

So mental resilience factor number one for surviving with your sanity intact, is build up your uncertainty muscles. Listen to the great astrophysicists like Brian Cox and learn how to really enjoy being a spec of space dust in a temporarily stable pocket of the universe, only then are you in a position to perceive your situation much more clearly.

#### Individuality

The other great mental dilemma of our times is the very flawed concept of individuality. I am not saying

collective process. Completely alone you have absolutely no mechanisms for knowing what is a workable consensus worldview for humanity.

If you really are the only person to know the 'truth' then you are probably already insane.

Evolution favours a species with great diversity both physically and neurologically. This diversity gives us a variety of expertise. Expert doctors, physicists, climate scientists, constitutional lawyers, artists, computer

there is no such thing as individuality, it's just that it only occupies one single extremity in a continuum of experience (a bit like an infinity symbol) in which your connection to the universe, nature, humanity, and to community really defines who and what you are.

Abstract individualism is a relatively recent idea that has been massively over-emphasised in liberal capitalist ideologies. Sadly, when you have been stripped of your deep connection to the universe, nature and community, individualism becomes like a trauma teddy that people cling to with tragic obsession.

How many times have you heard the insane utterance: "We are born alone and we die alone"? Pure madness, it is impossible to be born alone. Sanity is by definition a

whizzes, biologists, activists, mystics, criminals, scammers, fascists and that charismatic guy on youtube.

So mental resilience factor number two is to seek to ground your experiences into the collective. Feel into our collective experience and seek that consensus reality that is so important to our collective survival.

#### Experts

This brings me to the third resilience factor, experts. We need to continue to trust expertise, acquired knowledge and the mental disciplines and rigour that are attached to real expertise.

More important than expert individuals are the communities of expertise. When 20,000 scientists attest that climate change is a real and existential threat, STFU and listen. Don't go looking

disagrees, or the charismatic you tube spruiker who can offer you a simpler, neater, more certain, (and inevitably manipulatively right wing) alternative explanation. Have whatever doubts

Have whatever doubts or intuitions you wish, but try to respect as much as possible what communities of knowledge have to contribute.

I have been deeply saddened in recent years watching friends and former allies of our great social movements for the environment and human rights, get sucked down worm holes of disinformation and conspiracy.

When the internet, and later social media first appeared we all could see the great potential for a great digital democracy, for information sharing and transparency and for global organising for social change. It went well for a few years.

But as we entered into the new century, authoritarian regimes such as China and Iran and Russia were busy learning everything, they could from what activists had achieved and how to turn the internet and social media into tools for surveillance and propaganda.

They were quickly joined by extreme right movements in Europe, America and Australia, who used the wealth at their disposal to mimic and reinvent online viral politics for their own purposes.

The result has been that social media has more recently become a bizarrely complicated maze of traps and wormholes, many of which have been deliberately designed to use algorithms to pull the unsuspecting to the right.

Awash with uncertainty, stripped bare as individuals and taught to distrust all mainstream expertise we have collectively become the prey of thousands of scammers, conspiracy theorists, fascists and manipulators.

Sadly, conspiracy theories themselves are the strings that pull on the puppets that fall into them, all the while goading you that you are one of the few who can see the 'truth'.



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

ainstream news claims that 2023 will be the hottest year in recorded history. The Greens say we must reduce emissions as soon as possible, but Labor is trying to delay reaching net zero until 2050.

We are in a climate emergency, but Labor is taking us backwards, as Sue Higginson observes here. They are proposing laws that are even weaker than the former LNP Government's and will breach the Paris Agreement.

It is hard for me to believe that Labor might be weaker than the Coal-ition in reducing our dependency on fossil fuels, but then I thought the nation would endorse a Referendum to recognise the first inhabitants of Australia.

In the lead-up to that vote I was accosted by someone who said I would lose my land and be deported if Yes got a majority: I told her I didn't believe that. She said she was a "sovereign" and that I had "bought the narrative".

I suggested she might be inclined to drink the Koolaid. Her response made me think she didn't know about Jonestown, 1978, when cult leader Jim Jones instructed his followers to drink poisoned Koolaid, and about 900 complied.

Back to the climate, I believe "the narrative" that the Antarctic ice shelf is melting due to global warming and the sea level is rising. I am not too worried because Nimbin is well above the heights predicted, but I know that the biosphere is fighting to survive.

I am rather fond of most species and feel distressed to hear that some are going extinct. I am heartened, though, by scientists and concerned citizens who have gone out of their way to help. Some have even been successful – like recolonising coral onto reefs that were dead, due to the warming and acidifying of sea water.

Both state and federal governments continue to approve new fossil-fuel projects that contribute to harmful emissions.

I realise that politics is the art of compromise – and getting re-elected – but even some of the corporate chieftains (and donors!) are saying we need to change if we want our children and grandchildren to live in a sustainable world.

Maybe we can avoid catastrophe if we ban donations to political parties. That would probably change the typical political narrative.

#### **NCC Picnic for Nature**

This event started in 2022 to bring people together, celebrate nature, grow the movement, and talk about what actions local groups were taking that could lead to wins for nature in NSW.

It was a community picnic, part of a state-wide initiative by the Nature Conservation Council of NSW.

Last year more than 1,000 people attended 40 community picnics across NSW. Similar to last year, we gathered on Sunday 15th October under the Nimbin Rocks on Widjabul-Waiabal land where the Ngulingah Native Plant Nursery was open for browsing and purchases and the NEC provided free chai.



About 60 people attended and enjoyed the experience. The Vocal Minority choir from Nimbin performed after a welcome by Mark Roberts. The day celebrated the natural beauty of our local area and community connection.

