Still dealing on Common Ground

Open-air drug dealing is commonplace in Nimbin. The geographic element of the Nimbin Community Centre being so close to arterial roads, with its network of leafy pathways and sharps savvy toilet block; optimises the contact between drug peddler and buyer/user. Professor L Mazerolle of Griffith University's School of Criminology & Criminal Justice notes in his *Systematic Review Of Drug Law Enforcement Strategies* that drug sellers assess the places attributes before deciding whether or not to sell drugs. Dealers also choose places which minimise the risk of apprehension, and prefer places with weak place management to minimise the risk of interference. The natural and built landscape of the Community Centre cannot be changed, though we can address how the site is to be managed.

No doubt the Community Centre is not the only 'hot-spot' in town for this trade, however it is one of the few places providing family support services with associated child-care. Without debating the pros and cons of drug law reform, it must be acknowledged that there is evidence of health and social problems associated with the drug market. It is unfortunate when the violent and saddening outcomes of drug dealing impact directly on the children who bear witness.

The NCDA is presented with the challenge to curtail drug dealing within the Community Centre. Harm reduction strategies through community, problem-oriented, and third party interventions are evidenced to effectively compliment traditional drug law enforcement tactics (eg: crackdowns, raids, stings).



However Mason & Burke (2002) found that community based interventions are only partially effective in disrupting drug dealing from residential or commercial properties & not at all for open-air dealing.

In the case of open-air drug dealing, interventions emphasise traditional enforcement tactics with an absence of police/ external agency partnerships. This highlights the question of community workers being required to intervene in disrupting drug dealing (to ensure the safety of themselves and those who access community services) because of an apparent absence of NSW Police strategies to include the Nimbin Community Centre.

Further to the previous month's *Nimbin Goodtimes* article "Dealing on Common Ground" I would like to express my apologies to those volunteers and social workers who felt misrepresented by a reference to addressing drug dealing within the Nimbin Community Centre. Community workers and volunteers in Nimbin are not being 'soft' on crime. Were it not for these committed individuals strengthening the 'place management' of the Community Centre, by disrupting trade and challenging drug dealers to move on, this community space would be without a deterrent to drug related crime.

Jungle Patrol workshop success

Nimbin Community Development Association (NCDA) recently hosted a workshop that aimed to design a sustainable and appropriate community patrol model for Nimbin..

The workshop was facilitated by local woman Jennifer Parke and participants included representatives from police, health, the Neighbourhood Centre, local businesses, people involved with Jungle Patrol, the Community Centre, Nimbin Central School, and the Premier's Department.

The workshop examined the achievements and challenges of the Jungle Patrol and determined that Nimbin is the ideal location for a community patrol model. Various issues were identified as being vital if a community patrol was to be funded again in Nimbin. These included the following:

- Jungle Patrol was an ambitious concept that had achieved the aims of the funding agreement,
- the establishment of a security service was

beyond the capacity of a community based organisation to achieve,

- Various management and operational difficulties had resulted in Jungle Patrol ending before the funding period expired.

Several alternative management structures and funding sources were proposed. The focus of a community patrol model would include 'street beat' workers to greet tourists, make referrals to welfare and support services, be the 'eyes and ears' of the street, intervene in a non-confrontational manner in incidents on the street, provide crowd and traffic control at local and regional events and continue the street cleaning contract.

There was a great deal of energy and enthusiasm for a community patrol and the benefits of such a project in Nimbin.

Odds lengthen on IR reforms



Over 1500 people, plus the mainstream media, assembled at Lismore Turf Club on Tuesday morning, 15th November, to watch a Skychannel broadcast over the monitors and PA system in the betting ring.

Fluoro safety shirts stood solidly alongside blue collar workwear, the casual wear of teachers and academics, and the emblazoned T-shirts of many unions, as North Coast workers met in the biggest regional meeting in the state, to express their opposition to the federal government's proposed industrial relations legislation.

The professionally produced ACTU presentation was broadcast live from a rally outside Sydney Town Hall, and

cut to several pre-recorded segments.

ACTU Secretary Greg Combet told the rally, "This bill is motivated by ideology. It is a scandalous abuse of democratic rights in this country." Greens senator Bob Brown accused the government of "lining the pockets of the rich."

The effect of the proposed changes on workplace safety is of major concern to unionists. One segment featured a range of workers in industries not covered by Awards, who had been sacked after taking sick leave or suffering an injury at work. The corporate example of James Hardy Industries was also raised in this context.

The effect of the abolition of Awards on workplace

culture was also of concern. Greg Combet said, "It's going to have a dire effect on our way of life," citing the prospect of compulsory weekend work and overtime, and its impact on family life.

Workers, speaking in interview segments, made the point that all improvements in working conditions had been won by struggle, over 150 years, and that no-one has the right to give those away. Back live on stage, ACTU president Sharan Burrows said, "Every union leader is ready to fight like never before."

But it was Greg Combet's declaration that brought forth the biggest cheer in the betting ring that morning: "We're going to fight until we win!"

Draconian 'Anti-terror' laws set to pass

Despite condemnation of the Howard government's Anti-Terrorism Bill by legal experts and civil rights activists as 'unnecessary', 'excessive' and 'violating civil rights', the Bill looks set to pass the Senate any day now.

Last week a Senate inquiry produced a bipartisan report calling for the crime of sedition to be removed from the legislation because of concerns for free speech.

"It is good to see the suggestion that sedition should go but what about detention without charge or trial?" Senator Brown asked.

Howard conceded a few minor changes to the initial bill, however the sedition section will remain, having been the most controversial

clause. The sedition charge carries a possible penalty of seven years imprisonment.

Historically, sedition laws have been used by oppressive governments to violate the civil rights of such people as Mahatma Gandhi, Nelson Mandela and Aung Sang Su Ki.

Preventative detention measures will allow 'suspects' to be held for up to 14 days. The 'suspect' can call a family member to say they are ok but if they or their family tell any more they can go to prison for

five years. The new laws will also give police broader authority to stop, search and question anyone, anywhere, anytime if they suspect they may be a terrorist.

The attorney-general, Phillip Ruddock, will be able to declare an area (building/ suburb/state) a "security zone" for up to 28 days.

The government has agreed to a review of the sedition provisions by the Australian Law Reform Commission in the new year.

Council Jottings

Council had another opportunity at its November 8 meeting to express its opposition to the Federal government's proposed package of reforms to Australian workplace relations. Yet again Lismore Council failed to do so. Although the motion was again lost (5/6 Cr Hampton absent), at least this time, at the meeting in Clunes, there was full and frank debate. It is also regrettable that the other Councillors did not vote with Councillors Dowell, Swientek, Irwin, Ekins and Tomlinson, not only to demonstrate support for our own workers, but to endorse the same resolution carried by its umbrella body, the NSW Local Government Association only 3 weeks earlier at its annual conference. The LGA is concerned that the corporate status of local government is unclear and that Councils will be exposed to an array of claims as a result of this proposal. Time will tell but for now, Lismore Council has missed an important opportunity.

On the good news front, Council has set its targets to work towards achieving Milestone 3 in its Cities for Climate Protection Program. Council has endorsed the goals of reducing its own and the community's greenhouse gas emissions by 20% of the 2001-02 levels by 2012. Electricity consumption from water, sewerage, buildings and streetlighting makes up 60% of our corporate emissions and 53% of our community emissions. The next highest sources of the Council's emissions are waste (24%) and diesel (14%) while the community's next highest are petrol (15.3%) and diesel (6.8%). The late Brian Slapp left a legacy to sign up to CCP and it is great to see his donation bearing fruit.

Also at the November meeting we debated the immediate future of the free Lismore Lake Pool. The Royal Life Saving Society prepared safety assessments and improvement plans for both the Lake and Nimbin pools with a high non-compliance rating for both pools. Although staff recommended supervision at a cost of \$20,000 per month be provided at both venues, Councillors did not follow this advice. If we had done

so, it may have resulted in the closure of the very popular Lake pool, especially when we are well aware that the new pool does not cater for 5-10 year olds.

Of further interest to Nimbin readers was the inclusion of several local groups among the 31 to receive donated Council surplus computers. Nimbin 50+ Learning Centre, Tuntable Falls Early Childhood Centre, Jiggi and Georgica Adolescent Democracy, and the Tower Preschool were all successful. This year a total of 45 computers were donated in what has now become an annual event. Community groups interested in applying next year need to keep an eye out for next year's call for applications.

The last meeting of Lismore Council for 2005 will be held on 13th December, 6pm at Chambers in Oliver Avenue. The community is always welcome – you never know it might inspire you to stand for election next time (September 2008). Have a great festive season and take care on our roads.