The picnic had perfect weather for people from around the district to get together and talk about what we can do to protect nature and act on climate change.

#### Water restrictions eased

Much of the state has experienced a very dry year. Level 2 water restrictions in Nimbin village have just been lifted.

However, concerns remain how the limited water supply from the small weir on Mulgum Creek will be able to provide for the needs of future developments already approved but yet to be built.

NEC wants to know what effect water mining has on the levels of the underground water. While NSW has legislated no expansion in Tweed Shire of existing water bores for commercial purposes, ie bottled water, Qld has no such restriction and further licences are pending on the Gold Coast.

According to a UN report,

Australians, on average, spend over \$500 per year buying 500 litres of bottled water. The bottled water industry pockets over \$650 million/annum.

Australia has the most expensive water with most of the cost in the packaging. Despite the 10-cent bottle refund, the waste disposal of plastic rubbish is not adequate for the cost to the environment.

Australia has good clean tap water, so refilling a reusable bottle protects the environment and your wallet.

#### The Wallum Estate

This DA in Byron Shire was approved by the Northern Regional Planning Panel. Byron Council is now seeking legal advice, with some claiming they were "unaware of the significance of the land" and are now motivated to seek a reversal.

Greens MLC Sue Higginson has referred the DA to the federal government for investigation under the Environment Protection and Biodiversity Conservation Act 1999. The Northern Rivers Guardians wrote to Member for Richmond Justine Elliott and Member for Page Kevin Hogan to support protecting this area where numerous threatened

species remain as an Endangered Ecological Community(EEC).

There is little left of the original and unique natural coastal habitat as humans have cleared most of it and we think that already degraded land should be used for housing development.

This development does not pretend to target low-income buyers which might ease the shortage of affordable houses, but promises to leave some of the property "in pristine condition."

A recent Byron Council meeting voted unanimously to oppose this development.

#### Redbank power station

The Redbank coal-burning electricity plant near Singleton in the Hunter Valley, in "care and maintenance" for 10 years, has applied to re-start using "biomass (excluding native forest residues from logging)"... to produce "green electricity" for 200,000 homes.

Jackson Environment and Planning Pty Ltd has been engaged by Verdant Earth Technologies Limited (Verdant) to assist in the state significant development approval for its project at 112 Long Point Road West, Warkworth (Lot 450/DP 1119428).

Verdant has acquired the power station and claims it will burn "a sustainable fuel to produce near net zero CO<sub>2</sub> emissions" and enable the power station to continue to produce "green" electricity on an on-going basis.

Jackson is currently preparing an Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) for the Development Application. One of the requirements of the EIS process is to consult with various interest groups.

The state government will decide, but one wonders how this project will ever make ecological sense.

## Private Native Forestry in Kyogle LGA: Balancing conservation and sustainability

yogle Local
Government Area
(LGA) is home to one
of the largest private native
forestry estates in New South
Wales, covering 160,000
hectares of land – half the
LGA.

At the heart of the regulation governing private forestry is the commitment to Ecologically Sustainable Forest Management (ESFM), designed to protect the rich biodiversity and ecosystems under the Local Land Service Act.

Private Native Forestry (PNF) refers to the practice of harvesting and managing native forests on private land, as opposed to public State Forests, and is subject to regulations and guidelines aimed at ensuring the so-called "sustainable management of native forests" to maintain ecosystem health, protection of biodiversity and managing the impact on water resources.

PNF is undertaken predominately in sclerophyll forests which provide habitat for a wide range of native fauna, including ground and arboreal marsupials, bats, reptiles and many species of



birds.

Special areas such as rainforests, wetlands, heathlands, and old growth forests are identified as exclusion zones where logging is strictly prohibited under the PNF Code. However, outside these areas, landowners can apply for a desktop approval from the Local Land Service (LLS) for their forestry plans. Unfortunately, the existing regulations fall short in one crucial aspect: there is no requirement for on-ground assessments or surveys to determine the boundaries of threatened ecological communities.

The vast majority of private lands have no documented records of threatened species and there is no obligation for landowners to investigate or consider the potential impact on local wildlife before felling a tree. In practice, while the Private Native Forestry (PNF) code contains

numerous provisions aimed at protecting our unique wildlife, its application in the field often proves ineffective. The minimum standards outlined in the PNF Code are deemed too minimal to achieve true Ecologically Sustainable Forest Management.

Some of the critically endangered species that occur within the Kyogle LGA include: Regent Honeyeater, Glossy Black Cockatoo, Koala, Spotted-tailed Quoll and the Greater Glider.

Kyogle Council has committed to working with State and Federal governments to identify areas of high biodiversity and environmental value and is in the process of developing a consultancy brief for Biodiversity Assessment and mapping of areas of high environmental value. However, this takes time, and time is running out for our critically endangered species.

Fortunately, a solution is emerging that empowers landowners to contribute to the preservation of forest habitat. Citizen science initiatives, such as identifying threatened species and adding data to the Atlas of Living Australia database, have gained prominence in recent years. By participating in

these projects, landowners can strengthen biodiversity records across the landscape, enhancing the knowledge about local ecosystems.

The added data can help make private logging more accountable, shedding light on the presence of threatened species and the impact of forestry activities on the environment.

It provides an opportunity for landowners to take a proactive role in safeguarding the rich biodiversity of Kyogle LGA and ensuring that private native forestry aligns more closely with the principles of Ecologically Sustainable



Forest Management.
Citizen science offers a promising path forward, where landowners can actively engage in conserving the region's unique wildlife and

ecosystems.

By strengthening biodiversity records, Kyogle LGA can strive for a more balanced and sustainable approach to private native forestry.

May the long time sun shine upon you All love surround you And the pure light within you Guide your way on.







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