RTA drug testing

Cannabis appears to be the scapegoat once again as Howard tries to ramp up the war on drugs in Australia. The current Federal campaign against cannabis seems to be driven by psychosis stories despite clear statistics showing no increase in psychosis since 1970 when cannabis use started exploding. How come there wasn't an outbreak of psychosis in the sixties and seventies when pot arrived in the west? Meanwhile they've emptied mental health institutions onto the streets where the illegal drug market is!

More likely modern psychosis has a number of contributing factors including today's climate of fear and uncertainty over the future, poly drug use and an entirely different cannabis culture created by prohibition. And what about the fear, or paranoia even, of breaking the law and trying to hide being stoned? Is that not a ready-made recipe for psychosis or schizophrenia? It certainly keeps sunglasses in favour!

The ABC phoned me at home one morning asking what I thought about saliva testing. I rambled on not quite sure what to say but it included something about long term smokers might be safer drivers if they had their morning bong. The beautiful voice from the ABC, as they all are, sent a transcript out on the wire that said god only knows, but a dozen radio stations rang up for interviews.

Slowly a picture has emerged of technology that is not yet worked out, fully shonky propaganda which confuses blood, urine and saliva samples, which all record cannabis for various and varying lengths of time, a full on government and media campaign to demonise pot using mental health as the new big stick...all helping to justify the new driver drug saliva testing.

The big question remains unanswered, how long after a smoke does your saliva not turn on the light! Of course it



will vary for individuals, and perhaps it is also affected by how much you smoked, how regularly, what you've eaten or drunk since, etc. What about people who eat their medicine, or use tincture? There are no clear answers, it's the brave new world order!

Its seems sensible and fair to have a years' saliva testing trial with no charges laid to give the police and drivers a chance to work out the system. At the moment there is little idea of how strong a batch of cannabis is, and the little research and testing that has been done shows huge variations in potency. No-one seems to know how long after ingesting cannabis their saliva stops registering cannabis. We did ask police if they wanted a stall at Mardi Grass this year where people could get tested! They declined, understandably.

Victoria has just begun analysing the results of its 12 month trial. 10,546 drivers were tested with 214 caught with illicit drugs in their system (including 49 truckies), five times the number with over .05 alcohol. Now they are going for it, more drug buses, perhaps police cars equipped for saliva testing and probably automatic loss of licence. In the trial positive results for cannabis or speed were fined \$307 and lose three demerit points, or are taken to court.

A police blitz on the morning after the AFL Grand Final indicated 11 out of 26 drivers had either pot or speed in their system!

All up, it looks like the saliva tester is not too predictable but it is the gateway for the police to get you into the big white van where they get your blood or urine and anyone who

has been smoking in the last month or two might show up then!

The campaign for saliva testing is being led by *Reefer Madness* style talk from people like NSW Nationals leader Stoner, ironically, who quote blood tests from accidents as if anyone registering positive on cannabis was high at the time of the accident! There are Qld figures from teenage burglars where 80% had cannabis in their blood when arrested. Therefore 80% were stoned when they climbed in the window, say the Stoners, but really 80% had smoked in the previous 2 months!

There is already plenty of folklore about what will stop your saliva stick glowing red... Kentucky Fried, raw bacon, haggis, butter, or in fact anything fatty. Then there's the acid school who reckon a eucalyptus lolly, or even camphor laurel leaves from beside the road, or vinegar (what about cheap wine, so long as you're under .05?).

There is plenty of room for complaint to your local MP! They are not testing drivers for plenty of other drugs including heroin and coke, mushies or acid, petrol or glue, pharmaceutical cocktails including methodone. Cannabis once again is the scapegoat and the easy bust. Every trial of stoned drivers has shown minimal impairment and even improved performance in some cases. (see story)

The mixing of drugs including alcohol is clearly an issue these days, but once again cannabis is the easy bust. It's smelly, especially when you use it, it's bulky, it stays in your blood forever, but it's a herb anyone can grow in their back yard and that makes it very hard for big business or governments to control.

Unquestionably coming down hard on cannabis has dramatically increased the use of more dangerous powders and pills which users are far less likely to get caught with. We must be careful saliva testing doesn't just push cannabis users into other drugs that don't register on the saliva testing.

SBS dope joke under a cloud

The Australian Communications and Media Authority's investigation of the episode of the SBS comedy *Fat Pizza* staged at Nimbin, in which a drug deal is filmed and a group of schoolchildren watch a character smoke what looks like marijuana, is under investigation by the broadcasting regulator, coinciding with John Howard's call for a crackdown on cannabis.

The episode shot in May during the Mardi Grass shows the crew participating in the joint-rolling competition, at a time when the linking of cannabis use to mental illness has triggered a renewed campaign against decriminalisation.

Patricia Karvelas of *The Australian* reported that a spokesman for SBS would not comment on the episode but said a response would be given to the ACMA in the coming month.

The former voluntary drug counsellor who lodged the complaint with the ACMA, Jon Woodworth, said it was "a little ironic" that at a time

when the Prime Minister was talking about lax attitudes towards drug use, public funds were being used to make jokes about it. "I think that it's dangerous," he said, adding that a disclaimer, in which *Fat Pizza* creator and star Paul Fenech says "I don't endorse any of these drugs", could not be taken seriously. "The serious parts get mixed up with the comedy, and the program is targeted at young males who would get the impression that drug use is OK," Mr Woodworth said. In a letter to Mr Woodworth, SBS insisted Fenech "carefully distanced

himself" from the activities in the episode. But Mr Woodworth said SBS had refused to sign a statutory declaration that no real drugs were smoked in the episode. The head of Enough is Enough and a member of the NSW Government's Sentencing Council, Ken Marslew, was outraged by the episode. "They are making light of a product that is illegal and is damaging lives. Any kids that see this *Fat Pizza* mob get the impression it's OK to take drugs and it's not anywhere as bad as people make it out to be." Not people like you, Ken.

Does cannabis use make you a safer driver?

Taking the high road may not be so dangerous after all according to Jonathon Carr-Brown in England's Sunday Times.

Ministers are set to be embarrassed by government-funded research which shows that driving under the influence of drugs makes motorists more cautious and has a limited impact on their risk of crashing. In the study, conducted by the Transport Research Laboratory, "grade A" cannabis specially imported from America was given to 15 regular users. The doped-up drivers were then put through 4 weeks of tests on driving simulators to gauge reaction times and awareness. Regular smokers were used because previous tests in America using first-timers resulted in the volunteers falling over and feeling ill.

The laboratory found its guinea pigs through what it described as a "snowballing

technique" – one known stoner was asked to find another after being promised anonymity and exemption from prosecution. Instead of proving that drug-taking while driving increased the risk of accidents, researchers found that the mellowing effects of cannabis made drivers more cautious and so less likely to drive dangerously. Although the cannabis affected reaction time in regular users, its effects appear to be substantially less dangerous than fatigue or drinking. Research

by the Australian Drugs Foundation found that cannabis was the only drug tested that decreased the relative risk of having an accident. Last week police revealed details of new drug-driving tests to be administered by the roadside, which were received with some amusement. They require suspected drug-drivers to stand on one leg, lean back and touch their nose with their eyes closed, and to count to 30 silently with their eyes shut. This is apparently difficult for puffers.

**Get the facts correct please!**

In the last edition of NGT (Nov) you published a letter by Andrew Kavasilas apparently speaking for the Hemp Embassy. Apart from containing quite a few negative generalizations, which have the effect of creating paranoia, the letter also contained incorrect information regarding household and motor vehicle insurance. I quote, "If that's not enough, being an Australian cannabis criminal now rules you out of insurance for your car or home." Rubbish!

If a person has a criminal conviction (whether it be for cannabis possession or anything else) an insurance company will assess the person's case on an individual basis. They take into consideration such information as; the nature of the conviction, how long ago it was handed down, how many other convictions the person has and so on. In the case of a cannabis conviction, if a person incurred the conviction greater than five years ago, home insurance would not be declined.

If the person was convicted, say one year prior to applying for insurance, acceptance or declination would depend on the nature of the conviction. If it was for a small amount for personal use, that would probably not affect the insurance. If it were for possession of fifty kilos it would most likely result in declination.

So, from my understanding, the Hemp embassy advocates the abolition of criminal convictions for possession of small amounts of cannabis for personal use. If under the present regime a person is busted for possession of such amounts and then is actually unlucky enough to be convicted, it will probably not affect them in obtaining home insurance.

The situation is almost identical regarding car insurance, either comprehensive or third party property. A person is not required to disclose criminal

convictions which have occurred five years prior to the time of applying for such insurance. In other words, if a person was convicted of cannabis related offences, say six, ten or fifteen years ago, it is simply irrelevant concerning current insurance arrangements. Convictions within five years require disclosure and as with house insurance are treated on an individual basis.

In short, being an "Australian cannabis criminal" in the past does not prevent a person obtaining insurance at all and being a "current criminal" does not automatically prevent that person from obtaining home or car insurance.

Mike Hannan goes off

Nimbin is a village of extremes. It can be extremely hot, extremely festive or, on this occasion, extremely fortunate.

On Sunday 13th November locals were treated to no less than four world premieres by renowned composer/pianist Michael Hannan. Many people know Michael through his work as Associate Professor at Southern Cross University, where he is leader of the university's program in contemporary music.

The Nimbin Town Hall took on the feel of a dark secluded cavern, providing the perfect setting for Michael's compositions to weave their way through the warm air. The music provided a deep insight into a man who has a strong respect for nature. Michael is consequently able to make the connection between his native habitat and his own psyche using the medium of the twelve-tone system.

The concert took us on a journey that frequently demonstrated the link between artist and teacher. The opening compositions written in 1978 have since



been used as developmental aids for countless students. They also demonstrate the close association nature and emotion have with such titles as *Autumn Wind* and *Night Thoughts*. These pieces were all very short in length and demonstrated that music, like speech, doesn't have to be overtly complicated to be highly effective.

The middle part of the concert was centred on acknowledgment of past masters with *Homage a Satie* and *Homage to Chopin*, providing a springboard into *Three Meditations for Dane Rudhyar*. Michael makes his love of tone a feature in these sonic recluses with his explorations into realities defined by their sustained toned complexities.

Impromobile I and *Impromobile III* again reminded us of the duality

of master and teacher with the primary aim of both pieces being to allow for a improvisatory input by the player within the confines of preconceived sections.

In the later stages of the afternoon Michael provided us with a rendition of six of his twelve astrologically based "Resonances". These cyclic movements extend the principle strategy used in "Three Meditations". The use of a constantly depressed sustaining pedal allows for an in depth exploration of piano resonance.

The pied butcherbird takes centrestage in the melodies of these movements, revealing Michael's ability to discern local variations of their call from Brisbane, Byron Bay, Clunes, Nimbin and across the great divide to his own imagination.

The whole afternoon concert was an ear opener. Michael stretched our collective consciousness across the galaxy and back again to our small planet, with its myriad emotions and sounds that exist within, around and beyond us.

We are all looking forward to a follow up event next year.

Help wanted for new footbridge

The footbridge across the creek, over our land between the Headers Sportsfield, and the rear of the shops and the Nimbin School of Arts, has been dismantled.

This 'temporary' bridge was built in the early '90s by Yogie Ogle and an offsider. It was to accommodate the expected flow of pedestrian traffic, between the main venue at the sports field and the main street during a Mardi Grass festival. It was a move in those days by business and volunteer community groups seeking to minimize the sudden impact on the village infrastructure of between 4,000 and 10,000 people (bums) for a weekend.

That was a lot of bums. The public toilets in town numbered six, not including the Pub. The Headers were providing their toilets, organizing space for the Markets, food van sites, and camping. Unfortunately, plans often go wrong. We got heavy rains. The whole district became a quagmire.

This old bridge, over the years, crumbled under the combined energies of age, vandals and very strong white ants. It lost its rails, somehow; foot boards went missing, etc. As a public liability insurance issue, and one we were not prepared to absorb. We had already been in two 'slip and fall' insurance claims from locals using the shops. It had to come down.

What we need now is another bridge, in the right place, on a public 'right of way' with some Council responsibility. The survey plan shows the main pedestrian access from Alternative Way, the Caravan Park and the Headers, over the creek and alongside the Tomato Sauce Building boundary, through to the School of Arts carpark.

The importance of public access from the Cecil St /Rainbow Power Co/Headers Sportsfield area through to the village main street is well recognized by those who use it most: early morning walkers, horse riders and residents taking a shortcut to shopping facilities, with sports competitors and spectators also flowing back and forth.

The main bearers are already spanning the creek, thanks to a contribution from the A&I Society of two long poles and a tractor. Materials from the old structure not gobbled up by white ants are already on site and more will arrive when 40mm thick x 1200mm hardwood can be found locally.

The ingredients now required for the bridge to become reality, is a smidgin of goodwill, a generous pinch of muscle and knowhow. Voluntary that is. The bearers need to be maneuvered into position, the tops chainsawn flat, the footboards nailed down, and the rails batten screwed together. Go and have a look, let us know what you think. We intend fencing the land where the old bridge stood and excluding the public from the area.
